



A statewide Project Celebration campaign spreading through Texas helps youths, parents, schools and communities help themselves. Local planning, organization, promotion and fund raising are necessary to successfully implement this idea. Committees of youths, parents, school personnel and community leaders produce their variations of Project Celebration to tailor ideas to fit

The primary aim of Project Celebration activities is to reduce the number of young people involved in drug and/or drinking-and-driving accidents. Communities can offer an alternate method of celebrating special occasions. In many communities, a chemical-free party is in stark contrast to a "tradition" of student or parent-sponsored drinking or keg parties. Implementing a local version of Project Celebration will often involve changing many established norms, attitudes and behaviors related in alcohol

and other drug use. A factor in drinking and driving behavior is the lack of accurate information concerning alcohol. Adult and youth drivers have a lack of knowledge in these areas: Effects of alcohol on teen's

driving skills. Amount of alcohol needed to produce impairment and legal intoxication.

Alcoholic content of various drinks. Time required to oxidize alcohol. Ineffectiveness of popular methods

for "sobering up". Penalties for drinking and driving of-

Nature and effectiveness of chemical

tests, and laws relating to their use.

Some parents who sponsor drinking parties for young persons are unaware of their moral and legal responsibilities for the health and safety of their minor guests. Typical excuses parents have offered for serving alcoholic beverages to minors include:

"I'd rather have the kids drink here-

'It's my kid's turn to have a party and all her friends have had a Keg at their parties-it's expected."

"We won't serve hard liquor, just beer." "All the parents allow it. We don't want our kids to feel different." "If my kid doesn't drink at home, he'll

go somewhere else and do it." "I'd rather know what's going on." "High school kids are under a lot of pressure these days, beer is part of their

These topics could be assigned to students for research, with the findings reported to the class prior to the cel-

Project Celebration involves estab- Walker-10th. lishing a new "tradition" in many communities. Students and adults can learn that it is possible to have a good time at a party without drinking or using drugs. In many Texas communities, the chemical-free party idea has transcended graduation night, and now includes proms, end-of-sport-season parties, and other special activities. John McKay, Director of Texans' War on Drugs, best summarized what is happening in Texas when he said, "The trend is moving away from the tradition of drinking being acceptable. Students who choose not to use (drugs or alcohol) receive support for that decision throughout the year.'

## Farm Program Sign-up Begins; Deadline 4/30

Sign-up in the 1993 Farm Program began Monday, March 1 and will end April 30, 1993. The Wheeler County ASCS offices asks farmers to make appointments before coming in. Producers will be required to fill out new Payment Limitation and SOD/Swamp forms for 1993. These forms will require some time to complete. By scheduling producers, there should be no delay in being waited on. Producers with appointments will be served first.

Program provisions for 1993 include 0/92 for wheat and sorghum, 50/92 for cotton, ZERO set-a-side for wheat, 5% for sorghum and 7.5% for cotton. All projected deficiency payments are higher for 1993, and include an advance payment of 50% of the projected. 15% flex acres still apply to each base crop on a farm.



From the Minister's Desk:

One of the most interesting personalities in the Old Testament was Josiah. He became king of Judah when he was eight years old, reigning for thirty-one years. Throughout this reign, King Josiah continually urged Judah to faithfully obey God.

For example, during the eighteenth year of his reign, Josiah purged the land of the heathen altars and began to restore the Temple. During this restoration of the Temple, an old scroll was found which contained the laws of God as they were given to Moses. When this scroll was read to Josiah, he ripped his clothing in despair and said: "Go, inquire of the Lord for me and those who are left in Israel and in Judah, concerning the words of the book which has been found; for great is the wrath of the Lord which is poured out on us because our fathers have not observed the Word of the Lord, to do according to all that is written in this book." (II Chronicles 34:21)

Could these words also be an indictment of twentieth century America? For the last several years, some thoughtful Americans have been warning about the decline of twentieth century America, suggesting that the most powerful nation in the world may be destined for destruction. To prevent this destruction, twentieth century America must

be willing to find the "lost" book, the Bible, and to "--do according to all that is written in this book." But how does twentieth century America begin to do "--all that is written--" in the Bible? Since the bulwark of twentieth century America is its families, it is imperative that the families of

America read and study the Bible. Think about the strength and high resolve that would characterize this nation if more American families read and studied the Bible. For example, think about the strength against the illness or the death of a loved one that would come from the study of Job. Think about the help that troubled families could receive from the study of Ruth. Think about the preventive advice that fathers could learn from the study of David, Eli, and Samuel. The Bible is filled with stories, admonitions and principles that through study and application could strengthen the families of twentieth century America. And when the families of twentieth century America are strengthened, the results will be a stronger America.

Psalm 24:1 says, "The earth is the Lord's, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein." Many people who claim to be born again Christians are in the dark about what Christianity is. There are a lot of people who don't have to turn out the lights to be in the dark. Some people who consider themselves to be very dedicated to God view the world as if the Bible and God have little or nothing to do with it.

Researchers recently found that only 56 percent of evangelical Republicans were solidly against legalized abortion. Almost one in three of them, in fact, supported the idea of allowing abortion for any reason. One in five of these "strongly religious" people were even hard-line "prochoice". The numbers are even worse than this when one looks at evangelical Democrats and non-evangelical church people.

What this shows is that a very large number of "Christians:" do not have a Christian worldview. They think they know God, but they believe that it is extremely personal. Therefore, they really are serious about God in church. However, they do not include God or the Bible in other things such as morality or politics. Our President is perhaps the most prominent example of this. He says he believes in God. He chose a specific Scripture to place his hand on during his swearing in as Chief Executive. Until he moved to Washington, he sang in the choir at a Baptist Church. He said that he prays virtually every day and reads the Bible. Sometimes, he even quotes something from the Bible. However, in the context of his life, his positions on many issues is radically anti-biblical. It is a classic example of a Christian with a non-Christian worldview.

As Christians, we are suppose to let Jesus Christ be Lord of all, not just Lord of certain "spiritual" aspects. The whole world is the Lord's. If the Bible is really the Word of God and Jesus is really Lord, then that should relate to everything we do and every position or opinion we hold about any subject or issue including history, science, art, music, or morality. If you don't look to the Bible for your worldview, you may profess to be a Christian, but you still act like a pagan.






