
# **Canadian Game Critical To Playoffs**

Probably no team in Wheeler's past history has even made such a midseason turnaround as have the 1993 Mustangs.

Canadian has been the district's most impressive team this year. After opening the season with a surprising loss to West Texas High, the Wildcats have rolled over an impressive list of opponents such as 1-AAA Champion Perryton; AAA perennial power, Childress; 1-AA Champ Stratford, and AA power Clarendon. They are undefeated in the district play and already assured of at least a portion of the 2AA championship; however to

This Friday the Wheeler Mustangs they will assure themselves a piece of an important game this year seemed claim the championship outright and to exist only in Mustang's dreams. they must defeat the Mustangs.

If the Stangs win and Panhandle defeats Clarendon, there would be a three way tie for the championship with the two playoff teams and seedlings being determined by coin flip. There are numerous other playoff possibilities involving these four teams, but the bottom line is the Stangs playoff possibilities are much greater with a win than with a loss.

Canadian is not an overpowering team, but is a very quick and opportunistic team that has feasted on its opponents' mistakes. To defeat them, the Mustangs must avoid turnovers and make the game a four quarter slugfest in which the Wildcats fully earn every point they get. Also, the Stangs have to pay particular attention to the kicking game as Canadian has excelled at running back kicks. After Clarendon's success at blocking a Mustang punt, Canadian will also probably aggressively rush Mustang punter Marcus Hardcastle. Hopefully the only kicks the Wildcats will have a chance to run back will be after Mustang kickoffs.


The Mustangs continue to garner notice in the area press as the Amarillo Globe-News picked the Stangs as the "Team of the Week" for last week's victory over Clarendon. If the Stangs can pull off a victory over Canadian. they could well make it two weeks in a row.



Halloween arrived two days early for the Clarendon Broncos this year. As if playing football on a night when the chill factor was below zero wasn't bad enough, Ashley Brownfield and the Wheeler Mustangs showed them their personal version of the Monster Mash.

Brownfield carried the ball 41 times for 192 yards in a game that the Stangs totally dominated. Wheeler tripled Clarendon's total yardage and ran twice as many plays as the Broncos. In spite of their overwhelming statistical dominance, the Stangs made enough mistakes to allow Clarendon to stay in the game and the outcome was not decided until Wheeler ran out the clock on the Bronco three yard line.

The Stangs then tried to take advantage of having the wind at their back and try the passing game, but Clarendon intercepted a Chad Dunnam pass in the flat and appeared to be headed to the Mustang end zone when Dunnam fought off a blocker and made a touchdown saving tackle on the Mustang 17. Two plays reached the eleven and on third down. Campbell passed the ball into the end zone. As he has all year, Ciriaco Meraz made the big play as he cut off the receiver and intercepted in the end zone for a touchback. Neither team threatened again in the first half, but on the last play of the half, Andy Francis was injured and missed the rest of the game.

Wheeler chose to take the wind in the third guarter and kick off to Clarendon. After holding the Broncos to three plays and a punt, the Stangs took over on their own 46 and moved the 54 yards to the end zone in seven plays with Brownfield scoring on a two yard run. Since the Stangs had missed their first extra point, they went for two and Brownfield scored almost uncontested as the Mustang line to-

tally dominated the Broncos.

The kicking game then provided the next scare for the Stangs as a Marcus Hardcastle punt was blocked, forcing Hardcastle to make a touchdown saving tackle at the Wheeler 27 on a Bronco heading goalward with the loose ball. Two plays later, Dunnam made a spectacular end zone interception to once more turn away the Broncos.

The fourth quarter began with Stangs clinging to 14-7 lead, but with the explosive Broncos now having the wind at their back. When the Stangs had to punt into the wind from midfield, Clarendon almost got their second block as Hardcastle's punt only traveled twelve yards. The Broncos moved to the Wheeler 39 where they faced 4th and 8. Clarendon lined up to punt, but faked the punt and ran the option with would be punter Cory Fields taking the pitch, but the Stangs stopped him two yards short and took over at their own 33 with almost eight minutes remaining. Wheeler then held the ball the rest of the night as they ran 15 plays to end the game with the ball on the Bronco 3.

Until his injury, Andy Francis was on his way to another 100 yard night as he had gained 44 yards on 10 carries. Chad Dunnam gained 58 yards on only 8 carries, including a very impor-

Election Day tomorrow. I haven't sharpened my decisions on all items on the ballot, but I've tried. Somebody is going to have a lot of work to do after the voting is over.


However I could make a suggestion to the committee. Just ask Rush Limbaugh! He knows everything! He doesn't mind telling you so!



## What To Do If You Need Healing

I have written for these columns several times in past months about the fact that God has provided healing for the physical body. There are many Scriptures that show us the will of God concerning healing. We have a 3-page typed list of "Healing Scriptures" available upon request. Even though there are 40 Scriptures on the list, it is just a partial list of Scriptures that could be given. If you take just the Bible, and not the teachings of unbelieving theologians, you will see that God wants to heal you. After settling the question of whether it is His will or not, the question raised is "How do I get it?

Nobody who ever came to Jesus for healing failed to get it. How could that be if it is sometimes His will for people to remain sick and even die of disease? There were multiplied thousands of people who came to Jesus for healing, and they all got healed. The reason nobody ever showed up in His ministry that it wasn't God's will to heal is because there are no such people. It is God's perfect will to heal the same people that it is His will to save from sins. That's everybody. He didn't bear the sins of just some people on the cross. Neither did He bear the sicknesses of just some people on the cross. The total price for the double cure was paid for all people through the sacrifice of Jesus. That being the case, how do we get it?

Do what the people in the Bible did to receive miracles, and you will receive the same kind of miracles. Somebody said that healing rests on the Sovereignty and timing of God. But, God didn't say that. Over and over again, Jesus told people that it was their faith that made them whole. He did not tell people, "You are healed because I am the son of God." Neither did He teach people that sometimes God heals and sometimes He doesn't based on His Sovereignty. Instead, He said repeatedly, "Thy faith hath healed thee," or "Thy faith hath made thee whole." Friends, if it is on the basis of faith and not on the basis of His Sovereignty, then it is available to any and all of us who will develop and build our faith. If salvation from sins was presented to people on the same basis that healing is presented, there wouldn't be very many people saved. 
One of our close friends passes to durn broke to take them, but recon we will try to do what we know to do and take the durn things. Have you taken yours? Ought to.



### **Potassium-The Mineral Readily** Available in Food

Potassium is a mineral readily available in foods you eat daily. To be considered a good source of potassium, a food should contain at least 200 milligrams per serving. Major dietary sources of potassium include fruits and vegetables, milk and yogurt, meat and whole grains.

The mineral potassium functions along with sodium and chloride, as an electrolyte which helps maintain water and fluid balance in the cells. Potassium happens to be the electrolyte found in highest concentrations within the body cells, while sodium and chloride are found outside the cells. The kidney regulates the level of electrolytes by excreting any surplus. Potassium functions in assisting in muscle contraction, sending nerve impulses and releasing energy from protein, fat and carbohydrate during metabolism. There is considerable evidence that dietary potassium may help lower blood pressure and protect against strokes. Potassium requirements could be increased to 3,500 milligrams per day. Also potassium's beneficial effect on hypertension has been suggested; that a diet high in potassium and low in sodium can help lower blood pressure in people with hypertension. This link may help explain why there is a higher incidence of high blood pressure and related complicationssuch as stroke and end-stage renal disease-among blacks, who tend to have a much lower potassium intake than whites. People eating a diet consisting of a variety of foods are not at risk of developing a potassium deficiency. Large losses of potassium can occur through prolonged vomiting, chronic diarrhea and long-term laxative or diuretic use. Symptoms of potassium deficiency include weakness, lethargy, loss of appetite, nausea and abnormal heart
