

NOTICE TO RESIDENTS OF THE CITY OF WHEELER AND SURROUNDING AREAS:

Due to EPA regulations, refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, and any other items containing chlorinated fluorocarbon (CFC) shall not be knowingly accepted for disposal or disposed of in any municipal solid waste facility unless all the CFC contained in that item is captured and sent to an approved CFC disposal site or recycling facility. If the CFC is not removed from the item, then the whole item must be sent to an approved CFC disposal site. Such items that enter the facility with ruptured lines or holes in the CFC unit shall not be accepted unless the generator or transporter provides written certification that the CFC has been evacuated from the unit and that it was not knowingly allowed to escape into the atmosphere.

IN OTHER WORDS, THE CITY WILL NO LONGER BE ABLE TO ACCEPT REFRIGERATORS, FREEZERS, OR REFRIGERATED AIR CONDITIONERS IN ITS DISPOSAL FACILITY.

The Wheeler Mustangs travel to Gruver Friday night to open the 1993 football campaign against the Gruver Greyhounds. Last year, a season opening loss to Gruver got the Mustangs off on the wrong foot en route to a 1-9 season.

This year's version of the Mustangs is expected to be much improved as the team returns nine starters. Last year undersized ponies are now full grown Mustangs and should be able to compete with anyone on the schedule.

The Mustangs have 44 boys out for football this year, an increase of ten over last year, which should greatly help to increase depth. In addition to being older, bigger, and more numerous, Coach Karcher feels the boys have worked hard on the weights this past summer and are considerably

stronger than last year.

On the field the most noticeable change will be Chad Dunham moving from quarterback to runningback with Heath Sabbe moving into the quarterback role. Jason Hink and Ashley Brownfield are expected to spit the fullback job with Jarrod Ledbetter, stepping into big brother, Joe Dan's shoes as wingback.

Gruver will not be an easy opener for Wheeler as the Greyhounds return 8 offensive and 5 defensive starters off last year's 5-4 team. Coach Karcher feels the loss the Mustangs suffered against Gruver last year set the tone for last year's season. To avoid a repeat of this, he feels the Mustangs need to get off to a good start to establish the Wheeler winning tradition once again this year.

Local Hospice Classes Offered By Clarendon College

Enrollment has opened for "Hospice Approach to Living & Dying," a 30-hour course offered by Clarendon College—Pampa Center for the Wheeler and Shamrock areas, announced Sherry McCavit, executive director of Hospice of the Panhandle, co-sponsor of the class.

Classes begin Sept. 7 at First United Methodist Church of Wheeler, 704 Main. Taught by McCavit, the 10 weeks of classes are scheduled for Tuesdays, 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

Hospice is a concept of care for the terminally ill which focuses on the quality of life remaining and respect for personal dignity.

"Hospice Approach to Living & Dying" is a study of the effects of terminal illness on the patient and the family. The dynamics of death, dying, grief and loss are identified with the purpose of fitting those dynamics within the hospice concept of care. McCavit will be assisted by other hospice professionals and outside speakers. The classes are intended for the public.

Topics covered in the classes include an introduction to hospice, medical and ethical aspects, spiritual care component, communicating with the dying, holistic approach to hospice care, concepts of death and dying, understanding the grief process and the volunteer's role in hospice care.

Anyone 18 years of age or older who has not experienced the death of someone close to them in the past 12

months may register for the course by contacting Clarendon College—Pampa Center, (806)665-8801. Registration is also available on the first night of the class. Cost of the course is \$30 for 30 classroom hours. Continuing education credit is available through Clarendon College for those who attend all of the classes.

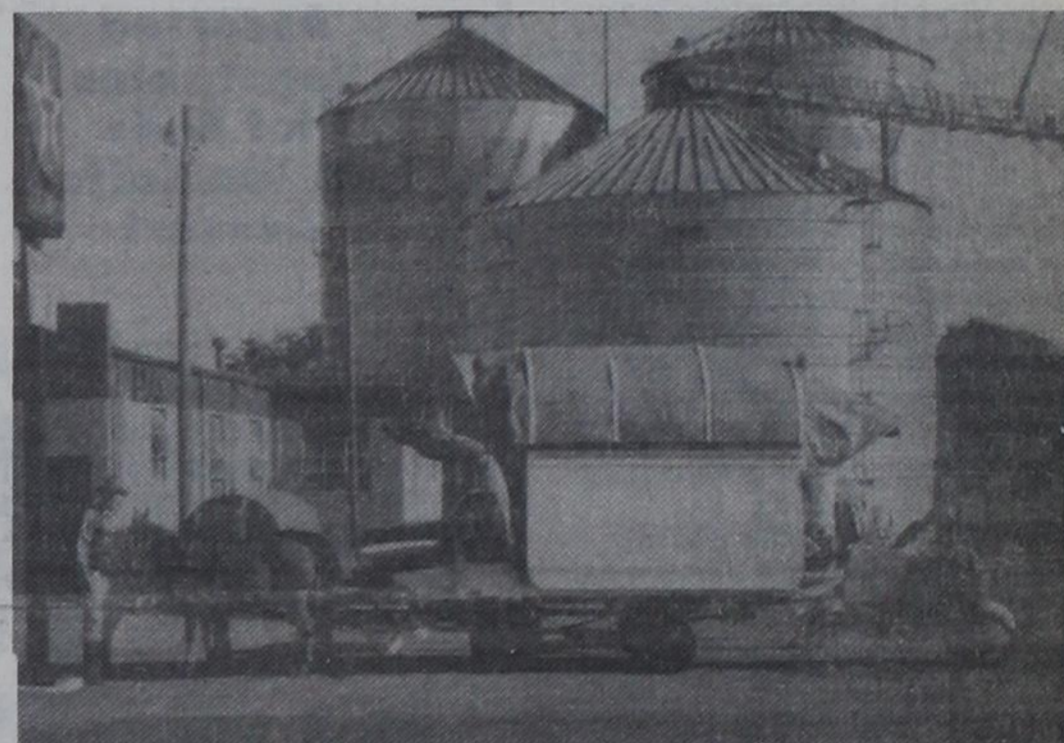

THE ACCOMPANYING TAX NOTICE IS WRONG!

The Kelton Independent School District is *required by state law* to publish the accompanying tax notice in this form, *even though the notice is deceptive.*

Because of an omission in the recently-enacted state law, Kelton I.S.D. may not include revenue collected by the county education district in the calculation of taxes for the 1992-93 school year. The effect of this is to understate last year's actual school tax rate and produce an inaccurate comparison of last year's tax rate to this year's tax rate.

The correct comparison of tax rates is as follows:

Indirect Grilling Is Demonstration Subject

Top O'Texas CattleWomen met August 9 for their regular meeting at the Wheeler City Park. Brenda Wood, Barbara Meadows and Sandra Christner demonstrated "indirect grilling" on a special made cooker which eliminates fires and smoke from fat drippings. The source of heat for grilling is away from your meat and any fat drippings fall into a pan of water directly beneath your meat. This method results in a very tasty steak with smoke flavor coming from wood chips of your choice such as Mesquite not burned fat drippings. This type of grilling is sometimes considered a more healthy way of grilling your beef.

This demonstration was also given at Memphis August 11 at the request of Hall County Home Extensions Agent for Ag Appreciation Day. Approximately 50 persons were present for the demonstration. Brochures were distributed promoting beef as a healthy, nutritious product.

1993 Property Tax Rates in WHEELER ISD

This notice concerns 1993 property tax rates for WHEELER ISD. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the school district used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the school district can set before it must hold a rollback election. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes and state funds by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

New Deer Regulation Adopted by TPW Comm.

New regulations adopted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission will be in effect for the 1993-94 regular white-tailed deer gun season in Hemphill and Wheeler Counties. The deer bag limit remains the same but regulations concerning the taking of antlerless deer have changed according to Tommy Hinkle, Wildlife Technician with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department at Canadian.

Effective this fall antlerless deer permits will no longer be issued to landowners or operators in Hemphill and Wheeler Counties. However, antlerless deer may be taken during the first 6 days (November 6-11, 1993) of the regular gun deer season. During the remainder of the season only bucks may be harvested.

Antlerless deer must be tagged with the appropriate tag from the hunter's hunting license. This tag must remain attached to the deer until it reaches its final destination. Deer may only be taken from lands for which hunters have obtained permission from the landowner or operator. All tags must have all required blanks (hunter's name, ranch, county) completed so they are easy to read. Each tag must have the month and date of kill cut out.

The bag limit for white-tailed deer in Hemphill and Wheeler Counties is 3 deer no more than 1 buck and 2 antlerless deer. This bag limit is per year and does include any deer taken during the special archery season.

Officials Caution Drivers About Holiday Safety

From the Minister's Desk:
 An important film technique that is used by the movie industry is Cinema. With this technique, every scene of a movie is photographed from three directions which allows all the dimensions of a scene to be seen.

Perhaps the disciples of Jesus can learn an important lesson from this film technique. This lesson would be that all the dimensions of Christianity must be practiced. In my opinion, there are too many disciples of Jesus who believe that Christianity is one dimensional. These disciples apparently believe that Christianity consists merely of an absence of sins of immorality. But this one dimensional Christianity was not taught by Jesus Christ in His ministry. He constantly taught that sins of the attitude are as sinful as sins of immorality.

For example, the eighth chapter of John records an event in the ministry of Jesus where He clearly condemned the sins of the attitude. According to this text, Jesus was teaching in the Temple when He was interrupted by the Pharisees. These pious religious leaders had with them a woman that they had caught "in the very act" of adultery. After they had placed this woman "in the midst" of the Temple, the Pharisees said to Jesus, "Teacher, this woman has been caught in adultery, in the very act. Now in the Law Moses commanded us to stone such women; what then do you say?" (verses 4-5)

The text then says: "And they were saying this, testing Him, in order that they might have grounds for accusing Him. But Jesus stooped down, and with His finger wrote on the ground. But when they persisted in asking Him, He straightened up, and said to them, "He who is without sin among you, let him be the first to throw a stone at her." And again He stooped down, and wrote on the ground. And when they heard it, they began to go out one by one, beginning with the older ones, and He was left alone, and the woman, where she had been, in the midst. And straightened up, Jesus said to her, "Woman, where are they? Did no one condemn you?" And she said, "No one, Lord." And Jesus said, "Neither do I condemn you; go your way. From now on, sin no more."

Notice that Jesus did not argue with the Pharisees about the sin of this woman. He recognized that she was guilty of a terrible sexual sin. But He also recognized that the Pharisees were guilty of at least three terrible sins of the attitude. These three sins of the attitude were:

1. Dishonesty. These pious religious leaders were not honestly concerned about the teaching of the Law. If they had been, they would have brought with them the man who had committed adultery with the woman. They did not even mention this man.

2. Insincerity. The Pharisees were not sincerely interested in morality or purity. They were simply seeking a reason to accuse Jesus. (verse 6) These pious religious leaders were hypocritical. (Matthew 23:28)

3. Indifferent. The Pharisees were indifferent to the embarrassment and humiliation of the woman. To them, she was simply an exhibit that they could use in their plot against Jesus. They did not care that this woman was embarrassed and humiliated.

I am afraid that there are some twentieth century disciples of Jesus who are like these Pharisees. These disciples eloquently sermonize about the importance of morality, condemning such things as premarital sex, vulgar bumperstickers, drunkenness, and profanity. But when the lives of these disciples are closely scrutinized, some terrible sins of the attitude become very obvious. Some of these sins are pride, arrogance, dishonesty, self-righteousness, and conceit.

Genuine disciples of Jesus will know that the Bible teaches that people who practice "the deeds of the flesh" will "not inherit the kingdom of God." They will also know that "enmities, strife, jealousy, outbursts of anger, disputes, dissensions, factions" are listed among "the deeds of the flesh" (Galatians 5:19-21) For this reason, genuine disciples of Jesus will recognize that Christianity is not one dimensional.

Because of an omission in the recently-enacted state law, Fort Elliott CISD may not include revenue collected by the county education district in the calculation of taxes for the 1992-93 school year. The effect of this is to understate last year's actual school tax rate and produce an inaccurate comparison of last year's tax rate to this year's tax rate.





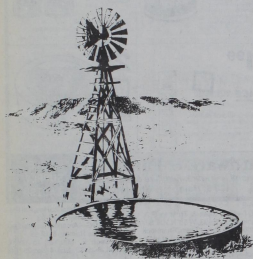
