Wheeler county went dry in last Saturday's special election by a majority of almost 5 to 1. It was a more decisive victory than the United Drys of Wheeler County which directed the campaign, had hoped for.

The final vote was: for legalized sale of all alcoholic beverages 301; against 1,453.

Seventeen of the county's 19 voting boxes voiced overwhelming opposition to the sale of liquor.

Only 7 of Benonine's qualified electors went out in Saturday's almost constant rain to register their sentiments in the election but all 7 of them voted wet. Magic City was the only other box to go wet, the vote there being 9 for legalized sale and 7 against.

The Wheeler box gave a dry lead of 188 to 24 wets while Stanley turned in 170 against legalized sale to 8 for legal sale

The Porter box put all its 4 votes in the dry column.

Kelton, always a prohibition community, registered almost solid opposition to the proposed liquor sale, with 42 voting against it and one lone ballot in favor. Briscoe had only 2 wets

With the United Drys of Wheeler County sparking the opposition to proposed legalized sale, most ministers joined in an active fight to defeat it. Prominent laymen vigorously opposed the proposal

denominations joined in. There was no campaign conducted in favor of legalizing the beverages, and anost observers from two to one to three to one.

Beer and wine were voted out of the two south county precincts on May 3, 1941, by a vote of 604 to 571, and all other countywide prohibition elections have been close. Beer was first legalized in 1934. In April, 1938, it was voted out by about 50 votes but two months later beer and wine of stronger alcoholic content were again legalized by a majority of approximately 150.

About a year later, in the fall of 1939, the Wheeler precinct went dry by a large majority and a year later the Mobeetie precinct also voted out beer and wine by an impressive plurality. The countywide election was called in 1941 and the sale of any alcoholic drink has been illegal since.

The non-operating unions alone -whose members do not actually operate trains - are demanding a fat increase of 20 cents an hour. These demands would cost the railroads of the country fue hundred sixty-eight million dollars a year!

Last year these employes had as increase of 18% cents as boor. This was their third major wage increase since 1939. Their average weekly pay has gone up 75%, as against a cost-of-living rise of 54%.

Since 1939, railroad wage and material costs have gone up more than three times as much as freight. rates, and five times as much as pamenger fares. That is why in

1946, with the largest peacetime traffic in history, the net income of railroads went down to the equivalent of only 24% of the net property investment.

What About 1947?

Even with the recent freight rate increase, preliminary figures indicate that the railroads will make only about the same low return in 1947 as in 1946. This will be because: -the wage increase made in 1946 will be in effect for all of 1947:

-special payroll taxes on railroads have recently been increased; -and passenger traffic has declined.
