Attention: Mr. J. C. Howell, Editor Gentlemen:

We thoroughly appreciate the interview you granted Mr. Sayre, Mr. Elmore, Mr. Siemsen and the writer last Wednesday, April 16, 1947, when we discussed our electric service to the City of Wheeler.

We talked with Mayor Forrester and it was at his suggestion that we contacted you, along with several others of the Wheeler business establishments. We attempted to explain to you, Mr. Howell, that work had been in progress for quite sometime to improve the electric service to Wheeler. We do believe, however, that you were in agreement with us that the twentyone hour outage that you folks sustained on April 13 was due to the heavy wet snow blanketing our lines in Wheeler County to such an extent that portions of the lines could not stand up under the excessive weight of the wet snow. Failure on our lines over our entire service area occured during this period for the same

Last week, we made improvements in our electrical substation that serves the City of Wheeler and this week, we have our entire line crew busy on the installation of lighting protective equipment on the electric transmission lines coming into Wheeler County. Mr. Sayre is making, this week, a careful survey of the main feeder lines into the City of Wheeler and is installing protective devices all along the line, particularly at locations that he feels could in any way hamper electric service in Wheeler.

We are extremely anxious to furnish the very best possible service, and we are now completing changes and improvements, as set up by our electrical engineers, to protect the lines serving the city distribution system; and we feel confident that you will note a very appreciable improvement in your electric service after the work described above has been completed. Weather permitting, we plan to fully complete this work in the next few days.

Mr. Savre will continue to report promptly all interruptions to service occurring in the City; and, although it is impossible for us to cope with all the elements of the weather, we propose to investigate and correct the causes for interruptions wherever it is possible.

Cancer Caused Death Of 13 County People, Drive Chairman Says

Deaths in Wheeler county due to cancer rose from 6 in 1945 to 13 in 1946 as deaths throughout Texas continue to increase, according to official statistics of the State Board of Health released today by J. Louis Neff of Houston, executive director of the Texas Division of the American Cancer Soc-

In a letter to Allen Kavanaugh, Wheeler chairman, Harris B. Zeigler, Shamrock chairman and Jack Miller, Mobeetie chairman, Mr. Neff reported there were 6,343 deaths from cancer in Texas last year, compared to 5,948 deaths during



EVERGREENS ARE BARRIER AGAINST FIRE

COLLEGE STATION - Border plantings of evergreen shrubs around rural homes and farm buildings can be a barrier against spreading grass fires, states Miss Sadie Hatfield, landscape gardenng specialist of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service.

Broadleaf varieties of evergreen shrubs and trees will often stop a grass fire, says Miss Hatield, provided they are of the right varieties. Plants suited for the purpose are amuriver privet, big-leaf privet, euonymus japontha, cape jasmine, holly, Florida jasmine, cherry laurel, youpon, pyracantha, and wax leaf ligustrum. Cedars, pines and others of the conifer family are not recommended as fire barrier plants. since they burn when green, the specialist says.

Landscape gardeners have found that the shrubs are effective in stopping grass fires when planted from three to six feed away from the foundation of the house Shrub beds, eight or ten feet wide, and planted against the house foundation, are also grass fire protection.



Q. I have twin heifer calves. Will one of them be sterile? Is the heifer in a male-female twin combination always sterile?

A. Since sterility doesn't occur in twin heifer calves, your heifers should both be fertile for breeding purposes. The heifer of a male-female twin combination is sterile in 99% of the cases. This sterility is caused by the blood vessels of both fetal calves fusing, so that the male hormones destroy the developing female reproductive organs. In the 1% of cases where the blood vessels do not fuse, the heifer is fertile, but there is no way of determining whether or not the blood vessels have fused.

Q. Is it all right to castrate boar pigs before they are four or five weeks of age?

A. Yes. Recent results obtained at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company from castrating more than 3,400 pigs at five days of age clearly indicate that pigs castrated at an early age show little or no set-back. The practice of castrating pigs before they are turned on pasture is preferred. The standard time for castrating at four weeks of age, however, can be followed with safety if desired.




