
### Scott Dyer Receives D.A.R. **Good Citizen Award**

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS** SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 1, 1993

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and disgeneral law. The legislature would be altax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed county through county education dis- 1993. tricts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

"The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad val-

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds orem taxes for schools, authorizing issued by the state. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. ### Can I Be Healed? How?

Does God heal today? If He does, is it for just a few select, lucky ones? If He does heal and doesn't just select certain ones, how can I receive? Do I have to go to a wild, noisy church service and roll around in the aisle? Do I have to find a "faith-healer"?

The answer to the first question is found in Psalm 103:1-3 (and many other Scriptures). In the Scripture referred to, God said that we are not to forget His benefits among which is "who healeth all thy diseases". God said in Exodus 15:26 that He is "the Lord that healeth thee". He also said that He never changes. If He ever was a Healer, He still is. If He ever healed people, He still does. The Bible is very clear that He did and He

The answer to the next question concerning the ones who can be healed is found in James 5:14-15 (and many other Scriptures). There, the Lord said that if any Christian is sick that He should call for the elders of the church and that they should anoint him with oil and pray over him in the name of the Lord. God said that person would be healed.

The next question concerning how to receive it is found in Proverbs 4:20-22. God said there that if one would (1) attend to His words, (2) listen to His sayings, (3) keep the Word before his eyes, and (4) keep the Word of God in the heart that healing for the flesh would happen. Does that mean going to a certain church? Well, it is possible that some people would need to change churches if the one they are going to is not teaching people the Word of God. If He said that giving the priority described in the four steps listed above would produce healing, and the church one is going to is teaching that healing won't come (or might not come) when the steps God gave for healing are followed, that could be deadly. To teach the opposite of what the Bible says will produce the wrong results. You must go where the truth is taught. The label over the church door is not the important thing. The teaching is. Is the truth taught there? Some teaching and preaching contradicts the Word. Jesus said that some people make the Word of God ineffective in their case because of their commitment to tradition rather than the actual Word of God. 1 Thessalonians 2:13 says the Word of God will work for them that believe it. Psalm 107:20 says that God sent His Word and healed people. There is healing in His Word. BUT you must incline your ears to it, you must keep it in front of your eyes (quit reading books that say healing has passed away), give continuous attention to the Word, and keep it in the heart. Healing is absolutely promised, but people must cooperate and do what He said. You can't omit your part and expect that He will still do what He indicated that He wanted to do. Most Christians ignore these Scriptures and decide that God just does

what He wants to do and that if they aren't healed, that proves it wasn't God's will. He already revealed His will clearly. If folks won't pay attention or won't follow the rules, He isn't to blame for healing not coming. He has told us what His will is. He has told us what to do to have it in our lives. If we don't believe it, don't accept it, refuse it, and disregard the instructions, then it isn't a matter of His Sovereignty. God said in Hosea 4:6 that His people are destroyed because of a lack of knowledge, not because He decided it would be best in their case to kill them.

The healing Scriptures we have typed onto three pages are still available to you for the asking. Also, we stand ready to pray for you if you want someone to pray that believes it is God's will for you to be well.

very best to stay in compliance. Your local Soil Conservation Service encourages farmers to come by the office to discuss their conservation plan. The Soil Conservation Service crew is looking forward in working with you and to visit with you.
