# **Mustangs Win First District Game Since '91**

The Wheeler Mustangs invaded possession, forcing Chad Dunnam to Memphis Friday night and came away with their first District win since 1991. In a game which had numerous possibilities of repeating last week's disastrous first half, the Mustangs defense did a tremendous job of holding off the Memphis Cyclones until the Mustang offense could get untracked in the second half.

After receiving the opening kickoff, Wheeler moved into Memphis territory before the Ben Widener intercepted a Mustang pass and returned the ball to the Wheeler 45. The Stangs gave an indication of things to come by holding the Cyclones on downs. On Memphis' next possession the Cyclones appeared to score as quarterback Murphy Parks broke an apparent 54 yard TD run, but an illegal blocking penalty well behind the play resulted in the TD being called back and the ball spotted on the Mustangs 22. Given the second chance, the Mustangs held on downs once again, taking over on the 15. Quarterback Heath Sabbe had suffered a cracked collarbone on the Mustangs previous

take over at QB with Ashley Brownfield moving to the running back position once again, the Stangs dodged bullets as the ball was fumbled in the first two plays but luckily the Mustangs kept possession and eventually punted from the 4. Marcus Hardcastle then got off his best punt of the year, kicking the ball 50 yards, and Ciraco Meraz tackled the punt receiver immediately, putting Memphis on their own 47, where the Stangs held them.

The second quarter featured a punting duel as Memphis twice pinned the Stangs inside the one yard line, forcing Wheeler to just try to avoid a turnover or a safety. Hardcastle was able to punt back out to the mid field area, keeping the Cyclones at bay. After Memphis' second punt inside the one, the Stangs were able to move the ball out to 26, from which Hardcastle then topped his previous best with a 54 yard effort that ended Memphis' chance of scoring before halftime. Memphis had missed their chance of winning because the second half was all Stangs.

After a Wheeler fumble on the fir. possession of the second half, the Stangs, by now routinely, held Memphis and took over on downs after four plays. After an exchange of punts, Andy Francis broke a thirty-eight yard run putting the ball on the Cyclone 19. The next play Ashley Brownfield showed his power as he ran over about half of Memphis' team to score the night's first TD.

The Stangs recovered a Memphis fumble at the Memphis 45 on the following possession and went right to work. Behind the power running of Brownfield, the Mustangs scored once again with Brownfield's 2 yard run, capping an eight play drive. When Memphis had trouble fielding the following kickoff and ended up with the ball on their own 4, Mustang fans felt the game was essentially over. However Memphis had other ideas. On the first play, Parks hit Widener on a fly pattern. Two Mustang defenders missed tackles on Widner as he went 96 yards, putting Memphis back in the game. Neither team threatened again until Hardcastle intercepted a Parks

pass at the Cyclone 37. Francis then broke a 36 yard run to set up Brownfield's one yard TD with only 46 second remaining in the game.

On the ensuing kickoff, Memphis fumbled and the Stangs recovered on the Cyclone 15. Dunnam got to the one, then scored on the QB sneak to end the scoring with the Stangs second TD in 22 seconds.

The game was the Mustangs best offensive effort of the year as the Stangs gained 293 yards, with 226 of it in the second half. Francis and Brownfield were both over a hundred yards with 153 and 128 respectively. If the play of the Stangs in this game is an indication of what they can do the rest of the season, the Wheeler Mustangs are all the way back.



From the Minister's Desk: A recent issue of Amarillo Daily News contained an editorial that was written by Suzanne Fields, a reporterfor the Los Angeles Times. This editorial was entitled, "Moral Stands Should Be Taken" and it said:---

Hip parents of the '60's boasted of smoking pot with their teen-age children: "Better than beer". Lawlessness, moral authority, mixed messages-None of these was the issue. Making a statement was

That's easy to judge today: Bad. Last Week in Potomac, Md., an affluent suburb of Washington, parents of children at Churchill High School charted two buses to take them to a post-homecoming night beer party. Not all parents knew about the alcohol, but all were afraid of drunken driving. Renting the buses, they thought was "being responsible".

They put no stock in exercising moral authority. They couldn't prevent their children from drinking, even though it's against the law, so they did the next best thing. They waived moral sanction and excused themselves of responsibility.

That's less east to judge, isn't it? Or is it?

Teenagers themselves are of mixed minds on the issue. One teen-age girl, age 15, defends the parents. "I know the parents who rented the buses, and they don't condone drinking." Maybe not, but they didn't trouble themselves to stop it either.

"I thought it was kind of irresponsible of the parents," says another teenager- age 14. "They knew (their kids) were going to a beer party and they could get drunk and might get themselves killed."

Driving, of course, is not the only risk for teen-age drinkers. Selfcontrol and sexual instincts are altered. Bad habits become bad habits for a lifetime.





# P.O. Box 754 Wheeler, TX A Report on the KPDR "Broadcastathon'

I was amazed at what happened during our "Broadcastathon" at KPDR. I believe that God has instructed me to take this radio ministry to Amarillo. Therefore, I believe that He gives the faith to believe Him for our needs with which we will accomplish His will. I also believe that He will cause ideas to come to me that will be productive financially. However, even though I knew God would supply and give ideas, the response to the continuous broadcast was more than I expected.

I had set a goal to get \$170 per hour pledged, and thought for a while that we weren't going to get it. But, by the time the program started at 6:00 a.m. on Tuesday, October 12, it was up to \$250 per hour. Some pledges ended after 30 hours and others started after 30 hours, and by the end it was up to \$350. So, we passed that goal. Another goal that I had set was to stay on the air 39 or 40 hours. I know that people have stayed up a lot longer than that, but I never have. So, I figured that if I stayed awake 40 hours that I would be doing good. Some folks wondered if I could make it 30 hours. I ended the broadcast at midnight on Wednesday night which made a total of 42 hours. Therefore, that goal was another that was surpassed. Then, I had a goal to raise \$10,000 in the project. By the time all the money that was pledged during those 2 days comes in (along with extra that was given by some), the increase of funds for the Amarillo station that we'll have from that endeavor will be around \$16,000. That is another goal that was reached and exceeded substantially.

I thought that you Wheeler folks would like to know what happened since so many of you have commented about the "Broadcastathon". I still don't know if that is a word, but it worked. I appreciate all the people in the community here that participated in this project. Your kindness and the support from so many of you has made us very grateful. We are nearly 45% of the way to the amount needed to complete KJRT for Amarillo. The new 20,000 watt station will cover a radius from Amarillo to approximately 50 miles getting this radio signal into Hereford, Tulia, Dumas and Borger. That is going to reach a lot of people. That is 10,000 watts of power more than KPDR, and you probably know that this station gets to a lot of folks.

I am thrilled. I believe we have seen God working to bring this to past. It is my childhood dream that God gave me, unfolding before us. God is so good. It is great to be daily involved in His work.

"Any parent who tries to micro-manage a child's diet by counting the grams of fat in each food or counting the grams of fat on a day-by-day basis is headed for disaster," he said. "It's obsessive-compulsive behavior that yields no rewards whatsoever, and it just creates more tension."

Instead of labeling foods as "good" or "bad" try to influence your child's food choices. Also, provide a variety of food, including alternatives for specific foods.

# Services Supplied By Wheeler Soil Conservation

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation district was formed on April 6, 1948, with the protection and enhancement of the available renewable natural resources as its primary purpose. Its boundaries coincide with the boundaries of Wheeler County. It is governed by a board of five elected directors who are resident land owners in the District and are actively engaged in farming or ranch-

The current Board of Directors consists of Paul Macina, Jim Batton, Darville Atherton, Eric Zybach, and John Vermillion.

House is not what one might think. It was originally a hotel, built in 1893 by blind brothers Jesse and Jacob Nutt. It is on the square in Granbury, Texas which was the center of pioneer activity in early day Hood County. This building has been occupied by three generations of the Nutt family. The original structure, built in 1866, was a store constructed of logs. It was 16'x12' and featured a wagon yard in the rear for customer convenience.


A direct descendant of the Nutt family re-opened the dining room in April 1970.

The rooms featured iron bedsteads and antique chests, dressers, chiffoniers. The wooden ceilings were very high. Entering the front, one seems to have stepped back in time.

Soon everyone toured the old Granbury Historic Square, experiencing the turn-of-the-century charm as we browsed through some of the 50 antique and specialty shops, boutiques, and an ice cream parlor in historic buildings.

We enjoyed a light meal then drove out to Dinosaur valley State Park at Glen Rose, just to be sure we could find it. Deer were grazing in the early evening light. We would look for dinosaur tracks tomorrow!

The Board went into Executive session at 7:20 PM as authorized by the Texas Open Meetings Act, Texas Government Code Section 551.001 et seq. The Board returned to Open session at 8:07 PM.

The District entered into a memo of understanding with the Soil Conservation Service in 1948 to provide personnel specially trained in the field of erosion control. The current SCS staff consists of Fred Allison Jr., District Conservationist; Kenneth Reed, Range Conservationist; and Calvin Devereaux, Soil Conservationist. Rhonda Ferguson is employed as a District Clerk. Don Humphreys is a Green Thumb employee.

The SWCD works closely with the SCS to promote all phases of conservation. Your SWCD is proud to present this report of some of the work and accomplishments during the 1993 fiscal year.

Wheeler County SWCD has been involved with the development, servicing, and revising of Food Security Act (FSA) plans. The Food Security Act of 1985 mandated that every farmer who produces crops on highly erodible soils must have developed a conservation plan by January 1, 1990. These plans must be fully applied by January 1, 1995. Wheeler County has approximately 872 Food Security Act plans.

Other programs must be carried out in addition to the Food Security Act provisions. We currently have three active Great Plains (GPCP) contracts, one Long Term Agreement (LTA) contract, and various Resources Conservation and Development (RC&D) projects. Fencing, livestock water development, pasture planting, range seeding, critical area treatment, and brush management are being performed under GPCP and LTA.

Some of the accomplishments of the SWCD/SCS for 1993 include: New District Cooperators-186 for 15, 194 Acres; Conservation plans prepared-168, for 8,107 Acres; Conservation plans revised-225 for 38,824 Acres; Individuals and Units of Government assisted-510; Individuals applying a practice-297; Grass Seeding-3,000 Acres: Deferred Grazing-12,000 Acres: Cropland Benefited from applying a practice-36,024 Acres; Range and Pastureland Benefited from applying a practice-25,762 Acres; Ponds-3 No.; Brush Management-1200 Acres: Prescribed burning-3500 Acres; Cross fences-10,500 Feet; Livestock pipeline-2,000 Feet; Wells-10; Water Storage Facility-21; Terraces 60,000 feet; Cover Crops 5,000 Acres; Wind Strips 400 Acres; Conservation presentations and tours-3 with 100 people in attendance. These are only a few of the conservation accomplishments for 1993.

All services of the Soil Conservation Service and the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District are available regardless of age, sex, race, color, religion, handicap or national origin.

We were very tired at the end of the day. So the Nutt House looked wonderful. Needless to say, lights were soon out and everyone reported having slept well.

Our group began to awaken around 5:00 A.M. In a couple of hours everyone was awake, dressed, and ready for the day. We had previous instructions not to disturb the guide before 9:00 A.M. We walked to the opposite corner of the square to the Nutshell Eatery and Bakery for breakfast.

The moment you enter The Nutshell one feels the history of this historic building. The Gordon Building was built in 1885 by A.P. Gordon. During the 1800's Mr. Gordon, a prominent merchant, sold wet goods. (He was in the Saloon Business). The upstairs was reportedly used as "ho-

tel" rooms by the saloon customers. Later, he went into the dry goods business. The building was filled from floor to ceiling with tools, fine fabric, and grocery items. He was known for the wide selection of merchandise he carried and that his prices were fair.

The first floor of the Gordon Building has been a restaurant and local bakery since 1970. During the late 1970's, when many local historic structures on the Granbury square were being renovated, the second floor was restored and converted into an apartment.

As we strolled the square, which was crowded with arts and crafts and food booths set up for their Harvest Moon Festival, we met our guide on his way to the Nutshell for breakfast. We heard an outdoor concert of western music and on Old Fiddlers Contest. Many of us made purchases and guarded them closely.

Everyone gathered at the van at 11:30 A.M. Saturday morning to go look for dinosaur tracks in the petrified bed of the Paluxy River at Dinosaur Valley State Park West of Glen Rose. This park contains the best preserved dinosaur tracks in Texas.

We said farewell to the Baker's cousins and turned toward home. We could not pass Braums, so we had hamburgers and ice cream, then continued on toward Wheeler. We arrived in about 7 hours. It was late, for some, everyone was ready to get off the van, bid good night travel companions, and step into their own home. Robert and Pat Helsley, Chuck and Marie Baker, their cousins Jack and Margie Baxter, Mary Margaret Dodd, Ned Burrell, Evelyn Meek, Lois Meadows, and Betty Howard were the happy travelers.


