 RING OUT THE OLD

For business, for political parties
 and for millions of families,
 1946 has been a year of painful
 readjustment. Industry and trans-
 portation have been hit seriously
 by shortages, strikes and rising
 production costs; in many instances
 these factors have turned
 profits into deficits and sapped
 corporate strength. The business
 outlook would be bleak except for
 two trends that came late in the
 year—the lifting of many war-
 time controls and the cracking of
 prices from their postwar infla-
 tionary crests. Both these factors
 give hope for fewer strikes and
 steadier production.
 International relationships have
 been left uncertain by the recal-
 citrance of Russia on many prob-
 lems—an attitude that has made
 the other powers hesitant to
 reduce their armament to peace-
 time levels and has evoked pessim-
 ism in many quarters over the
 efficacy of the United Nations.

Here again there is at least a
 glimmering of hope that the worst
 may be past and that Moscow
 may show more co-operative at-
 titude in the months ahead, pro-
 vided our own friendly but firm
 foreign policy is continued.

For the Democratic party, 1946
 has brought a major headache.
 The smashing GOP victory, in
 which the Republicans captured
 the Senate as well as the House
 and most of the governorships,
 leaves the older party in a poor
 position for the start of the 1948
 presidential race—a position that
 may be worse if a business re-
 cession should appear in the next
 year and a half. With the two parties
 agreed on a bipartisan foreign
 policy, no serious harm may come
 from the lack of harmony be-
 tween the executive and legislative
 branches.

For families and individuals,
 1946 has brought many pinches.
 Veterans returning from the war
 have had less trouble finding jobs
 than was anticipated but many
 have prolonged business woes.
 The high wages that most work-
 ers have received have been off-
 set by high living costs. Many
 have lost time in strikes, and
 others in white-collar jobs have
 had to pay high prices without
 much increase in income. While
 downward turn in prices gives
 hope of early remedy for this
 pinch, last year's relief at the
 war's end may almost be equal-
 ed by today's relief at the close of
 a worrisome year of reconversion.

Q. Are large, numerous "milk veins" on the udder and abdomen an indication of how much milk a cow will produce?

A. Probably not, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. There is no evidence to support the time-honored theory. External milk veins assist in carrying blood away from the udder. Moreover, the internal veins are apparently large enough to return all the blood from the udder.

Q. What can I do to prevent feather picking among my turkey poult?

A. One of the major causes of feather picking is that turkey poults have a tendency to clean their beaks on the feathers of other birds, which results in particles of wet feed sticking to the feathers. Other birds pick at these feed particles, sooner or later causing injury. At the Ralston Purina Company's Research Farm this has been eliminated by stringing a piece of wire across the top of the feeder grills or just over the feeder at a convenient height so the poults, while eating, can grab the wire in their beaks and clean them over the trough. This also helps prevent feed wastage, because the birds clean their beaks above the trough and the feed falls back into the feeder.

Q. What is the average weight of fleeces from a range ewe? How many fleeces are packed into each bag of wool at shearing time?

A. The average weight of fleeces from a single ewe varies between 7 and 10 pounds. Weights also vary between flocks, localities, and regions, influenced by breeding as well as environmental factors. When packed, fleeces are arranged in symmetrical layers in the sacks and are compressed by tramping. Each bag contains from 27 to 35 fleeces, depending on size.

Q. Do pigs which have plenty of Vitamin D need minerals?

A. Pigs that are well supplied with Vitamin D do best on small amounts of minerals, and they require more minerals if they are low on Vitamin D, the sunshine vitamin.

For her wedding, the bride chose a beige gabardine dress with brown accessories. Her corsage was of pink rosebuds and she carried a white leather Bible.

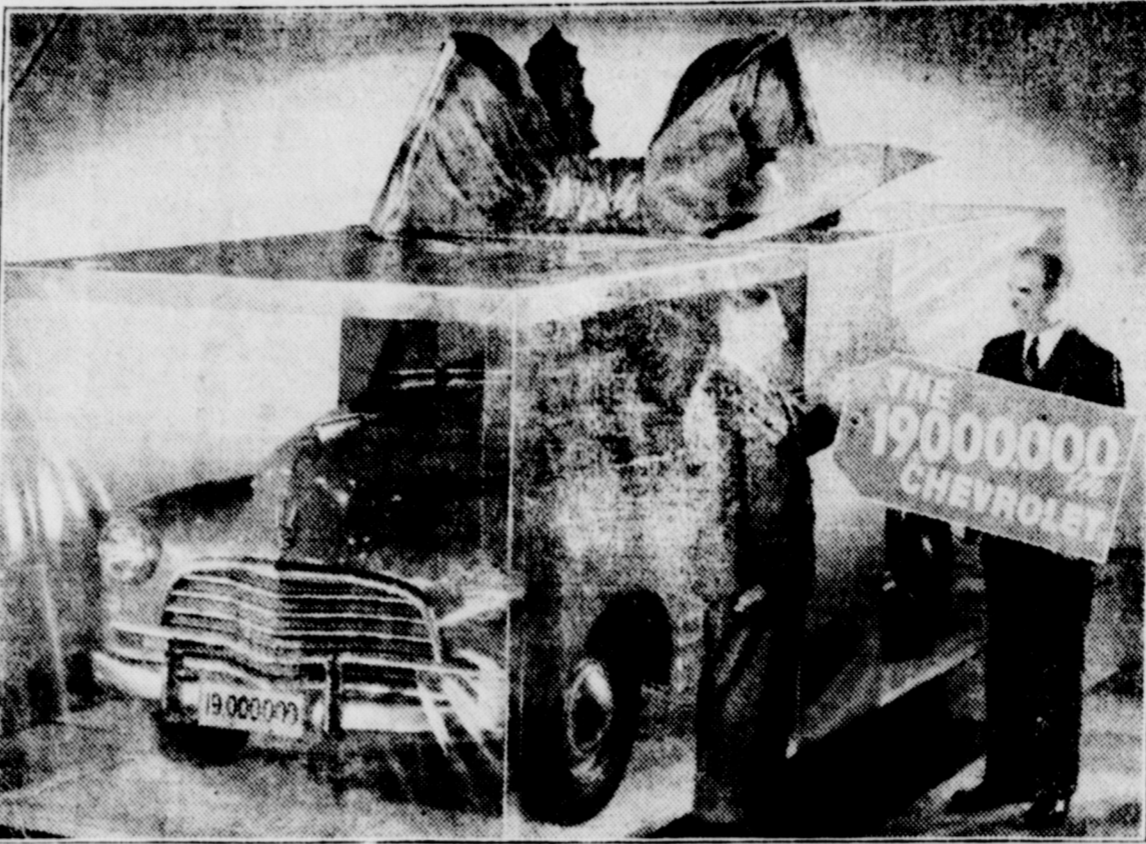

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Q—Does the name "United States Government Life Insurance" include "National Service Life Insurance"?

A—No; "United States Government Life Insurance" is one type of government insurance and "National Life Insurance" is another. However, both are administered by the Veterans Administration under authority granted by acts of Congress.

Q—Do the premiums increase as the insured grows older?

A—No. The premiums to be paid on any form of the insurance are established according to the age of the person insured at the effective date of the insurance; that is, a person 30 years old will pay a higher premium than a person 25 for the same plan of insurance.

Q—Are there any restrictions in Government insurance on the type of work I do?

A—No. The insured may engage

in any occupation, no matter how hazardous, live where he likes, and travel any way he chooses, without effecting the value or cost of his insurance policy.

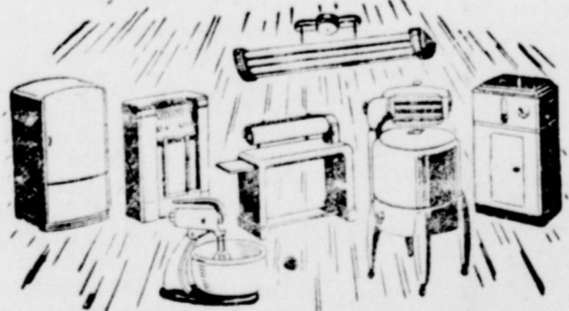

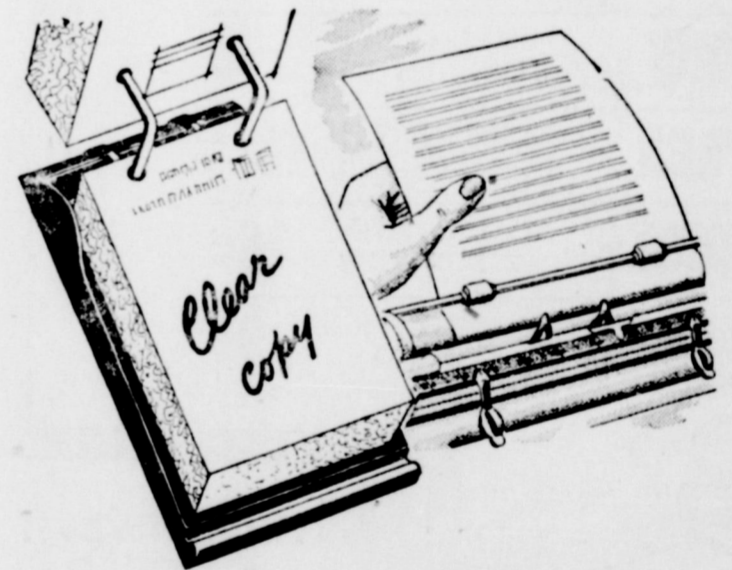
