Pesticide Applicators License Course Offered

Agricultural producers will have an opportunity to get a private Pesticide Applicators License Tuesday, February 23, 1993, in the Wheeler School cafeteria, according to Don King, CEA. The training and testing session is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The training session will begin at 6:00 p.m. and will be followed by the test which will be given by Charlie Thomas of the Texas Department of Agriculture. The test should conclude by 10:00 p.m.

A limited supply of study materials for the test are available on a first come, first served basis by contacting the Wheeler County Extension office at 826-5243.

A \$50.00 fee is required for those who pass the test and qualify for the license. The license is good for 5 years.

Those producers who currently hold an applicator license should remember that they must accumulate 15 continuing education units (CEU's) within years from the time their license was issued. Certified applicators (those who got their license prior to January 10, 1989) must have 15 CEU's by December 31, 1994. This training session will not count for CEU's.

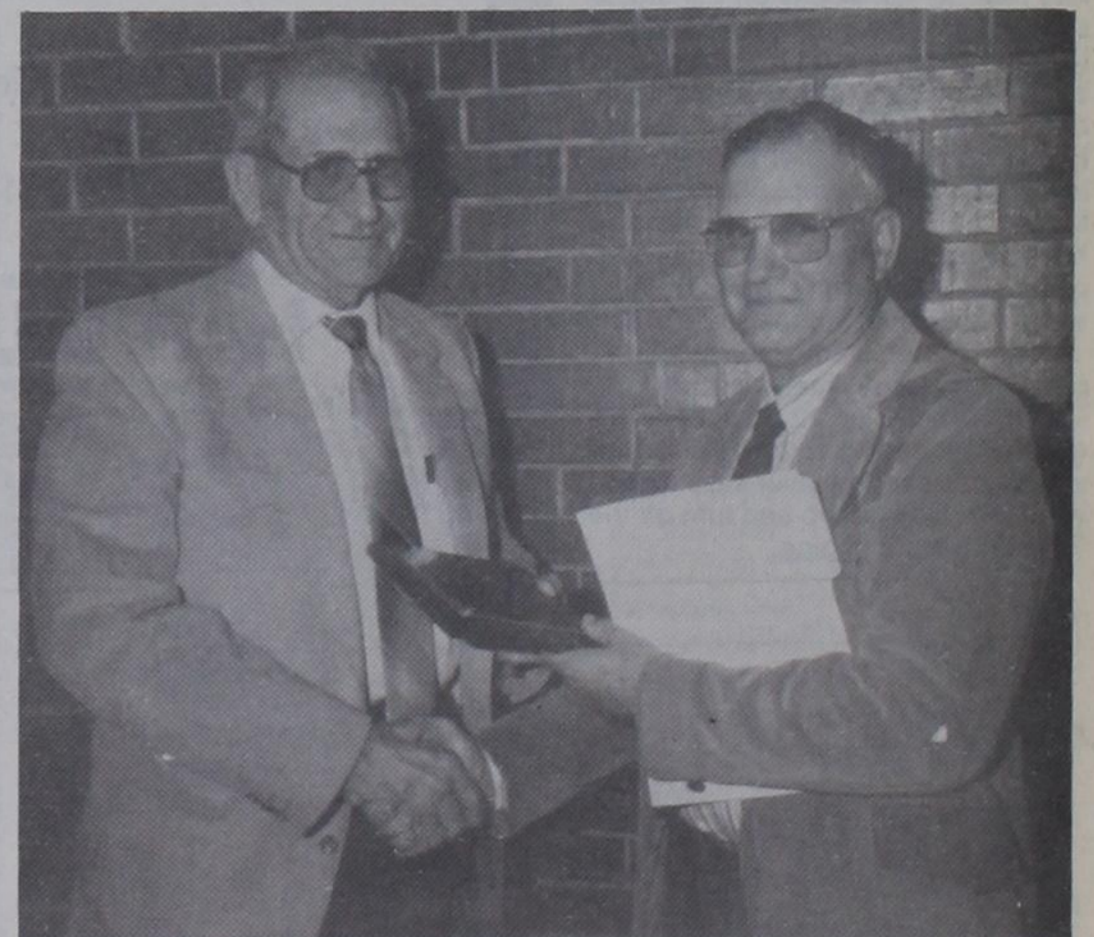

We had been quite busy for some time and when things sort of settled down the observer told us we had stopped quite a large bunch of Japs that were trying to break through our lines. He figured there were over 400 of them but things quietened down for us.

The next morning we were getting ready to change positions as them Japs knew rite where we were and as we were gettin ready to climb aboard and Ewas Dida (get the heck out of Dodge) we noticed five great big Japs

approaching us from our back side. They had their hands raised as if surrendering but as they got closer we saw they durn sure weren't soldiers. They were them Jap wrestlers with their hair in a bun and had on their kamomas an such. We had all seen big fat folks but them was outrageous, them birds wuz humungus, honest they wuz. They apparently were there at Okinawa to put on a wrestling match or sumthing but they sure wanted to

surrender to us. They fought on a pad with their monstrous weight and strength an not with weapons. As I said we needed to move from this location before the Jap artillery wiped us out and we didn't need any more quests as we just had room for the crew and none to spare and we needed to pick up more ammo. These brutes didn't speak any thing we could understand and I thought maybe our driver, who had his back to us, might

could understand them. The driver wuz from Oklahoma and I figured he mite have a suggestion. One of the big Japs tapped Kellum on the shoulder and when Kellum turned and saw him he said something that would have to be beeped here, know what I mean. Anyhow we all loaded on the vehicle and last time I looked back them five big Jap wrestlers wuz still trying to get someone to surrender to.

Even with all the horror of war there is always something to laugh at and honest seeing Kellum and the look on his face when he seen them brutes wuz something. I don't remember but honest I bet Mr. Kellum wuz breaking the speed limit when we pulled out of that bowl that we had spent the night in.

By the way Kellum is a big eighteen wheel truck driver there in Oklahoma someplace.

Single Family Housing Loans Are Available

Rural Housing Loans for very-low and low income applicants are available through County Officers of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Johnny Earp, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Home ownership loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair, rural homes and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems. Homes may be built on individual tracts or in subdivisions. Funds may also be used to modernize homes — add improvements such as bathrooms, central heating modern kitchens and other improvements. Borrowers may buy an existing house and lot or buy a site on which to build a home. Loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the appraised value of the site and the new home. Interest rates for this type of loan are presently 7.75 percent with 33 year terms. Monthly payments are subsidized with the amount of the payment dependent on the borrower's annual income. Homes will be modest in size, design, and cost but adequate to meet the family's needs. New homes average about 1,050 square feet of living area.

In addition, Farmers Home Administration guarantees home ownership loans made to applicants of low or moderate income. Guarantees offer opportunities to families who are unable to afford a commercial loan without a Guarantee. These loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the value of the property and are made for terms of 30 years. The interest rate is based on the Federal National Mortgage Association rate with a maximum loan amount in most counties of \$67,500.

The Farmers Home Administration assists rural America by guaranteeing private sector loans and by providing temporary, supervised direct loans to farm and housing borrowers who have a reasonable chance for success, and whose current needs cannot be met at reasonable rates and terms by commercial sources. The Agency is committed to excellence in providing its services.

"Applications for assistance may be obtained at the Farmers Home Administration office located at 1224 N. Hobart, in Pampa," FmHA County Supervisor said. The FmHA office in the NBC Plaza Building, Suite 102, is open from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Monday through Friday.

From the Minister's Desk:

In 1965, Jimmy Stewart starred in a movie that was entitled, *Shenandoah*. He played a tough-minded Virginia farmer whose family was tragically drawn into the Civil War.

The movie opened with a scene which showed this farmer and his family sitting before a table that was laden with food, reciting a prayer of "thanksgiving". In this prayer he first listed all the things that he and his family had done to provide the food. He then concluded the prayer by saying: "Nonetheless we are thankful."

Is this the type of prayer that we offer? Or do we still give thanks before meals? We live in a culture that apparently believes that its needs are satisfied by its own creativeness. Have we forgotten the real source of our food? Yes, we have good jobs, farms, money, and livestock, but we are still dependent upon God and His providence. We do not know how to bring the sunshine or the rain. Therefore, it is still necessary for us to pray: "Give us this day our daily bread."

This admonition is part of the prayer that Jesus included in His model prayer. But why would Jesus include this admonition in that pray?

He recognized that God has always expected people to depend upon Him. For example, when the children of Israel first started their exodus from Egypt, they arrived at the "—wilderness of Sin—" and they grumbled against Moses and Aaron, saying: "Would that we had died by the Lord's hand in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the pots of meat, when we ate bread to the full; for you have brought us out into wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger." (Exodus 16:3) To meet their need, God promised that He would "—rain down bread from heaven—" but He emphasized that the children of Israel had to continually trust Him.

What was true of the children of Israel on their way from Egypt to the land of Canaan should also be true of us in our daily lives. We must constantly remember that our Heavenly Father is the source of all life, physical and spiritual. We must also acknowledge our dependence upon Him. Therefore, when we gather around tables of food, let us bow our heads and express our dependence upon God by praying: "give us this day our daily bread."

PRODUCTIVITY APPRAISAL MAY LOWER FARM & RANCH TAXES

Texas law provides farmers and ranchers and timber growers with a way to lower their property taxes, known as productivity appraisal.

If you qualify your agricultural land will be taxed on its capacity to produce crops, livestock or timber instead of its value on the real estate market. Productivity appraisal can lower the taxable value of your land, and lower your property taxes as a result.

If your land has never received productivity appraisal, you must apply to the appraisal district no later than April 30th to get the tax benefits for 1993. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but with a penalty.

If your land already receives agricultural appraisal, you normally don't need to re-apply unless the chief appraiser requires you to. If a new application is required you will be notified by mail. IF YOU RECEIVE SUCH A NOTICE RESPOND AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. FAILURE TO RESPOND COULD LEAD TO YOUR EXEMPTION BEING DENIED.

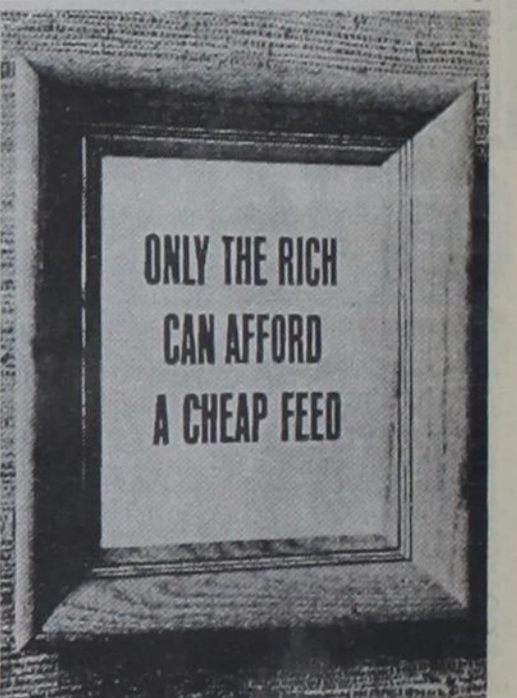

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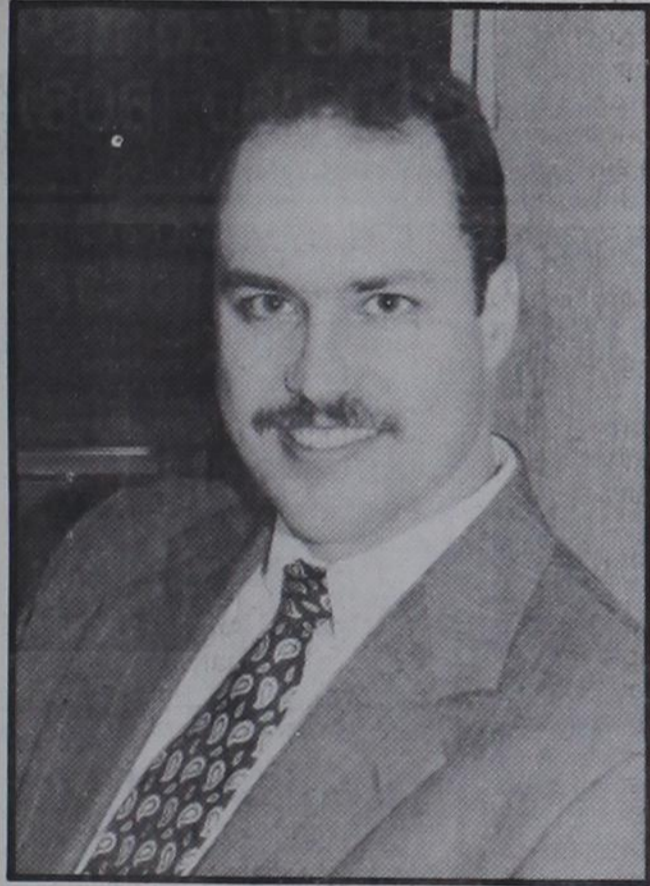
