

"The church? We are still the salt of the earth and the light of the world. We tend to forget. We don't win if our president; we don't lose when he is not. Back to basics. Back to fundamentals. Back to the Book (Bible). To save the world the church must first be the church. Revival, reformation begin with the church--not the world."







Terraces have played a very important role to conservation. A terrace is defined as a series of ridges constructed across the slope to prevent excess water erosion. Terraces have been around Wheeler County for a very long time. Terraces are somewhat like a monument to conserva-

Primary purpose for a terrace (1) Reduce slope length (2) To divert water from gullies (3) Prevent runoff from side of hill (4) to divert water from buildings (5) to shorten slope length.

Types of terraces are: Level, Ridge and Graded. The level terrace is primary used in Wheeler County. A level terrace is used primary on

sandy soils. This terrace is built on a level grade. The ridge terrace is similar to the level terrace.

A grade terrace is used primary on the clay soils. This terrace is built on a grade. Grade terrace are not use much around this area.

Most terraces can be built with a bulldozer, motor grader or carryall. Many of the contractors used a combination of the three.

Producers, who are schedule to put terraces on their field should do so before December 31, 1994 deadline. Farmers who are participating in the Farms Programs must comply with those rules are lose their government payments. 



Staying on Target in the Age of Deception

In 2 Timothy 3:1-15, God admonished us that in the last days perilous times would come. He said that those who live godly will suffer persecution. That is happening in our country. Attacks on our Christian heritage and people freely exercising their religion are increasing. God said in that chapter of the Bible that evil men and seducers would become worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived.

In both the government and in the church, people are deceiving and being deceived. There aren't very many things that our political leaders tell us and do to us that are not covered over with deception. Taxes are called contributions. Excessive spending is called investment. Support for political pork is called patriotism. Murder of unborn babies is called the right to reproductive choice. Homosexuals are called gay. All of this is deception.

When a man runs for office and gets elected because he promises to reduce the deficit and won't raise taxes on anybody making less than \$200,000 a year, and then within a month after taking office says that he tried and couldn't do it and that now taxes must be raised on everybody making as much as \$30,000 a year because the deficit is bigger than he thought (though he acknowledged what it was in July of 1992), that is deception. When they decide that they are going to increase the spending at a little less amount than they had originally intended to, and therefore call that "reducing" spending, that is deception. How can you propose to increase spending and call it reduction just because you might make it a smaller increase? How can a man who is President say that he is there to reduce the deficit when he also produces figures that his programs will increase the deficit at more than \$200 billion annually during his term, thereby raising the national debt by almost \$1 trillion during that period of time? Deception. But deception is also widespread in the church. I am not even referring


to false teachers or teachings. A number of highly respected ministries that are really doing a wonderful job of reaching out to people engage in deceptive practices sometimes. If a preacher says God told him something to tell you when in reality he is just trying to coerce you to respond by using this idea to make himself sound more authoritative, that is deception. When a preacher uses "hot" issues of the day such as abortion or homosexuality for the purpose of fund-raising instead of focusing in on actually accomplishing something, isn't that deceptive? If a ministry comes up with a different emergency every month to try to keep people giving, isn't that deceptive if the fact is there isn't an emergency every month? When the minister sends a form letter to 5 million people and says he is thinking about and praying for them personally and hearing from God about their needs, is that deceptive?

I'm not throwing stones at anybody in particular. I am just stating that many things are happening that are not truthful in our world today inside and outside the church, inside and outside the government. I believe it could accurately be called "the age of deception." What should we do? Can we take some action that will assure ourselves that we will not be one who is deceived?

In the same chapter of the Bible (2 Timothy 3), God says that evil men will go from bad to worse, but CONTINUE THOU IN THE THINGS THAT THOU HAST LEARNED. Stay with the truth. Hold fast to Bible teachings, and teach the children. Notice if you will that verses 14 and 15 indicate that Timothy had been taught the truth and had been trained in the Scriptures since he was a child and that if he would continue in those Scriptural truths, he would be wise to salvation and would stay on target.

Read your Bible. Teach it to the children. Stay with in, and you can stay away from deception.


