## Waste Pesticide Disposal Date Is Friday, March 26

Many agricultural producers in Wheeler county have unwanted or unusable pesticides stored on their property. Disposal of these pesticides in a safe manner is both difficult and expensive.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Department of Agriculture and Texas Water Commission are sponsoring a free waste pesticide collection opportunity in our area. A collection site will be located in Dumas at the Municipal Landfill on March 26. This site will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., according to Don King, County Extension Agent.

Eligible persons are those who apply insecticides for the production of agricultural products on land that they own or control in Texas. Individuals or businesses who purchase pesticides for resale and commercial pesticide applicators are excluded from the program.

Pesticides eligible for collection include the following: \*insecticides \*fungicides \*rodenticides \*nematicides \*bactericides \*growth regulators \*harvest aid chemical \*other miscellaneous pesticides \*all formulations of herbicides, excluding those containing 2,4,5-T Silvex \*unknown or unlabeled materials suspected of being one of the above mentioned eligible substances

Excluded substances include waste oils, solvents, paints, explosive materials and fertilizers.

There will be no charge for this service, there will be no questions asked and no signature required.

Producers may also take empty pesticide containers to the collection sites. Only clean metal or plastic containers that have been triple or high pressure rinsed and punctured will be accepted. Both private and commercial applicators are eligible for the empty container collection.

According to King, many producers have received an announcement of the program from the Texas Water Commission. Anyone interested in the program is invited to call the Wheeler County Extension Office at 826-5243 for more information.

## 7 ARRESTED IN ARSON CASE

The fire marshal and six members of the Shamrock Volunteer Fire Department were arrested on charges of arson, following a year long investigation by Jerry Bob Jernigan, Wheeler County Constable.

The first five arrested were Gene Kirkland, 21; Brian Kirkland, 18, Harold Kidd—fire marshal, 30; Tommy Kidd, 23, and Bradley Todd, 21. Arrested Tuesday afternoon were Willie Stowe, 20, and Michael Walden, 19.

The seven were taken before Justice of the Peace Herb Stacy of Shamrock for arraignment and charged with arson, a second-degree felony and bond was set \$5,000. Bond was posted by Harold and Tommy Kidd and Bradley Todd. The others remain in Wheeler County Jail in lieu of bail.

According to Constable Jernigan, the break in the case came when Shamrock's Assistant Chief of Police Monte Cornett received pertinent information and contact Jernigan.

Jernigan stated, "The Shamrock Volunteer Fire Department is a dedicated organization that provides a valuable service. Let me stress that we have had full cooperation with the fire department officials."

## Elections Set for Sat., May 1

Wheeler county voters will go to the polls Saturday, May 1, 1993, to elect city, school and hospital officials. The individuals serving on the city council and hospital boards are unopposed in their seeking re-election. The Wheeler I.S.D. school board election will have two contested races.

**CITY OF WHEELER ELECTION**  
Three members of the Wheeler City Council are seeking re-election in the May 1, 1993, election. Walter Simmons, place 1; Barbra Koelzer, place 3, and Mark Frankenbery, place 5, have each filed for their respective places on the council.

The council members are elected to two year terms.

**WHEELER I.S.D. BOARD**  
Three places are to be filled on the Wheeler I.S.D. Board of Trustees in the May 1, 1993, election. Two board members filed for re-election to their places and Bill Morrison chose not to file.

In Place 1 on the board, Dell Ford, incumbent, has Harrison Hall as an opponent in the election.

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### IS CHURCH ATTENDANCE NECESSARY?

Do I have to go to church to be a Christian? That is a question that has been asked many times through the years. Actually, it is more often stated rather than asked, "I don't have to go to church to be a Christian." The statement is true just as much as it is true that one does not have to live with his spouse to be married. However, just about everyone understands that something is definitely wrong with the marriage if a couple is married and not living together, unless circumstances require it for a time. Even in those circumstances, long term separation is not a positive factor in the relationship. Likewise, people who really love the Lord will want to assemble with the Lord's people who believe like they do. If they don't come to the assembly, they just simply are not right with God unless circumstances require absence for a time. Even with a good reason, prolonged absence will weaken a person spiritually. It is not normal for Christians NOT to attend church. Someone said, "If absence makes the heart grow fonder, some people must really love the church." Some folks think it is more important to belong to the church than it is to attend the church.

Rather than quote Scriptures here about attending church, let me take a moment of your time to relate to you three reasons from the Bible concerning why we should attend. In other words, many delinquent church members know that the Scripture commands that they assemble together, but it is helpful and important to understand why.  
Romans 1:11-13 gives us three good reasons for going to church regularly. In verse 11, Paul says that he longs to see the saints at Rome in order that he may impart a spiritual gift to them. All of us who are saved have something to contribute to the other saints. We need to be in church where the others are assembled in order that we may give our part into their lives. So many times, people don't realize how their faithfulness (or lack of faithfulness) influences others. Someone who is presumed to be a leader in the assembly has a particular negative impact on the others who look to them, when they are frequently absent. It is very important that we recognize that we must be in our place regularly because we have a responsibility to give our part.

In Romans 1:12, Paul said that he wanted to come to the church in Rome in order to be comforted together with them by the mutual faith they and he had. In other words, we need to be in church because there is something we need to receive. There is strength and encouragement and comfort that we give to each other. The great apostle Paul said that he needed to be there to get the strength and comfort that would be shared mutually. Can you see that going to church is more than just listening to the preacher? That is an extremely important function of church attendance, but we need to receive what the other saints there have to contribute to our lives.

In Romans 1:13, Paul speaks of having fruit AMONG them. This informs us of a third reason for going to church. We are supposed to be working for God together. In coming together, we gather in the fruits of our labor and rejoice together. Part of that fruit gathering is people being brought into the church (new converts). We all need to be there to welcome them and contribute to their walk with the Lord.

Next time that church time is nearing, think about these things and fill your place. God has good reasons for you to be there.

**MILK, YOGURT AND CHEESE**

Milk products provide protein, vitamins and minerals. Milk, yogurt and cheese are the best sources of calcium. The Food Guide Pyramid suggests 2 to 3 servings of milk, yogurt and cheese a day. Two servings is sufficient for most people. Pregnant or breastfeeding women, teenagers and young adults to age 24 need 3 servings a day. One cup of milk or yogurt counts as a serving as does 1 1/2 ounces of natural cheese or 2 ounces of processed cheese.

To make wise choices from the Milk, Yogurt and Cheese group, follow these selection tips:

- \* Choose skim milk and nonfat yogurt often. They are lowest in fat.
- \* 1 1/2 to 2 ounces of cheese and 8 ounces of yogurt count as a serving from this group because they supply the same amount of calcium as 1 cup of milk.
- \* Cottage Cheese is lower in calcium than most cheeses. One cup of cottage cheese counts as only 1/2 servings of milk.
- \* Go easy on high fat cheese and ice cream. They can add a lot of fat, especially saturated fat, to your diet.
- \* Choose "part Skim" or low fat cheese when available and lower fat milk desserts, like ice milk or frozen yogurt.

nutrients you need and at the same time the right amount of calories to maintain a healthy weight. Following this general guide lets you choose a healthful diet that's right for you.

**BREAD, CEREAL, RICE AND PASTS—LAYING THE FOUNDATION FOR A HEALTHY DIET**

One of the best ways to celebrate March which is National Nutrition Month is by learning to eat healthfully by using the new USDA pyramid.

According to Webster, a pyramid is "an immaterial structure built on a broad supporting base and narrowing gradually to an apex." In the case of the food pyramid, it represents a general guide to selecting a healthful diet from a variety of foods to obtain all the nutrients allotted and calories needed to stay healthy. Specifically you can see that the most graphic space is allowed to the Bread/Cereal/Rice/Pasta group to emphasize that 6 to 11



servings are needed daily depending on your age, size and activity level. You can obtain the recommended servings through wise selections such as:

- \* Whole grain choices for increased fiber.
  - \* Servings made with less sugar and fat (bagel, English muffin, etc.)
  - \* Less from baked goods made with flour (cakes, pies, etc.) and ordinarily higher in fat and sugar.
  - \* Reduce fat and sugar added as spreads.
  - \* Pastas with sauces with only half the butter or margarine and using skim milk to replace whole milk.
- One serving would be as follows:

Bread—1 slice, Hamburger—1/2 bun; English muffin—1/2; Small roll, biscuit or muffin—1; Cooked cereal—1/2 cup; Dry cereal—1 ounce.

Many people believe that eating bread and cereals make you fat. For most of us, that is not true. It's usually all the butter, cream cheese and sugars added to breads/cereals that adds extra calories. One serving from this group provides about 80 calories.

Why are whole grain and enriched bread and cereal products an important part of a balanced diet? To provide the following nutrients:

- \* Complex carbohydrates (starches) to provide energy in lower fat diets recommended by various health organizations.
  - \* Fiber to provide bulk and to help body eliminate wastes
  - \* B vitamins: Thiamin, riboflavin, folic acid
  - \* Minerals: iron, magnesium, zinc
- Remember that laying a strong foundation by eating 6 to 11 servings from the Bread/Cereal/Rice/Pasta group daily will help to supply your body's energy and nutritional needs. So celebrate National Nutrition Month by wise selection from the USDA Pyramid daily.

**FRUITS: A NATURAL SWEET**

Fruits, often called nature's sweet, are an important part of a healthy diet. According to surveys, most people eat fresh fruit for snacks; and the banana is the most popular fruit in America, followed by apples and seedless grapes.

The USDA Food Guide Pyramid recommends two to four servings of fruit each day. For most, that's easy to do because fruit is so popular and makes such a handy snack when eaten fresh. Because it's also naturally sweet, it can serve as a dessert, substituting for higher fat and calorie-laden desserts.

Fruit gives a quick source of energy in the form of carbohydrate. Fruits and fruit juices also provide important amounts of vitamins A and C and potassium. They are low in fat and sodium. Some fruits provide a good amount of fiber, including apples, berries, figs, pears, peaches and prunes.

Serving sizes are important when interpreting the Food Guide recommendations. A serving size is a particular amount of foods, not just the number of times it is eaten per day. For example, a serving size of fruit would be a small to medium orange or banana or half of a large banana, one-half cup chopped, cooked or canned fruit; and three-fourths cup juice. When selecting juices, only 100 percent fruit juice products are considered a serving. Other products such as fruit punches, ades or sodas contain only a little juice and added sugar. Fruit jellies also do not qualify.

Other tips for including fruits in the diet follow:

- \* Include many forms. Choose fresh fruit, fruit juice and frozen, canned or dried fruit. Go easy on fruit canned or frozen in syrup or sugar. Read the labels for content.
  - \* Include whole fruits. They are higher in fiber than fruit juices.
  - \* Include citrus fruits, melons and berries because they are rich in vitamin C. We need vitamin C each day because the body does not store it.
  - \* Always wash fresh fruits before preparing or eating to remove any surface dirt, residue or bacteria.
- Capitalize on the richness and versatility of fruits by including them in meals and snacks.

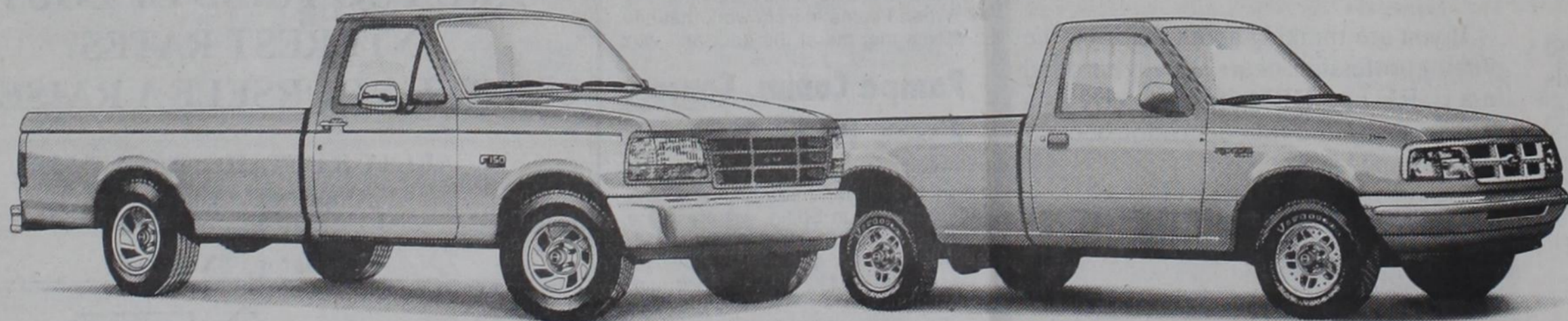

Thousands of acres of lovegrass have been planted in the past because it is suited to Wheeler County. Lovegrass produces large amounts of forage and grows well on sandy soil.

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One problem with lovegrass is that it tends to become clumpy and unproductive. One of the most effective and cheapest methods of correcting this problem is with a prescribed fire. A prescribed fire removes clumps and allows young grass to grow.

Certain guidelines must be met to insure maximum safety and maximum benefits.

1. Wind speed/direction — Winds should be steady and between 6 and 10 m.p.h. A prescribed fire should never be undertaken if winds are forecast to be greater than 15 m.p.h. The winds should be blowing away from highways, houses, or other hazardous areas.

2. Air temperature — Temperatures should be between 40 and 60 degrees with maximum temperatures less than 70.

3. Fireguards — Fireguards should be at least 8 ft. wide and all vegetation should be removed, either by plowing or blading.

4. Soil moisture — Soil should be moist with good subsoil moisture. Young grass should be emerging from old clumps and be 1 to 4 inches tall.

5. Relative humidity — Relative humidity should be between 50% to 65%. Local radio or T.V. stations can usually provide these figures.

6. Equipment/personnel — All equipment should be in good working order and every person involved should know his responsibility.

7. Structures — Structures such as fuel tanks, implements, buildings, fences, and utilities should be protected by removal or plowing fireguards around each structure. Special attention must be focused on overhead wires since the heat generated by a fire can melt insulation.

Neighbors, local fire departments, and the sheriff's office should be notified before a fire is ignited. By state law, the Texas Air Control Board must be notified of the proposed burn and permission granted before the burn is conducted. The regional office is located in Lubbock; the phone number is 796-3494.

Prescribed fire is a management tool just like tractors, hammers, or power saws are tools. Any tool can be dangerous when not used properly. Extreme caution must be used with a prescribed fire since lives and property are at stake when a fire gets out of hand.

If you have questions concerning prescribed fire or other conservation practices, contact your local Soil Conservation Service at 826-3565. The Soil Conservation Service does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, sex, age, handicap, religion, or national origin.

## Single Family Housing Repair Loans Offered

Rural Housing Repair Loans for applicants with incomes of less than \$10,000 per year are available through County Offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHa), Johnny W. Earp, FmHa County Supervisor, said today.

Loans may be made to repair homes, located in rural areas, to bring them up to standards. Homes which are brought up to standards are considered to be structurally sound and functionally adequate after the repairs are made. The homes must meet the needs of the family and provide decent, safe, and sanitary living conditions after the loan is closed. In addition, the houses may lack some equipment or features such as a complete bath, kitchen cabinets, closets, or be completely finished in some rooms. To be eligible, an applicant must have an income of \$10,000 or less per year, own the home and either presently occupy or will occupy the home after the repairs are made, and have a net worth less than \$7,500 or, for an elderly family, less than \$10,000.

Interest rates for applicants with incomes of less than \$5,000 to \$7,000 will pay 3 percent. The loan will be made for a period of 25 years. The maximum amount of the loan is \$10,000.

The Farmers Home Administration assists rural America by providing temporary, supervised direct loans to farm and housing borrowers who have a reasonable rates and terms by commercial sources. The Agency is committed to excellence in providing its services.

"Applications for assistance may be obtained at the Farmers Home Administration office located at 1224 N. Hobart, in Pampa," FmHa County Supervisor said. The FmHa office in the NBC Plaza Building, Suite 102, is open from 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. Monday through Friday.

**From the Minister's Desk:**  
 In a recent issue of People magazine there was an article that was entitled, "Teen Sex". This article contained some alarming information. For example, it reported: "In America 3,000 adolescents became pregnant each day. A million a year. Four out of five are unmarried." Such information was reported in this article, emphasizing that many American teenagers are sexually promiscuous.

While this information was alarming the response that the article recommended to this promiscuity was also alarming. According to this article, parents should teach their children about "safe sex" which basically consists of the use of some method of birth control. Is this the only option that parents have?

Perhaps an answer to this question can be found in the Old Testament biography of Joseph. According to this biography, Joseph was the favorite son of Jacob, causing his brothers to be extremely jealous of him. Their jealousy eventually led them to sell Joseph to a band of Ishmealites, who sold him to Potiphar, the officer of Pharaoh's bodyguards.

Joseph eventually found favor with Potiphar and was given the complete responsibility of the household of Potiphar. The biography then reports that Potiphar's wife "looked with desire at Joseph" and persistently urged him to "lie" with her. But Joseph steadfastly refused saying: "—Can I do this great wickedness, and sin against God?" (Genesis 39:9)

Notice that Joseph used the "s" word—Sin. Joseph recognized that sexual promiscuity was a sin. This fact should also be recognized by some parents. The New Testament contains several texts which plainly teach that sex between people who are not married to each other is a sin. For example, Hebrews 13:4 says: "Let marriage be held in honor among all, and let the marriage bed be undefiled; for fornicators and adulterers God will judge." Sex is a God-given privilege of marriage and when it is practiced outside of marriage it is a sin.

The solution for teenage sexual promiscuity is for parents to teach their teenagers that "safe sex" is more than birth control. Rather they should teach them that sex is safe when it is practiced by people who are married to each other.
