GOD'S HIGHEST WISH

In the little book of Third John in the Bible, the Lord expressed His highest wish for you. I should emphasize that this is God's highest wish for people who are saved. If you haven't given your life to Jesus Christ and made Him Lord in your life, the wish isn't for you. However, if you accept the Lord and become a born again Christian, the wish will be for you too.

Verse 2 says, "Beloved, I wish above all things that thou mayest prosper and be in health, even as they soul prospereth. "Beloved" is you. "I" is God in this verse. So, God is saying, "This is my wish for you." Notice that He said that it is His wish above all things. That is significant. That phrase is what prompts me to say that this is God's highest wish for you. Actually, the word "wish" would be better translated as "pray". That makes it even stronger because it is not just a good wish for you. It is something very serious. It was written, by the way, by an elderly apostle. The apostle John who had been with Jesus and who had served the Lord for many years wrote this. He wasn't a novice, he wasn't one who would say something like this lightly, and he wasn't desirous of wishing upon anybody things contrary to the will of God. Besides all that, He was inspired by the Holy Spirit to write it. So, indeed, this is God's wish and His highest wish for you.

What is the wish? He wishes for you that you prosper and be in health even as your soul prospers. If your soul prospers in the things of the Lord, there should be a correlating effect in your material, financial condition and in your physical health. God wants you to be prosperous. He wants your business to succeed if it is a good and God-honoring business. He wants you to have plenty. He doesn't want you to be unable to pay your bills and have the necessities of life. Poverty is not God's idea, nor is it God's plan for you. He said in the Bible that He would give you plenty if you would honor Him with tithes and offerings. He said He would bless obedient people coming in and going out. He said that he delights in the prosperity of His servant. (Scripture references for those statements are Malachi 3:10-11, Proverbs 3:9-10, Deuteronomy 28:6, and Psalm 35:27)

He says also in Third John 2 that He wants ABOVE ALL THINGS for you to be in health. Please notice something. I have met with arguments and opposition for years concerning the teaching of "healing", Sometimes, I tell people that folks will fight you for their right to be sick. It is interesting how determined some people are to believe it is God's will for them to be sick even though the Bible says that He heals all diseases for those who will accept it and do what the Word of God requires. But this verse takes things a step further than healing. It says that it is God's highest wish for you to be in health. He doesn't want you to have to be healed 50 times. He wants you to live in a state of health.

If these things are God's highest wish (which they are), let us believe it. Let's thank God for it. Let's expect it. Let's pray for it. It is perfectly in order to pray for things that are clearly God's will.







CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 1, 1993

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be altax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the counts shall determine whether or not an amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed obligation is fully funded.
