Heritage Beef Cattle Wins Environmental Award

Heritage Beef Cattle Company of Wheeler, a feedyard with a long history of protecting and improving the environment has won the Texas CattleWomen's Environmental Stewardship award for 1993. The award recognizes Texas beef producers whose natural resource stewardship practices contribute to a better environment.

The feeding company won this year's award based on its 25-year record for introducing environmental innovations to its operation. Among the many ecological programs pioneered by the company have been eliminating the use of chemicals, recycling all waste products that are generated by finishing beef cattle and introducing parasitic wasps for fly control.

The 30,000 head capacity feedyard company is owned by Joe R. Weatherly of Wheeler, who also serves as its president, and Heinz Prechter of Detroit, Michigan, Rodney Weatherly is the feedyard manager.

President Weatherly says, "We started this feedyard back when environmentalism wasn't talked about. But when we started it we were determined not to pollute anyone's land and to make the soil better than it was when we started. It was just our way of doing business, and we found it profitable to do it that way."

Weatherly says the land around Wheeler is made up of poor soil that needs fertilization to generate plant growth. As is required of all feedyards by state and federal regulations, Heritage Beef Cattle must dispose of its manure and wastewater. Also, like other feedyards, Heritage does this by having its employees collect the manure from the feedlot pens and spread it in measured amounts on nearby cropland to grow grasses, A gravity

Ledbetter Receives MBP At K101 Classic Bowl

Wheeler's Joe Dan Ledbetter was recently named Most Valuable Player in the fifth annual K101 Classic Bowl held in Woodward. The Classic Bowl is an attempt to gather the best graduating high school Senior football players in the area for one spectacular game.

Ledbetter, representing the West, ran the ball 20 times for 138 yards and scored once, leading his team to a startling 32-3 victory over the East. Joining Ledbetter was Scott Pittman of Perryton who added two touch downs to secure the third victory for the West in the game's five-year history.

While the East offense spent much of the game sputtering, the West was able to control the football with the consistent yardage gained by Pittman and Ledbetter. In addition, the West was able to move the ball through the air, primarily with the Woodward-Shattuck connection of Clint Lillard to Josh Weese.

Although the West was not able to convert extra many extra points, they established command early, and penetrated to the East 19 on their initial possession before two incomplete passes stopped the drive.

After a punt the West was back at it again. Lillard hit Weese for 19 yards to start a big drive that eventually reached the East 11 before Casey Bell of Fairview sacked Lillard on a third and 12, putting a stop to the threat.

After another futile effort by the East, the West again powered down the field, this time with a 12 yard pass from Ledbetter and a 20 yard run from Lillard to Weese.

Eight plays later Pittman hammered over from the one. Lillard added the conversion for an 8-0 lead.

Soon the score was 14-0 after a fumble by the East quarterback and a recovery by the West's Ryan Hilton, who had two fumble recoveries and several other big hits. Two runs netted six yards, followed by an 11-yard scoring pass from Chad Phillips of Booker to Weese.

The West's domination became evident as the second half progressed. Lillard's one-yard run capped a 76-yard drive for a 20-3 West lead at 1:34 of the third period.

The fourth quarter held two more touchdowns for the West. Phillips found a seam on the veer option and went 40 yards to the East one. Ledbetter hammered over on the next play.

Two plays later Pittman got free for a 15-yard scoring play to make the final 32-3.

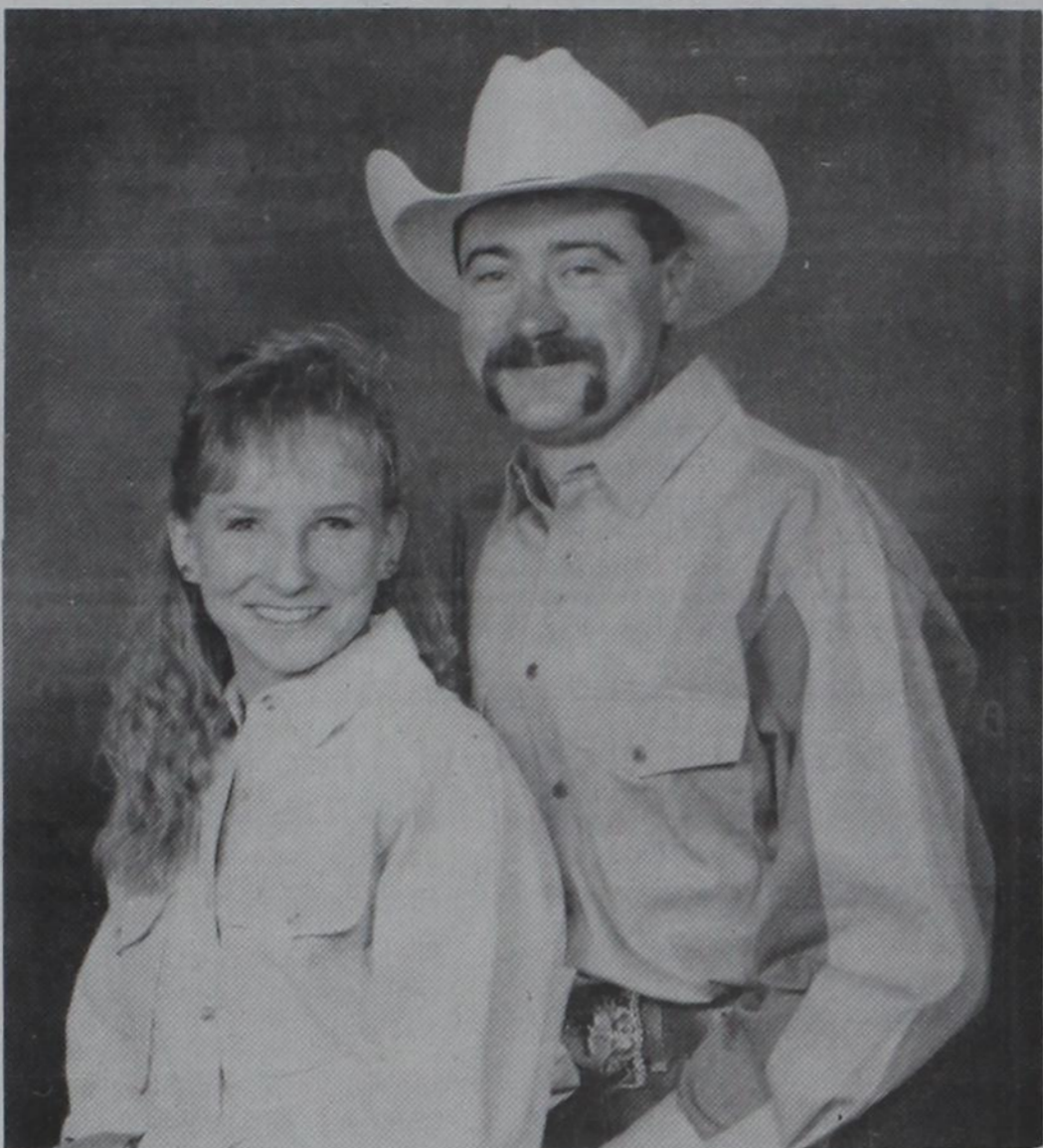

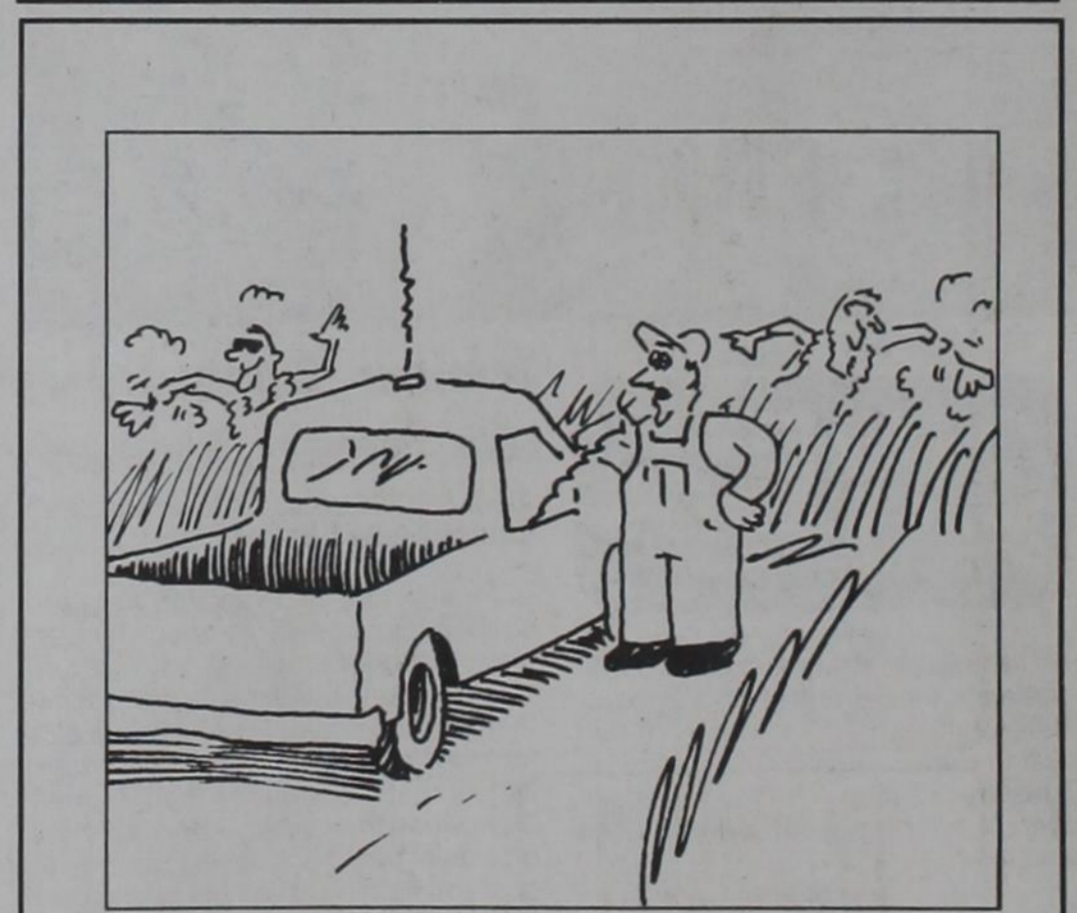

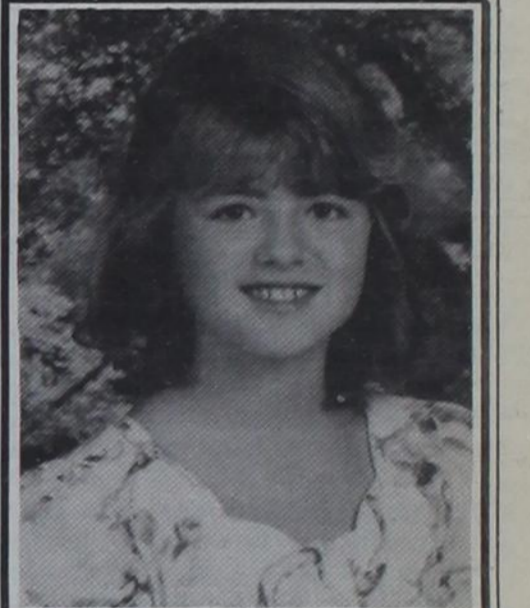

WHERE ARE YOU GOING WHEN YOU DIE?

When I was a senior in high school, a friend of mine and I presented the morning devotion over the intercom at Amarillo High School. After a short while, the principal wasn't comfortable with us. We never had any complaints from students, but he decided that we should not mention the name of Jesus in those devotions. Also he told us that we were "hitting the kids too hard". He thought we were making them think they were going to hell. More than likely, most of them were. Everybody is going somewhere. When you die, you will not cease to exist. The Bible declares with great clarity that all departed souls exist in Heaven or Hell. There is no intermediate place taught in Scripture.


Heaven is a prepared place for a prepared people. Hell is a place where unprepared people go. It is not something that is just my idea or just a teaching of my church. The book of Luke in the Bible says that a beggar that was often by a rich man's gate died and was carried by angels to Paradise. It says the rich man also died and went to Hell. Jesus is the one who told this story, and he said the rich man who never prepared to die though he lived lavishly every day was in torment in Hell. He regretted the fact that he didn't prepare for eternity, but it was too late.

Hell is too hot and eternity is too long for assumptions to be made about your eternal destiny. I am amazed at how casual many people are about where they are going when they die. So many people are erroneously thinking that because they are a church member or because they have been baptized, they are going to Heaven. Jesus Christ said that you must be born again. You do not become born again by joining a church or by being baptized alone. Coming to Jesus is what saves a man, woman, boy or girl, not coming to a church. Too many people say when asked the question of their soul's condition, "I hope I'm ready." Hoping you are ready when you have never come to God to get ready won't make you ready.

If you haven't come to Jesus and confessed Him as Lord of your life believing in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you are not saved and won't go to Heaven even if you are a deacon or a preacher. You may be ever so faithful go to church. You may be a heavy contributor. You may be an important person in your church that can start or stop whatever is going on that you don't like, but if you haven't given your life to Jesus Christ, you are just as lost as the rapist, the murderer, or the homosexual. God is not impressed by the things that you do or your standing in the community. We receive salvation on His terms, not ours.

Where are you going when you die? When you do die, almost all of us will say nice things about you. We will remember the things that we liked about you. The preacher may try to bring comfort to the family and your friends by telling them what a good person you were and that you are in a better place and better conditions, but if you are not saved, no amount of nice sermons or compliments will help you, I imagine there are many folks in Hell that were planning on getting their lives right with God someday. But they waited too long. What are you going to do?

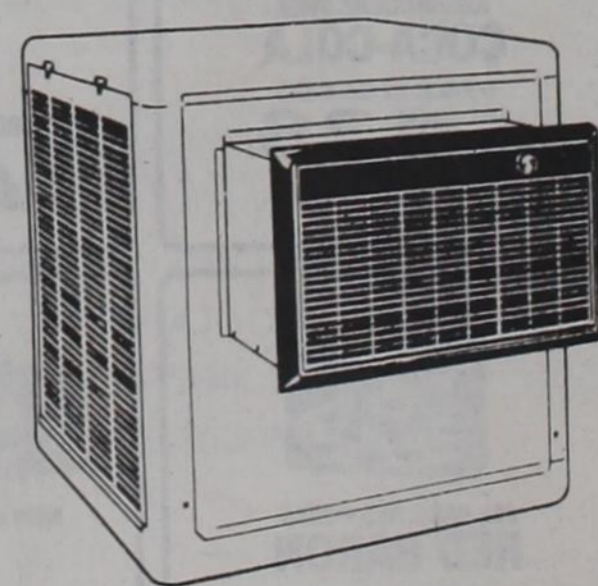

CALCIUM IN DIET IMPORTANT IN PREVENTION OF OSTEOPOROSIS

Unknown to most, the body contains more calcium than any other mineral.

About 99 percent of calcium in the body is found in the bones and teeth. The skeleton stores calcium. When calcium levels in the blood get low, extra calcium is withdrawn from the skeleton. When there is more calcium in blood, the excess is deposited in the skeleton. Mineralization (making bones strong by putting in calcium and phosphorus) and demineralization (removing calcium and phosphorus from bones) is an ongoing process.

Calcium needs vary throughout life and are controlled through absorption. Factors affecting absorption include phosphorus levels, presence of vitamin D and calcium-phosphorus ratios, etc.

Other factors such as excessive fat in the diet, overuse of laxatives or vitamin-mineral supplements, diarrhea and lack of exercise can affect absorption. Insoluble salt compounds can form when calcium in food is combined with cocoa, beet greens, spinach, Swiss chard, rhubarb, and whole grain cereals. These foods also contribute valuable nutrients so their total effect on calcium absorption probably is not significant. Concern should be only if these foods are eaten in large amounts and sources of calcium are very limited.

It is advisable to maintain a constant calcium-phosphorus ratio of 1:1 or 2:1. Ways to achieve this are by eating a well-balanced diet based on the USDA Food Guide Pyramid.

Include more calcium rich foods in combination with other recommended foods to make a difference in your overall good health and well-being.

Osteoporosis is a significant health problem in the United States today. This clinical disorder is characterized by a decrease in total bone mass without any change in its chemical composition. This metabolic disorder is characterized by bone decalcification, increased porosity and weakening of bony structure to such an extent that fractures occur under minor injuries. Many people do not realize they have this disorder until the bone loss is noticed on x-ray.

This undesirable disease occurs in both men and in women during middle and old age, but is more prevalent in women.

Although the causes of this disease are complex, beliefs exist that lack of calcium in diets over long periods of time may have a definite effect on the development of this disease.

Since June in national dairy month, start now by drinking at least two servings of milk daily for adults. Select skim milk or 1/2 percent milk and save about 60 calories without sacrificing the calcium content.

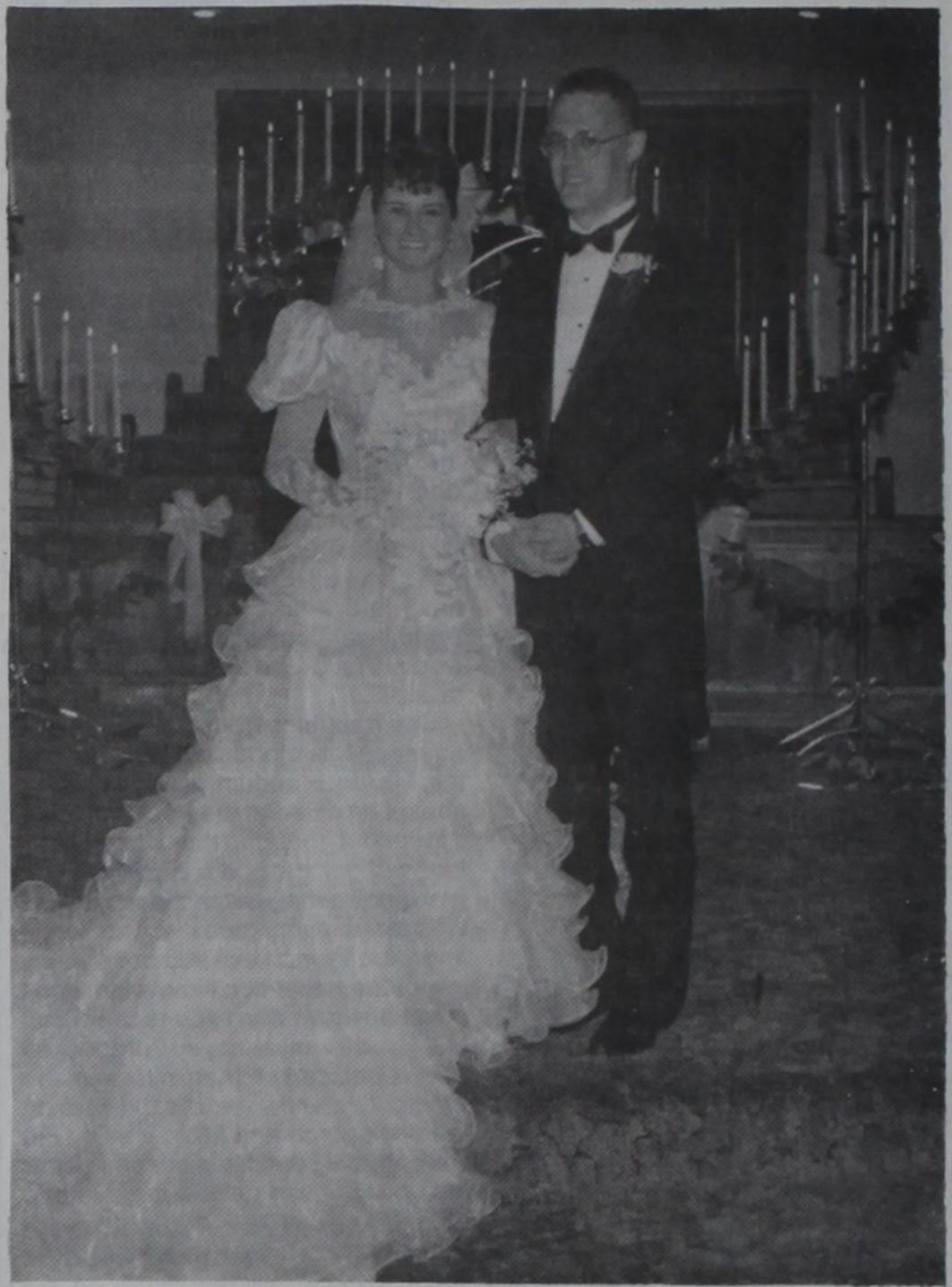

TRUTH IN SAVINGS TAKES EFFECT JUNE 21

It should be easier to compare rates for bank certificates of deposit and money-market and savings accounts when the new Truth in Savings Law goes into effect June 21.

The law will require financial institutions to disclose the same standardized rate in their advertisements—the Annual Percentage Yield (APY). This will mean that the higher the advertised APY, the better the rate. No exceptions or special rules will prevail, so it will be a little easier to shop for the highest rate.

The law will also require that ads for "free checking" to really offer free checking, with no strings attached. Because of Truth in Savings, financial institutions must pay interest on the full balance in the account each day, not just the lowest balance for the month or on the "investable balance". Credit unions will have until 1994 to begin paying dividends on the full balance.

Although the law will help consumers compare savings and loan associations and credit unions, it will not apply to interest-bearing securities such as bonds or money-market mutual funds. This will make comparisons across different types of savings products more difficult for consumers.

water more efficiently than the sandy soil of the area. In addition, weed killers are not needed; what weeds do grow are controlled through grazing and mechanical means.

Through their operation Heritage has turned 5,000 acres of unproductive land into fertile cropland for grazing, hay production and wildlife. The grasses on the converted land allow the feedyard to put 150 to 300 pounds of additional weight on cattle before they enter the feeding pens, lowering the breakeven costs of feeding for the company's customers.

From the Minister's Desk:

In 1980 when I became the minister of the Downtown Church of Christ in Lamesa, a retired minister, O. H. Tabor, was a member of the Downtown congregation. During the five years that I served as the minister of the Downtown congregation, he and I developed a close friendship.

For this reason, I was deeply grieved when I learned that he had died last week. As I reflected upon my friendship with him, I remembered a bulletin article that had been written by Charles Hodge, another minister who is a close friend of mine. This article is entitled, "Godliness Versus Glamour" and it says:

"I know a refreshing preacher! He is happy preaching and is not interested in any other life. He has no hobbies but to preach. Humble, willing, and prayerful, he is simply a godly man."

"But he is an unknown—one not in great demand. Why? He lacks that ingredient that people are deceived with—glamour! His name does not draw a crowd or provoke adulation from people. Although well educated, he does not have a degree. He is a dynamic preacher, but he does not have the soft dignified polish of glamorous preachers. He did not politic, name-drop, or push himself."

"I often read that there is a shortage of preachers. I think that there is a shortage of preachers like this preacher—men who are more concerned with godliness than glamour."

O. H. Tabor was a godly preacher not a glamour preacher. I am very thankful that I knew him. He was a close and trusted friend. I shall miss him.
