

and Non-collection. Item 1. Rates for Garbage Service. There shall be charged, assessed and collected from each residential unit within the city limits the monthly amount of 25c and from each business establish-

ment within said city limits the monthly amount of \$1.00. The city secretary shall collect these garbage fees either through the water department as a separate item on each water bill or by any other practicable means of col-

Item 2. Uncollected garbage declared a nuisance. No garbage or refuse shall be collected from any premises where the owner or lessee is in arrears for a period of one month. Fermenting, putrefying, or odoriferous garbage in containers uncollected due to failure to pay garbage fees shall be declared a nuisance.

SECTION 6. Penalty. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not more than \$100.00, and each day that any such person shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense and be punishable as such.

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





Eggs a Dollar a Dozen?

- 3. Egg production in February was 4% below a year ago due to 6% fewer layers.
- 4. Americans are eating eggs at a record rate because of high purchasing power and high meat prices.
- 5. There were 55 million fewer chickens on farms January 1 than there were a year ago.
- 6. Virtually all signs point to an excellent grain producing season in 1947 which normally means lower feed prices. A record wheat crop and another 3 billion bushel corn crop are forecast.

Rendered Your Property for 1947 Taxes

MUST BE RENDERED TO GET YOUR HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION

If you own your home you will want to render it so you will be eligible for homestead exemption.

If you have sold some of your property you will want to take that part off your rendention. Many people fail to mention this to the tax-collector, thinking he should know when it changes hands, but very often he does not know of these sales.

The law requires that all property be rendered for taxes whether it be real estate or personal. In all common school districts (except three) the tax rate is \$1.00 for each \$100.00 valuation. All of that dollar (less 1/2 of 1%) is alloted to each respective community.

The deputy assessor, Hester Dodson, or myself will try to see all the property owners, but if you are not at home when we call, or for some other reason we fail to see you, we will appreciate it very much if you will see us at one of the following places that is most convenient for you or at the office in Wheeler.
