GUNFIGHT RESULTS IN ARREST OF PAIR

Thirty-seven-year-old Sammy Wesley Jarvis was arraigned late Friday in Canadian on charges alleging attempted capital murder and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

The Oklahoma City Man reportedly fired a shotgun at Sheriff Jimmy Adams, stole a van from Wanda Hefley, who lives five miles north of Mobeetie, and lead the sheriff's officers on a 25-mile goose chase through Wheeler County on Friday afternoon.

Adams and his deputies initially began chasing Jarvis and another man because of their connection with an armed robbery and two burglaries in Oklahoma.

According to Adams, Jarvis, who was riding in the passenger seat of a Monte Carlo, fired at least one shotgun blast at Adams's patrol car as they raced west on Texas Highway 152 east of Wheeler.

Approximately 20 minutes later, the two men stole a van from Wanda Hefley. They later rolled the vehicle, and Jarvis reportedly pulled a 12-gauge shotgun from the van and pointed it at Adams as Adams arrived on the scene.

In response, Adams said he fired eight or nine shots from his handgun at Jarvis.

"His gun jammed," said the Sheriff, "Mine didn't." Adams added, however, that none of the shots hit Jarvis, who was about 45 to 50 yards away.

Both suspects were arrested where the van rolled, about 1 1/2 miles west of U.S. 83 in Hemphill County on Farm to Market Road 277. The suspects were then taken to Hemphill County Hospital to be treated for injuries received during the wreck.

Jarvis was treated for minor injuries and arraigned by Hemphill County Justice of the Peace Frankie Hill at the hospital. Hill said that she set bond at \$100,000 for each of his two charges. Jarvis was then taken to the Wheeler County Jail late Friday.

The other suspect, a 35-year-old

Oklahoma City man, suffered minor injuries and was expected to be transferred to an Oklahoma City hospital Friday night. Hill said the when he was released from the hospital, he would be turned over to Oklahoma authorities to face burglary and armed robbery charges.

Chief Deputy Rick Walden stated that the men had been in a Department of Corrections Facility in Sayre, Oklahoma on a work release program. "They were working on a dump ground," Walden said, "And took off from there."

According to Adams, the two men are accused of the burglary of two homes north of Sayre and the robbery of the Keatley Corner grocery store in Sweetwater, Oklahoma, about 3 p.m. Friday.

Adams said that he and deputies Joel Finsterwald and Cliff Fletcher, each in separate cars, followed the suspects for about 25 miles. Adams said that when the suspects turned north at Mobeetie, the officers lost them for a few minutes, until Wanda Hefley called the Sheriff's Department

A total of 220 gallons of homemade ice cream was dished out. The hamburger count was 800. The barbecue grill cooked 150 lbs. of brisket.

The ice cream is donated by the local citizens. Large chest type freezers are kept on trailers at the fire department. As the ice cream is made, it is placed in the freezers until the festival. The trailers with freezers are then pulled into the concession.

Registration Packets For Kindergarten Students

Registration packets for children who will be attending Wheeler ISD Kindergarten during the 1993-94 school year will become available Thursday, July 29, and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration/Emergency Card; 2. Student Health Information (A two-page questionnaire); 3. Home Language Survey. The Parent/Guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names and the child's social security number, as well as, copies of the child's official birth certificate (state copy - not hospital copy) and immunization records (authorized by doctor or official clinic), before his/her child can be enrolled in school.

The estimated length of time need to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes. Some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "traffic jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believe some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day are welcome to do so.

Kindergarten registration will be in the school cafeteria on Friday, August 13, from 9:00 a.m. until 10:00 a.m.

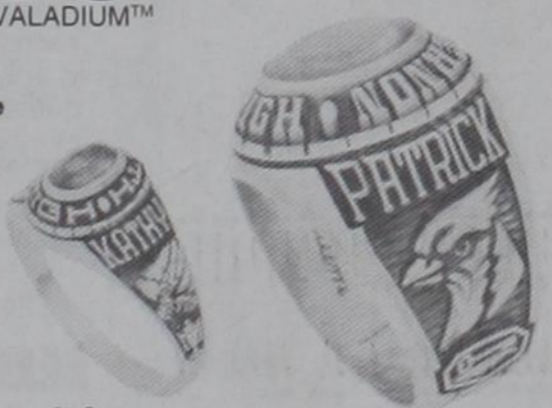

WHO WOULD HAVE THOUGHT IT

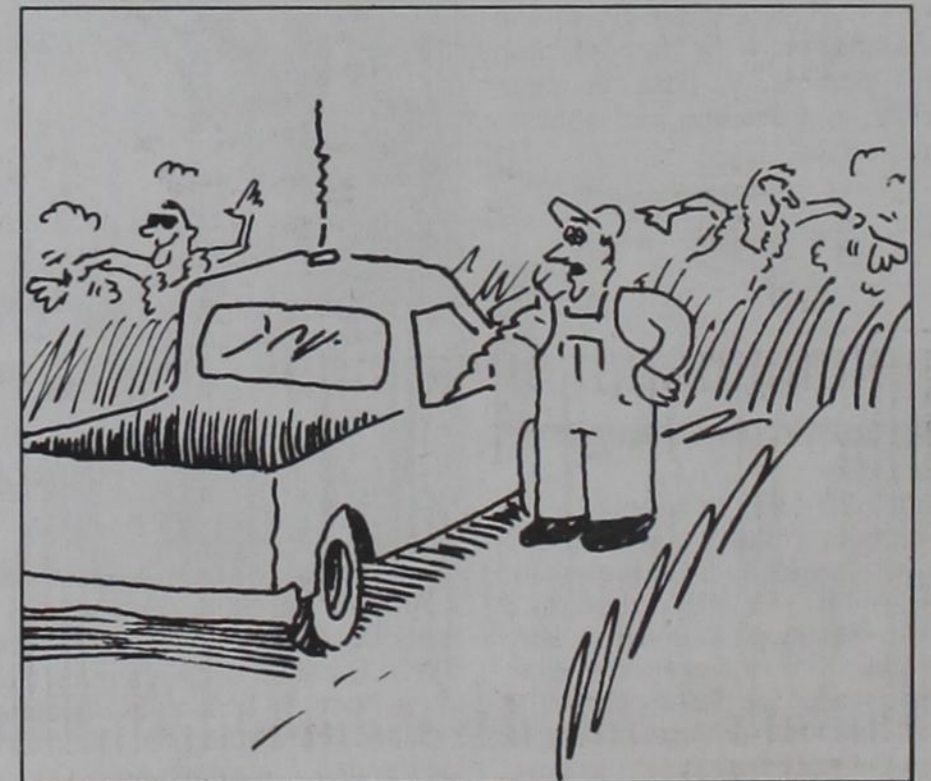
I read some verses from Psalm 93 in the Bible after the election, but prior to the Inauguration about "loods lifting up their voices". A perennial grass that cattle liked — one that withstood drought, heat, and cold — and came back from the seed and the root! What more could a farmer want? You can see the results. The same way with Kudzu. Right now it is pulling down trees and power lines in the South.

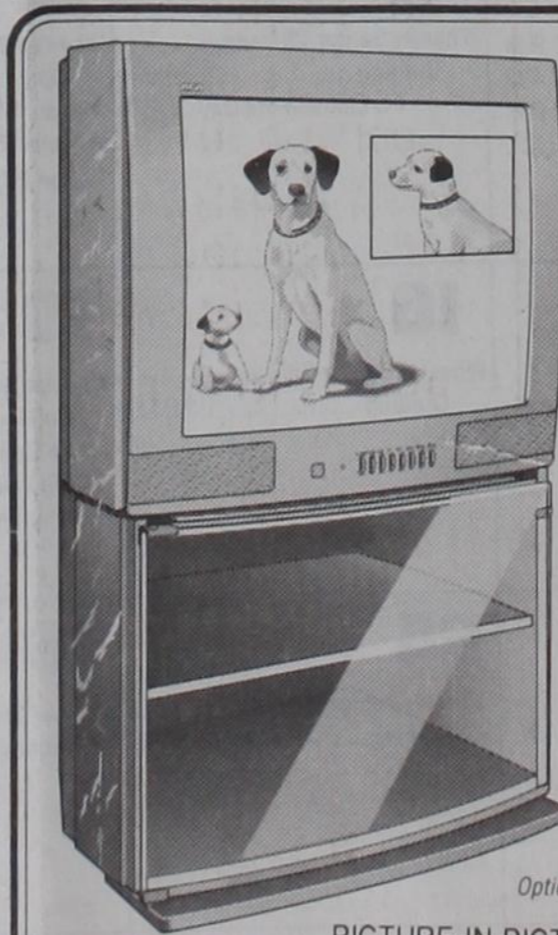
