



County Farmers Need To Maintain Terrace Systems

Terrace Maintenance is defined as the restoring of terraces to the original design dimensions. The maintenance includes the terrace height, channel capacity, end blocks, and outlets (for graded terraces). To function as designed, all terraces require periodic maintenance in order to store runoff or to move runoff to a safe outlet. Proper maintenance reduces soil erosion and improves water quality by reducing sediment.

Several farms in the county have terrace maintenance as part of their Food Security ACT (FSA) plan. The maintenance is scheduled each year when the terraces are too low to function properly or when heavy rains cause a terrace to break. If a farm is spot-checked that has terrace maintenance scheduled, the terraces must be of adequate height or the farm will be found in violation.

There is cost-share available for the construction of new terraces or if the terraces are determined to be nonrepairable. Cost-share is limited, however, on a priority basis. If a farm is found in violation, the producer will be required to construct or rebuild terraces without cost-share.

If any farmer has questions concerning his plan, of is assistance is needed to design a terrace, he should contact the Soil Conservation Service. The Soil Conservation Service. The Bible says that by the fear of the Lord your days shall be multiplied, and the years of your life shall be increased. That is in Proverbs 9:11. God said in Proverbs 3:1-2 that if we would keep His commandments that length of days and long life along with peace would be added to us. In Psalm 91:16, the Lord said that He would satisfy is with long life. Ephesians 6:2-3 declares that if we would honor our father and mother that it would be well with us and that we would live long on the earth. 

It is a fact that, in these days of AIDS and other transmittable diseases, most people facing surgery and the possiblity of a blood transfusion are concerned whether or not the blood they receive is safe.


Talton L. Francis, FACHE, administrator at Great Plains Regional Medical Center in Elk City, Oklahoma states that there are alternatives available at the hospital for those that must encounter this situation. Francis states, "We have three different ways in which a patient can be assured they are receiving the safest blood possible. The first is called Autologous Blood Transfusion in which the patient may donate their own blood prior to surgery, if there is adequate time, and then receive their own blood back, if needed, during surgery.

"The second means of blood transfusion is called Donor Directed Transfusion whereby afriend or family member may donate blood before surgery, again if there is adequate time, and the patient would receive the friend's or family member's blood."

"Another choice available for some surgeries is called Cell Saver where the patient can have their own blood saved during surgery and then receive their own blood back."

Joe Coker, M.D., Urologist, added the hospital was trying to make the blood supply as safe for the patient as possible.

Francis encourages those that have questions about alternative blood transfusions to talk to their doctor or contact Sandy Wheeler, RN, or Mike Coym, MT, ASCP at the hospital.
