City Council Discusses Expansion Of City Sewer Lines And Sets Tax Rate

Mayor Wanda Herd called the regular meeting to order.

Barbara Koelzer made motion, seconded by Mark Frankenbery to approve the minutes as written. The motion carried.

Walter Simmons made motion, seconded by Bob McCain to pay bills as presented. The motion carried.

Courtney Sharp, with PRPC met with Council and to hold Public Hearing to discuss the Community Block Grant Development Application. The City has applied for a grant to help install a sewer system to six residences on North Canadian Street.

Bob McCain made motion, seconded by Barbara Koelzer to pass a resolution authorizing the Mayor to

act as the City's executive officer and authorized representative in all matters pertaining to the City's participation in the community development program. The motion carried.

Charles Kuntz presented receipts and disbursements and discussed same.

There were two bids received on the 1984 Fort Ranger with utility bed. Mark Frankenbery made motion, seconded by Bob McCain to accept the higher bid in the amount of \$1800.00. The motion carried.

Walter Simmons made motion seconded by Bob McCain to approve the Interlocal Agreement with TML Group Benefits Risk Pool. The motion carried.

Mark Frankenbery made motion, seconded by Barbara Koelzer to set the 1993 Tax Rate at .5900/\$100. The motion carried.

Wheeler County Chief Appraiser Recertified

Chief Appraiser Larry M. Schoenhals of the Wheeler County Central Appraisal District (CAD) has been recertified as a Registered Professional Appraiser by the Texas State Board of Tax Professional Examiners.

Recertification is required every five years and is based on honorable service as well as completion of 60 or more continuing education units during that period. Schoenhals has completed in excess of 200 classroom hours in appraisal and tax law instruction along with numerous seminars.

The CAD appraises property for ad valorem tax purposes for all local taxing entities. Currently the Wheeler CAD builds tax rolls for Wheeler County, Parkview Hospital, Shamrock General Hospital, Shamrock ISD, Wheeler ISD, Kelton ISD, Ft. Elliott CISD, City of Shamrock, City of Wheeler, and Town of Mobeetie. The appraisal district includes all of Wheeler County and portions of Hemphill, Gray and Collingsworth Counties for a total area of some 1,070 square miles. The other employees of the district are Jeanine Horten, Deputy Appraiser/Bookkeeper, Bobby Jennings, Office Administration/Printing, and Peggy Ford, Division Orders/Data Entry. Mineral and utility properties are appraised under contract by Lone Star Valuations, Amarillo.

The CAD is administered by a board of directors elected by the governing boards of the entities it serves. Current members of the Wheeler CAD board of directors are: Raymond Moore, Chairman, Bobby Ware, Vice-Chairman, Olaf Sivage, Secretary, Dusty Oldham, Member, and Gary Hardcastle, Member.

LOCAL STUDENTS ATTEND CITIZENSHIP SEMINAR

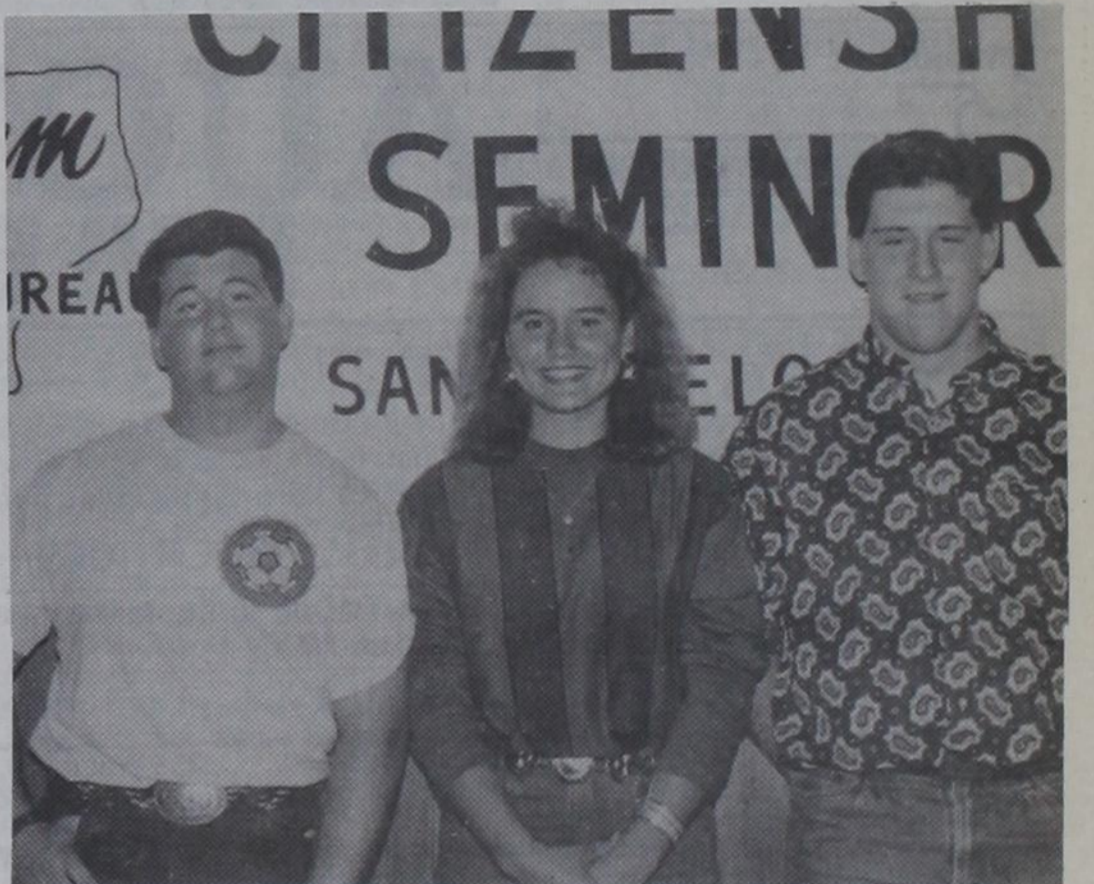

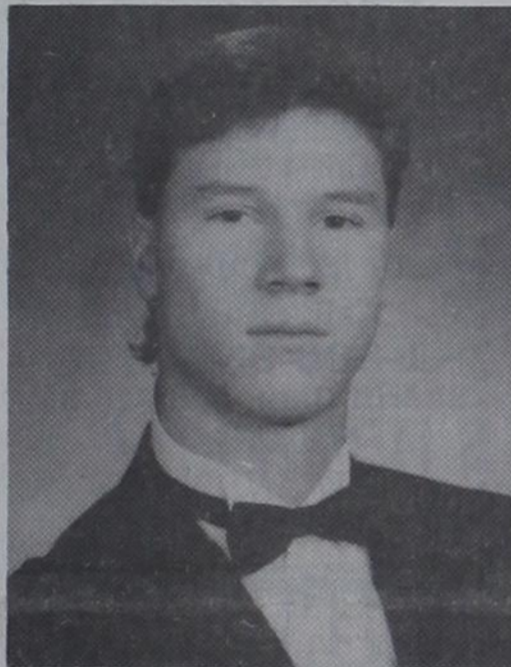

Bank Employees Charged With Illegal Activity

A couple accused of illegal activity while they were officers of the First State Bank of Mobeetie are charged in a document filed August 9 in Amarillo's U.S. District Court.

Melvin Wesley May and Helen Marie May are charged with one count of making false entries in books, reports and statements of the bank with intent to deceive the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

At the time, Melvin May was chairman of the board and president of First State Bank of Mobeetie and his wife, Helen Marie May, was the bank's executive vice president, according to the court document. The Mays also were directors and shareholders in the holding company for the bank, the document says.

The bank's board of directors voted to terminate the Mays' employment in a November 1987 board meeting, court records show. They had worked at the bank since 1970, officials said.

The Mays then filed a lawsuit against the bank and individual board members, alleging in part that they had been fired wrongfully. Attorneys familiar with the lawsuit said the suit was settled, but did not specify terms of the settlement.

PROPER CARE FOR KNITS, SWEATERS, AND BLOUSES MEANS LONGER WEAR

Proper care of blouses, sweaters and knits enables you to keep your garments looking new and get longer wear.

Turn knits, sweaters and printed t-shirts inside out to help prevent pilling and to protect the print. To prevent damage to spandex or polypropylene fabrics, avoid chlorine bleach, dryer-drying and ironing.

Garments made from these fabrics should be hand washed or machine washed using a delicate cycle and detergent, as recommended on the care label.

After hand washing sweaters and blouses, place them in the washing machine on the spin cycle for about one minute. The spin helps remove the water and reduces the drying time. Spread the garment on a clean, flat surface to dry. Use plastic hangers for air-drying damp blouses. Always line or dry flat away from the heat and sun.

This fall, knits make news in glamorous girl sweater sets, including skinny tube skirts that hit anywhere from just below the knee to just above the ankle and ankle-skimming cardigans in women's fashions. CHILDREN AND TELEVISION ADVERTISING

During the summer months, children are likely to watch even more television than during the school year. A large number of those TV ads promote toys.

Toys advertised on television often become important parts of a child's birthday and holiday "wish lists". The Federal Trade Commission has recently alerted parents to help children learn about toy ads on TV.

Although TV ads are an important source of information about toys for children, some children, especially the younger ones, may have trouble figuring out from an ad how a toy works outside its imaginary setting or whether toy parts are sold separately.

It is important to talk with children about how to understand television advertisements for toys. As with all products, toys advertised on TV are made to appear as appealing as possible. Point out to children that the purpose of advertising is to sell products. Not all information about a toy may be contained in an ad.

It is important to teach children how to evaluate toy advertisements. Some important points to consider:

Toys may exaggerate a toy's performance. A toy on TV may appear to make elaborate sounds or moves by itself when, in fact, it cannot. You could discuss how special sound effects, production techniques, camera work, or editing can be used to enhance a toy's operation. Many ads show toys being used in make-believe settings in ways that are unrepresentative of how they work in real life. You may want to help children focus on the part of an ad showing a toy's real-life operation.

Toys may require special skills or extensive practice. In some ads, toys may look easy to play with or operate. In fact they may require hours of practice before they can be used as shown. In addition, you may want to remind children that because of differing levels of skills and talents, not all toys are appropriate for all children.

Toys may not include all the pieces displayed in the ad. You may want to help a child determine what pieces actually come with a toy. Some toys may be shown with parts from more than one package while others may be depicted in elaborate play settings not readily duplicated at home. Children may want to watch and listen for such key phrases as "pieces sold separately" or "no batteries included."

Toys may have to be assembled. Toys in ads may look ready to play with when, in fact, they require assembly. In some cases, the assembly may be difficult or time-consuming. Children may want to note whether an ad states "some assembly required."

Children can learn to be skilled toy consumers. Talk with children about advertising. Encourage them to discuss with you the ads they see on TV. After you buy a toy, discuss whether it performs the way they thought it would. Ask what additional information they need about a toy before purchasing it or whether another toy would be a better buy.

As with any product, find out information about a toy before purchasing it. Carefully examine the toy and its packaging in the store or ask friends for their experiences. Try to determine how the toy actually performs. What pieces come with it, and how much assembly is required.
