Farmers To Be Part of Ag. Surven

The Department of Agriculture will be calling on several area farmers and ranchers over the next few weeks asking them to take part in a major agricultural survey. During the survey, LaVene Holcomb will be working as an official enumerator collecting data. Local farmers and ranchers are among the more than 125,000 farmers and ranchers selected by sampling procedures to participate in the annual June Agricultural Survey conducted by the U.S. Department of Agricultural Statistics Service. The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service in Austin, the local arm of the service, is handling the Texas portion of the survey. "The information gathered will be used to make State, regional and national estimates of crop acreage, grain stocks, livestock inventories and number of farms and land in farms," said Dennis Findley, State Statistician. Findley added that USDA and university economists, extension agent, farm organizations, lenders, and other depend on the information. "In addition, Federal and State agricultural officials base many of their decisions on the results of this survey," he said, "as well as farmers and ranchers who rely on these estimates to reach production, marketing, and investment decisions." It is therefore important for area farmers to participate in the survey to ensure that local agriculture is reflected accurately in the results. Most farmers selected for interviews have already been notified by mail. "Responses to survey questionnaires are kept strictly confidential," LaVene said. Data about an individual farm or ranch are used only in conjunction with reports from other producers. USDA will analyze the results and begin reporting the findings in the next few weeks. From The Minister's Desk:

During his administration, President Ford was described by a Washington Lobbyist as "superbly average". In my opinion, such a description would not be a compliment. If a person is average, there are many people above him and there are many people below him. An average person is in the middle which means that he is either the sorriest of the best or he is the best of the sorriest.

For the last several years, it would seem that more and more people are willing to excel! But when we get sick, we want to be treated by an excellent doctor not an average doctor. When we need legal counsel, we want to be represented by an excellent lawyer not an average lawyer. In times of crisis, we do not want the average person. Rather we want the person who has excelled.

Perhaps the most pressing need of our world is for people to excel, refusing to be average or even superbly average. A poem was recently published in the Texas Lone Star, the monthly magazine of Texas Association of School Boards, which clearly emphasized the importance of excellence. This poem was entitled, "A Pretty Good Student" and it said:--

"There once was a pretty good student,
Who sat in a pretty good class
And was taught by a pretty good teacher,
Who always let pretty good pass."

"He wasn't terrific at reading,
He wasn't a whiz-bang at math.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

50-195 (1-92)
[41-70]

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 101 E. Texas (Courthouse square) Wheeler, Texas

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at Wheeler County Central Appraisal District, P.O. Box 1200, Wheeler, TX; Ph. 806/826-5900. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at 4301 Westbank Drive, Bouding B, Suite 100, Austin, Texas 78746-6565.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

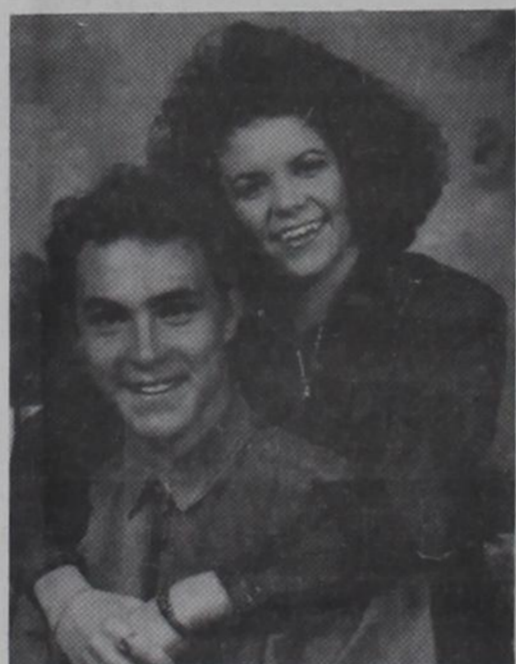
Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

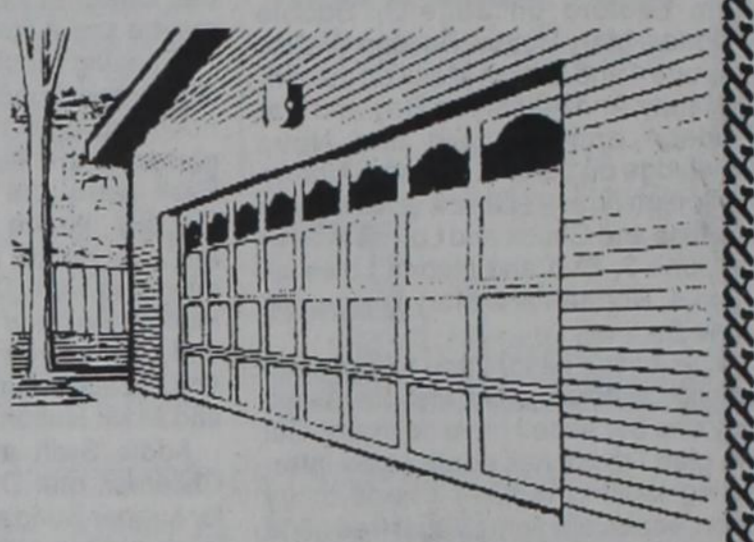
