Weatherly says the land around Wheeler is made up of poor soil that needs fertilization to generate plant growth. As is required of all feedyards by state and federal regulations, Heritage Beef Cattle Co. must dispose of its manure and wastewater. Also like other feedy ards, Heritage does this by having its employees collect the manure from the feedlot pens and spread it in measured amounts on nearby cropland to grow grasses. A Gravity flow system takes wastewater from a central pond to circle irrigation systems. It too is applied to the land in order to increase the soil's productiv-

The primary purpose of applying the manure to soil is to make the land more fertile. However, Weatherly found that besides improving the virtually sterile soil around his feedyard, application of manure also controls soil erosion caused by wind or water. The manure particles retain water more efficiently than the sandy soil. In addition, the weight of the manure protects soil from high winds that are common in the Texas Panhandle at various times of the year.

Weatherly said the system has made the feedyard virtually chemical-free. "When we can use organic material

(like manure) on the land, we don't have to use artificial fertilizers," he said. "We don't have to use weed killers either, because the more fertile the land is, the less weeds we have. What weeds do grow are controlled through grazing and mechanical means.

Through this process, Heritage Beef Cattle Co. has turned 5,000 acres of unproductive land into fertile cropland for grazing, hay production and wildlife. The grasses that grow on this converted and allow the feedyard to put 150 to 300 pounds of addition weight on cattle before they enter the feeding pens. This advantage lowers the breakeven costs of feeding for the

company's customers. Like other feedyards, Heritage Beef Cattle Co. has to deal with flies that multiply in cattle feeding sites. Instead of using chemical controls, Heritage became among the first feeding companies to use a wasp that attacks flies. Weatherly says the company gets "excellent fly control from these parasitic wasps without chemicals."


Heritage also recently enrolled in a test program to help Southwestern Public Service Co. recycle fly ash, a byproduct of coal-burning energy plants. Weatherly says his company places the fly ash in the cattle pens. During wet months, this material prevents manure from mixing with soil. That cuts down on maintenance as well as provides an outlet for a byproduct that power plants produce by the tons each day.

Heritage Beef Cattle Co. was nominated and received the Environmental Stewardship Award by the Top 'O Texas chapter of Texas CattleWomen.





Ft. Elliott The original Flagpole from Ft. Elliott now stands at the Mobeetie Jail Museum. The two poles were cut from the Cedar breaks on the Canadian River near Antelope Hills about 30 miles northest of the Fort. It was cut by the men of the fort and was freighted to Fort Elliott by J.J. Long a teamster who later settled at Mobeetie. The

poles each about 50' long were joined together to make a flagpole.

We have a copy of a letter as fol-

Headquarters Fort Elliott, Texas Oct. 18th 1879

I have the honor to report that a flag staff 61 feet in length was raised at this Post yesterday and at the unfurling of the U.S. Flag, I caused a national salute of 39 Guns to be fired. The Staff is made of cedar cut by men of this

Very Respectfully Your obedient Servant, Nicholas Nolan Captain 10th Cavalry Commanding

The flag pole later stood in front of J.J. Longs store in Old Mobeetie. Then at the Mobeetie High School. Finally being settled at the Jail Museum. On pretty days we still fly the flag on this flag pole. It is shorter due to being cut off each time it was moved due to being sit in concrete.

You can view the copy of the letter and see the flag pole at the Mobeetie Jail Museum.

The Amplified Bible, amplifying on the words in the verse by bringing out definitions of the original words used, says that with the increase of his lips he must be satisfied whether good or evil. Your words will produce something in your life. Jesus said that with the words of our mouths, we bring forth either good things or bad things according to what is in our heart. (See Matthew 12:35-37)

Proverbs 12:14 says that a man is satisfied with good by the fruit of his mouth. Proverbs 12:18 says that the tongue of the wise brings healing. The power that is in words coming from your and my mouths has been grossly underestimated. People cause themselves a lot of trouble and heartache by constantly talking negatively. By words we set in motion forces that work against us or forces that work for us. James 3:6 says that the tongue is a fire that sets on fire the course of nature, and it defiles our whole body.

Jesus said in Mark 11:23 that we would have whatever we say if we believe that those things which we say will come to pass. That will work positively or negatively. It depends on what kind of words you are saying that you believe. If you say something long enough, you will probably believe it. That is good if you are speaking the Word of God, but if you are talking sickness, defeat, failure, and fear, those things will increase in your life. In Psalm 39:1, David said, "I will take heed to my ways, that I sin not with my tongue. We know that it is common for people to sin with their tongue by speaking curse words or unkind words or blasphemous words or angry words, but words of defeat and fear and unbelief in God's promises are also sins.

What you continually say you will eventually get. So, watch your tongue.

Winter driving on wet, icy, or snow covered roads is different and drivers should prepare themselves by "cold proofing" their vehicles and adjusting driving habits, according to Trooper L.B. Snider of the Texas Department of Public Safety. "Batteries, tires, windshield wiper blades, and anti-freeze are items that need to be checked. Weak batteries should be replaced, tires should have good deep treads, and good wiper blades are vital in winter when visibility is poor," he said.

Safe driving in winter requires more patience, so Snider advise the motorist to start early, adjust their speed for road and traffic conditions and avoid sudden driving maneuvers.

Snider said, "Skidding on slick roads is a major accident factor and is usually caused by driving too fast for conditions or form locking wheels when drivers slow down."

Snider stated that if a skid occurs, the driver needs to ease off the accelerator, then turn into the skid. If your car's rear end slides left, turn your steering wheel to the left; for right skids, turn right. Pump you brakes if necessary; don't lock them.

He emphasized that impatience won't get you to your destination any faster. Patience won't get you there any faster either, but he said, "It'll sure make the trip more pleasant and safe."




