Rives Awarded U.I. L. Academic Scholarship

Rochelle Lea Rives of Wheeler has been awarded a two year \$3000 Abell-Hanger Foundation scholarship by the Texas Interscholastic League Academic State Meet Contests and who have compiled an outstanding record of academic and extracurricular achievement.

This year the TILF awarded 354 new awards and renewed 250 awards for a total of 604 scholarships for 1993-94 with a value of \$775,000. Recipients may attend any approved college or university in Texas.

Rives, a graduate of Wheeler High School, won the UIL Academic State Meet in 1993 in Literary Criticism. She also competed in UIL Prose Interpretation, Keyboarding, Ready Writing, Feature Writing, Editorial Writing and News Writing. Care-free days of swimming and basking in the summer sun fade from view as the open doors of Wheeler I.S.D. beckon students to enter their territory. REACH, which stands for Realizing Expectations and Changing Habits is designed to target students who do not complete assignments or who do not put forth effort on assignments. Under this program, these students will be required to spend time after school.

In addition to the REACH program, Wheeler I.S.D. has experienced a large change in faculty. Doug Rives will be the Elementary principal, Kathryn Scott will be the Reading Specialist, and June Dirickson will reside as the Gifted and Talented teacher. In addition, Belinda Masters will teach fourth grade, and Ruth Smith will teach high school English.

Summers days are limited, and now we must all wake from our peaceful slumber and prepare for the inevitable—even if it still happens to be 100 degrees outside.

Larry Schoenhals Retires From Military Reserves

Reserve Major Larry M. Schoenhals, Chief Appraiser for the Wheeler County Central Appraisal District (CAD) has been transferred into the retired reserve by the U.S. Army after a military career spanning 29 years in two separate military services.

Schoenhals, 50, came to Wheeler County in August, 1989 upon being selected for the Chief Appraiser position by the CAD board of directors. At that time he had almost six years experience as deputy appraiser for the Lipscomb CAD, and had completed requirements for state designation as a Registered Professional Appraiser (RPA).

A 1960 graduate of Darrouzett High School, Schoenhals enlisted in the U.S. Air Force for officer training shortly after graduating from Southwestern State, Weatherford, OK, in 1964. He was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in 1965 in San Antonio, and served consecutive overseas tours in Germany and Vietnam from 1966-1970.

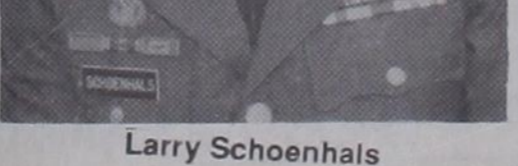
He later completed a masters degree in management by attending night classes at Webster University, St. Louis. He was transferred from active reserve status into the regular Air Force based on performance and merit, and was stationed in Illinois, Ohio, Missouri and North Carolina.

Schoenhals' primary Air Force duties were as an aircraft maintenance officer for squadrons and wings flying the twin-jet F-4 "Phantom." After almost 15 years of continuous active Air Force service he received an involuntary honorable discharge as a result of the post Vietnam draw-down of forces.

He then enlisted in the Army Reserve with the initial rank of sergeant, and within six months was granted a direct appointment as a captain, Quartermaster Corps. He served three years as company commander in an infantry training battalion at both Woodward and Guymon, OK. He then transferred to the 4222nd Support Brigade in Amarillo. For more than six years he served as a mobilization supply management officer at the U.S. Army Ammunition Plant, McAlester, OK.

Schoenhals is a graduate of some 10 military schools including the Aerospace Maintenance Staff Officers Course, the Quartermaster Officers Advanced Course and Air Command & Staff College. His awards and decorations include the bronze star medal, the Vietnam service medal with 3 oak leaf clusters, presidential unit citation, Air Force outstanding unit award with 3 oak leaf clusters and "valor" device, and the Vietnam cross of gallantry with palm.

Schoenhals is a member of the Texas Association of Assessing Officers, Texas Association of Appraisal Districts, The American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Retired Officers Association and National Rifle Association. He attends St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Darrouzett where his father, Harry, and brother, Barry both reside.

who will be attending Wheeler ISD Kindergarten during the 1993-94 school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration/Emergency Card; 2. Student Health Information (A two page questionnaire); 3. Home Language survey. The Parent/Guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names and the child's social security number, as well as, copies of the child's official birth certificate (state copy—not hospital copy) and immunization records (authorized by doctor or official clinic), before his/her child can be enrolled in school.

The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "traffic jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day are welcome to do so.

Kindergarten registration will be in the school cafeteria on Friday, August 13, from 9:00 until 10:00 a.m.

Janice Sparlin was still on vacation last week. We have missed her a lot and we are looking forward to seeing her again soon.

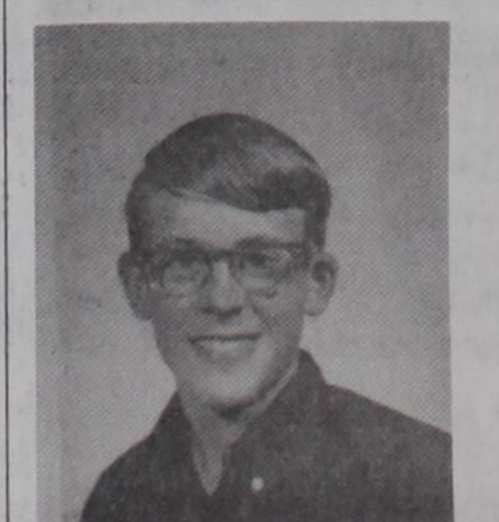
The First Baptist Church had Sunday afternoon services with the residents. I want to thank the churches that come out each Sunday and give the residents the opportunity to participate in the worship services.

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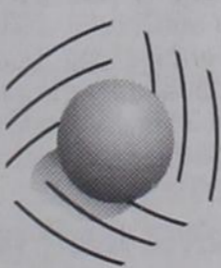

From the Minister's Desk:

A religious movement occurred in this nation in the late 1950's that was known as the Ecumenical Movement. It was the goal of this religious movement to foster unity among the believers of Jesus Christ. This goal was a Biblical goal because there are several Biblical texts which teach that unity should exist among the believers of Jesus Christ.

One of these texts is found in the seventeenth chapter of John which records the prayer that Jesus prayed shortly before His crucifixion. In this prayer Jesus prayed for unity among His believers, saying: "I do not ask in behalf of these alone, but for those also who believe in Me through their word; that they may all be one; even as Thou, Father, art in Me, and I in Thee, that they also may be in Us; that the world may believe that Thou didst send Me. And the glory which Thou hast given Me I have given to them; that they may be one just as We are one; I in them and Thou in Me, that they may be perfected in unity, that the world may know that Thou didst send Me, and didst love them, even as Thou didst love Me." (John 17:20-23)

Another of these texts is found in the first chapter of I Corinthians. In this text, the Apostle Paul wrote: "Now I exhort you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that you all agree, and there be no divisions among you, but you be made complete in the same mind and in the same judgment." (I Corinthians 1:10)

These two Biblical texts and several others plainly teach that unity should exist among the believers of Jesus Christ. For this reason, the goal of the Ecumenical Movement was to foster this unity, but it apparently did not achieve this goal. According to the 1991 issue of The World Almanac there are eleven major religious bodies in the United States and each one of these religious bodies have different beliefs

and practices. The existence of these religious bodies with their different beliefs and practices clearly prove that the Ecumenical Movement did not achieve its goal of unity among the believers of Jesus Christ.

But why? Why did this religious movement fail to achieve its Biblical goal? I think that at least two reasons can be suggested for its failure.

1. The Bible was not accepted as the sole authority for the unity among the believers of Jesus Christ. If the believers of Jesus Christ truly want to be united, they must recognize that the bible is an inspired book which contains the inerrant will of God. For this reason, they will understand that they cannot vote on its teachings or evaluate its teachings by their feelings or intellect. Rather they will carefully study the Bible and honestly obey its teachings. Then the believers of Jesus Christ will be united and not divided.

2. Doctrinal differences between the believers of Jesus Christ were not considered. To be united, believers of Jesus Christ will recognize that it is a cliché not a Biblical truth that says: "We are going to the same place; we are just traveling different roads." The Biblical truth is that there is "—one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God, and Father of all who is over all and through all and in all." (Ephesians 4:5-6) Before the Believers of Jesus Christ can be united, they must resolve to believe and practice the doctrine that is taught in the Bible.

The goal of the Ecumenical Movement was not achieved. Unity among the believers of Jesus Christ does not exist. But I sincerely believe that it could if the believers of Jesus Christ would believe His infallible words and not the words of fallible people.

TIME TO HANG UP THE KEYS

How do we know when it is time to quit driving and "hang up the keys?" This is a question many older drivers are faced with. The independence that comes with driving is hard to give up. However, as responsible drivers we must each look for alternative ways to get around when we can no longer drive safely.

As we age, bodily changes occur which can affect our ability to continue driving safely. Aging can affect flexibility, hearing, vision, reaction time, strength, stamina and attention span. An aging adult in good health and good physical condition will have less influence from these changes. Therefore, age alone is not a determining factor when a person should quit driving.

Another factor to consider is whether one can drive safely under some conditions and not in other conditions. If this is the case, one can make the adjustments and continue to drive with these limitations. An example is to avoid driving at night if you do not see well at night. Select routes that you are familiar with. Limit the duration of your driving time to what you can comfortably endure.

Medications can affect a person's driving ability. This is true of both over-the-counter and prescription medicines. Talk to your doctor or pharma-

cist and make sure you know about the side effects of all the medications you are taking, whether prescribed or not.

If you have chosen to drink alcohol, don't drive. Driving under the influence of alcohol can be deadly. Combining alcohol with medicines impairs driving skills even more than having either alcohol or medications alone.

Select vehicles that contribute to your being a safer driver. White vehicles are more visible out on the road. Large side rear mirrors and rear view mirrors give you better vision on what's behind you. Check for adjustable features on the vehicle that can make it "fit" you better. Check vehicle for blind spots before you purchase them.

If you have trouble evaluating your behind-the-wheel skills, a program is available. It requires a physician's referral form. People whose physical abilities are impaired by illness, injury, or age are eligible. A clinical evaluation is provided. Overall strength and body coordination, reaction time, and visual skills are tested by an occupational therapist. A behind-the-wheel evaluation in a car simulator is also provided. Check with your doctor if you or someone you know could benefit from this evaluation.
