Classes of '65-'69—Bobby Ware and Denise will be hosts for a class party at their residence at 200 E. Eleventh on Saturday evening.

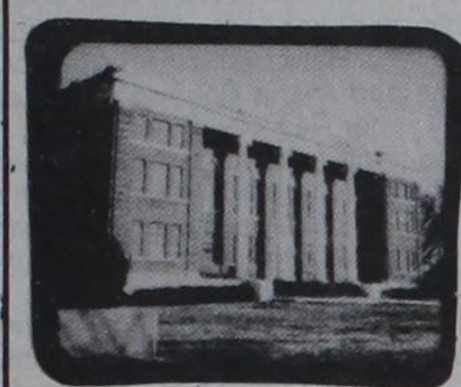
Classes of '60-'65—Gwen Barnes McCain and Bob will host a party at their residence, 910 S. Alan L. Bean Blvd. Saturday evening.

It is a fact that, in these days of AIDS and other transmittable diseases, most people fearing surgery and the possibility of a blood transfusion are concerned whether or not the blood they receive is safe.

Talton L. Francis, FACHE, administrator at Great Plains Regional Medical Center in Elk City, Oklahoma states that there are alternatives available at the hospital for those that must encounter this situation. Francis states, "We have three different ways in which a patient can be assured they are receiving the safest blood possible. The first is called Autologous Blood Transfusion in which the patient may donate their own blood prior to surgery, if there is adequate time, and then receive their own blood back, if needed, during surgery.

"The second means of blood transfusion is called Donor Directed Transfusion whereby a friend or family member may donate blood before surgery, again if there is adequate time, and the patient would receive the friend's or family member's blood."

"Another choice available for some surgeries is called Cell Saver where the patient can have their own blood saved during surgery and then receive their own blood back."

Joe Coker, M.D., Urologist, added the hospital was trying to make the blood supply as safe for the patient as possible.

Francis encourages those that have questions about alternative blood transfusions to talk to their doctor or contact Sandy Wheeler, RN, or Mike Coym, MT, ASCP at the hospital.
