KAVANAUGH **POINTS OUT CUT** IN STATE AID

The Legislative Accountant has notified the school superintendents that the State will pay 84% of the approved salary aid grant. The cut in state aid to schools is due to the insufficient amount of the appropriation for financing the schools according to the school budget as is required in House Bill 295, County Superintendent Allen Kavanaugh stated.

The State Teachers Association, the Joint Legislative Committee and many of the laymen of Texas have requested the Governor call a special session of Legislatu to appropriate an additional \$3. 000,000. (three million dollars)
