Q-Does the name "United States Government Life (converted) Insurance" include "National Service Life Insurance?

plied for same while in active World War II veterans. Each issippi veterans 3,443. is something referred to as "Government Insurance" and each is administered by Veterans Administration under authority granted by Acts of Congress.

Q-How many offices does Veterans Administration have and where are they located?

A-The Veterans Administration has a central office in Washington, D. C., and 13 branch offices located in strategic centers of population. In addition it has one or more regional office field stations or sub-regional offices in each state. Some of these are larger and have wider activities than others but all are charged with the duty of assisting veterans and their de-

pendents. Q-What identification data should I give in writing about my claim for benefits administered by the Veterans Adminis-

tration? A-If you are making application you should give your full name, grade, organization, serial number, date of entrance into service, date of discharge, and date and place of birth. After the claim is filed it will be assigned a claim number which should be mentioned in all, subsequent communications.

A total of 28,548 war veterans were admitted to Veterans Administration hospitals in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi during the calendar year 1946, VA reported this week.

Although comparable statistics for the preceding year are not available for the Southwest, the area's increase in veteran hospitalization probably parallels the national figure of 61.3 per cent.

During the same period, beds available for treatment of veterans in VA hospitals in the tristate area increased 44 per cent to 7,745 beds at the end of 1946.

The number of VA hospitals increased 38 per cent from eight to eleven. Dallas Branch Area hospitals are at Dallas, McKinney Temple, Amarillo, Legion and Waco; New Orleans and Alexandria, Louisiana; and Jackson, Gulf-port and Biloxi, Mississippi.


