ATTEMPTED MURDER INDICTMENTS ARE RETURNED AGAINST TWO OKLA. MEN

Indictments were returned Monday against two men by the Wheeler County Grand Jury. The men are accused of attempting to kill Wheeler County Sheriff Jimmy Adams, following a car chase through Wheeler County and ending in Hemphill County.

The two men, Sammy Wesley Jarvis and Willie Russell, were each indicted on one count of attempted capital murder—a first-degree felony and one count of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

The attempted murder charge stems from one shotgun blast fired at the Sheriff from their vehicle on July 23 as

they were being chased from just east of Wheeler, through Mobeetie and into Hemphill County. The chase stemmed from the fact the men were wanted in Oklahoma for escaping from the Department of Corrections while on a work-release program.

Jarvis attempted to fire upon Sheriff Adams a second time but the gun jammed after their stolen van was rolled, ending the chase. The van was stolen from near Mobeetie.

Jarvis, 37, and Russell, 34, are alleged to have burglarized two homes in Oklahoma after escaping from the work-release program.

Aggravated Robbery & Felony Escape

Carl Dale Graham, 24 of Chouteau, Okla., was indicted on one count of

aggravated robbery—a first degree felony, and two counts of felony escape.

Graham is accused of robbing Cantrell's Texaco in Shamrock at knife-point on June 29 and escaping twice from the Wheeler County Jail.

Three days after his arrest, Graham escaped from the exercise area of the Wheeler County Jail and was captured before he could get out of Wheeler. Graham then obtained his freedom by crawling through a small air conditioning duct into the attic of the jail. A vehicle was stolen from near Wheeler and an Oklahoma Highway Patrol vehicle later stolen before he was captured in Rogers County, Oklahoma, where he remains.

Helen And Melvin May Each Plead Guilty To False Entries

Melvin and Helen May entered a guilty plea Monday in Amarillo's U.S. District Court on one count of making false entries on bank books.

Melvin was chairman of the board and president of the First State Bank of Mobeetie and his wife, Helen was executive vice president of the bank at the time of the illegal activity. They were also directors and shareholders in the holding company for the bank. Sentencing will take place in a few weeks.

SHAMROCK FIREMEN PLEAD GUILTY TO ARSON CHARGES

Two Shamrock men are serving their time in the Wheeler County Jail after pleading guilty Monday to one count apiece of criminal conspiracy in District Court.

The men Harold Gene Kidd, the former fire marshal and his brother, Tommy Duane Kidd, a former Shamrock firefighter, were sentenced to 120 days and seven year's probation and 180 days and seven years' probation respectively. Each were fined \$1,000. Each began serving their time Monday afternoon.

The charges were reduced to criminal conspiracy, a third-degree felony, because officials could not prove how the fires were set.

Harold received the shorter sentence because he was involved in only one fire. Tommy was involved in all the fires. The charges were in con-

nection with 65 to 80 suspicious fires in Wheeler County over the past two years.

Five other individuals are facing charges of arson, a second-degree felony. They are three members of the Shamrock Fire Department: Gene Kirkland, 21; Brian Kirkland, 18, and Bradley Todd, 21. Two are Mike Walden, 18, a former member and Willie Stowe, 20.

The year long investigation began after Jerry Bob Jernigan received a tip from within the Fire Department that some volunteer firefighters were intentionally starting grass fires in the county.

The investigation revealed that as many as 80 fires had been intentionally set in Wheeler County during a two-year span. No structures were destroyed and no one was injured in the fires.

No date has been set for the five accused of arson.

Co. Sheriff's Department Arrest Two In Drug Bust

Wheeler County Sheriff's Office reported the arrest of Carrie Lee Wright, a 34-year-old female, and Samuel James Wright, 21. Carrie Wright was arrested for delivery of a controlled substance, Marijuana, and possession with intent to deliver. Sam Wright was arrested for delivery of a controlled substance.

Carrie Wright's bond was set at \$2,500 for each offense and Sam Wright's bond was set at \$1,000. Bond had not been posted at 5:00 P.M. Tuesday; they remain in Wheeler County Jail.

This drug bust was accomplished through the cooperation of the Oldham County Sheriff's Department, Shamrock Police Department, Texas Highway Patrol and Constable Jerry Bob Jernigan.

The arrests were made Sunday, August 22, at Shamrock.

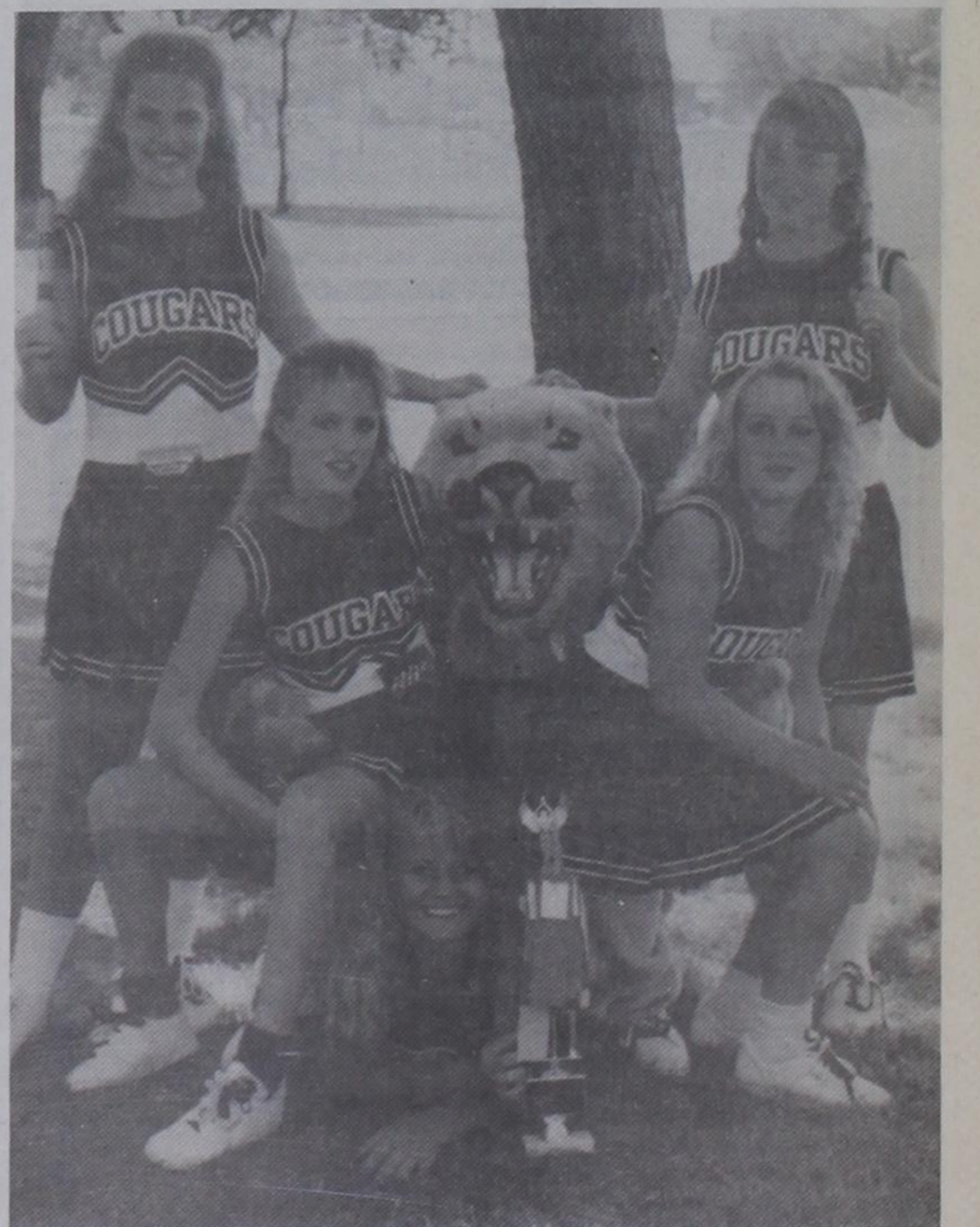

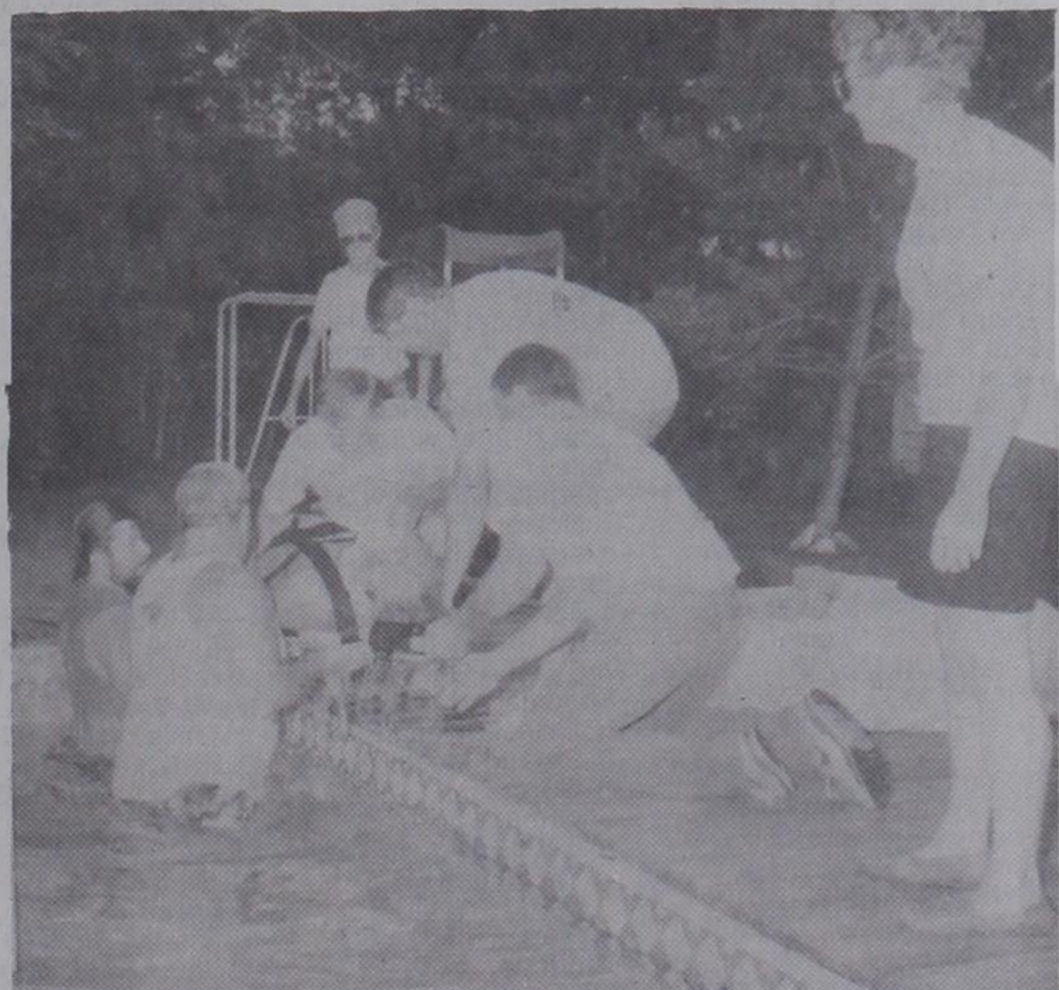

SUMMER HEAT CALLS FOR PRECAUTIONS

For millions of retired Americans, summer's dangerously high temperatures can take the good out of the "good ol' summertime."

"Heat illness can be devastating for the elderly, particularly in areas with extremely high humidity," said Dr. Janice Zimmerman, an assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "By taking the proper precautions, heat illnesses, such as heat exhaustion and heat stroke, can be prevented."

Heat exhaustion, a form of fatigue, is caused by overexposure to heat. If left untreated, it can turn into the more severe heat stroke.

Heat stroke occurs when the body becomes "overloaded" with heat. Like a broken automobile radiator, the body's heat-regulating mechanism fails due to fluid loss. As a result, the body's temperature rises and sweat production stops.

"Sweating is one of the body's important functions because it helps to cool the body through evaporation," Zimmerman said. "If the body is not cooled immediately, heat stroke can be fatal in older adults who are less active or in poor health."

Zimmerman advises watching for the early signs of heat exhaustion, such as weakness, fatigue, dizziness or dehydration.

People taking antihistamines, antidepressants, laxatives or medication for heart problems should consult their physician since many drugs cause dehydration, and prevent blood from reaching the skin's surface to cool the body.

To keep cool this summer, Zimmerman recommends the following:

—Drink water frequently, even when you are not thirsty.

—Wear loose, light-weight clothing.

—When indoors, use air conditioning or open a window and use an electric fan.

—When outdoors, enjoy the cooler hours of early morning or late evening when the humidity level is lower.

—Take frequent breaks from outdoor activity, such as gardening or walking, especially if you are sick, feel tired, or have a heart condition or other medical problem.

—Ask your family members, neighbors or others to check on you during the hot months.

"Summertime doesn't mean recreational activity has to stop," Zimmerman said. "enjoy the same things you have been doing by making allowances to protect yourself from the heat."

From the Minister's Desk:

According to Proverbs 6:16, "--a proud look--" is one of the seven things that God hates. But why? Why does God hate "--a proud look--"? Perhaps the best answer to this question is found in an article that was recently written by a good friend of mine, Charles Hodge.

This article was entitled, "The Terrible Sin Called Pride" and it said:--

"Pride! One thing a sinner cannot have--pride. The sin of sins! The heart condition that either causes or encourages all other sins. The sin of Satan! Pride is repulsive. Ego, vanity, little jerks, inflated pride makes life miserable. Pride!"

"1. Pride causes us to think too highly of ourselves. Paul addresses such a sin in Romans 12, Philippians 2. Nothing is more opposite or unlike Jesus. A preacher asked his wife, "How many great preachers are there?" Her answer, "One less than you think." All church problems result from pride--members thinking too highly of themselves. Pride blinds to reality, to truth, to right. Pride

leaves the church in shambles.

"2. Pride promotes superiority. Have you ever seen a humble legalist, a humble liberal? Party-spirited people always claim superiority. PARENTAL REFORM, A KEY TO CHILDREN'S SUCCESS IN SCHOOL

In the war against declining student achievements, many solutions have been tried. A quest for better teachers, improved texts and challenging curricula have each played a role in major battles. Yet achievement falls. Perhaps, the answer is parental reform.

Since 1965 parental involvement in education has been a victim of societal changes in America. The divorce rate, the ratio of children living in single parent families and the proportion of married mothers of young children working outside the home have all doubled. As a result, 70 percent of the parents never volunteer to participate in their children's schools.

When 24,600 eighth graders were polled, half of them reported that they rarely discuss school with their par-

ents. Half of the parents of these eighth graders reported rarely having contact with their children's schools.

When parents fail to stress the importance of education, kids tend to do what they want to do. Few of them choose educational activities. This same group of eighth graders reported that they spent 21.4 hours a week watching television, but only 5.6 hours doing homework. Only 1.8 hours were spent on outside reading. Sixty-three percent of the parents reported they rarely or never set television viewing restrictions.

Here are some things parents can do to help increase their child's success in school:

* The first step is communication. Talk regularly about current school experiences. Students who never talk to their parents about school are three times more likely to drop out of school than those who do talk with their parents.

* Restrict television viewing on school nights. Students with television restrictions are 9 percent less likely to dropout than those with no restrictions.

* Finally, provide adequate after-school supervision. Let students know what is expected of them in terms of education. Parents who expect more of their children educationally, have children who perform at least adequately in school.

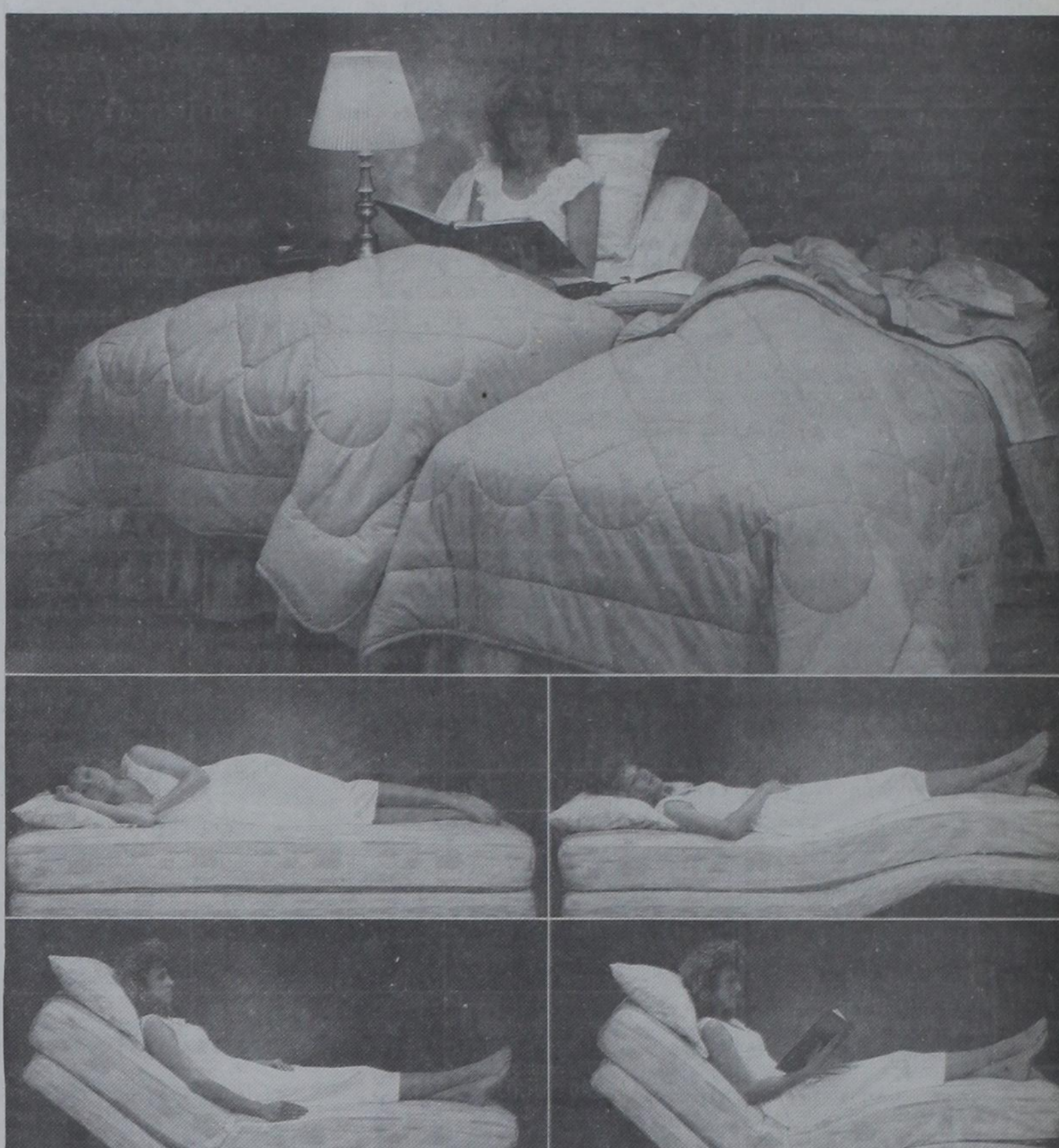

This same group of eighth graders reported that they spent 21.4 hours a week watching television, but only 5.6 hours doing homework. Only 1.8 hours were spent on outside reading. Sixty-three percent of the parents reported they rarely or never set television viewing restrictions.

CALL IT WHAT GOD CALLS IT!

Some people call sickness "God's Will". God says that sickness is "the captivity of Satan". In the book of Job, a story is told of a man who had many physical problems. Job became sick. The second chapter of the book of Job plainly says that it was Satan that smote Job with the plagues that came upon him. In chapter 42 of the same book, it says that the Lord turned the "captivity" of Job when he was healed. If God calls sickness "captivity", we had better not call it "God's will" because it is not God's will for us to be in Satan's captivity.

Some people call sickness a "blessing". Sometimes they call it a "blessing in disguise". Usually, they will point to someone who has done something great in spite of physical limitations or afflictions. I certainly think it is wonderful for people to do great things in spite of affliction. I admire their determination and work, but that doesn't prove it was God's will for them to be handicapped.

When Jesus Christ came into contact with a woman who couldn't straighten up, but was bowed over, he said she was "bound" by Satan, even though she had had the affliction for 18 years. Most of the time, people conclude that anyone who has had an affliction that long is bound to be suffering because God willed it. People often say that God knows best, and he makes the right choices. But, God never chose for you to be afflicted. His choice was made at Calvary when our sicknesses and diseases were placed by Him on Jesus Christ, our Substitute, in order to free us from them. If God calls sickness "bondage", we had better not call it "God's plan" for our lives.

God said His name is Jehovah Rapha which means "the Lord that healeth thee". If healing is part of His name, and He Himself calls sickness "captivity", "a curse", and "bondage", we would get along better and experience more healing if we would agree with Him. You can't be healed and stay healed if you choose to believe the exact opposite of what the Bible actually says.
