

### WILLIAM M. THORNBERRY ANNOUNCES BID FOR **U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, 13TH DISTRICT**

William M. "Mac" Thornberry announced his bid for the U.S. House of Representatives for the 13th congressional district today. A native of Donley County, Thornberry combines deep roots in the district with knowledge and experience of how to get things done in Washington.

Noting that current Congressman Bill Sarpalius represented President Clinton rather than his district in voting for the largest tax increase in history, Thornberry called upon all of those who are dissatisfied with the current direction of government to make a change. "The only way to turn things around is to get involved, "Thornberry said, that is why I decided to make this race."

"It is time - indeed it is past time - for the people of this district to be represented in Washington by someone who will listen to the people of this district, not Bill Clinton, not Speaker Foley, not the host of special interests that infest our nation's capital," Thornberry said.

Thornberry also noted that "People are tired of deception. Tired of budgets that call social security Tax increases "budget cuts" and that call less of an increase than they had planned, a 'cut'."

Raised on the family ranch near Clarendon, Thornberry attended public schools in Clarendon and is a graduate of Texas Tech University and the University of Texas Law School, He served in Washington as Legislative counsel to former Congressman Tom Loeffler and as chief of staff to Congressman Larry Combest. He was also Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Legislative Affairs during the Reagan Administration. The Thornberry family moved to Donley County from the Wichita Falls area.

Thornberry is currently a defense litigation attorney with the Amarillo firm of Peterson, Farris, Doores & Jones and is also involved in the family cattle business in Donley County. In pointing out that Representative Sarpalius could have stopped the tax

bill if had not voted for it, Thornberry emphasized that six Congressional Democrats from Texas voted against the measure. "They heard their constituents and voted 'no'" Thornberry said. "Sarpalius and many of the people in Washington don't understand that the people are fed up with government as usual and tax increase after tax increase. Well it's time to make them understand."




### **First Baptist Children's Choir Presents Musical**

### **Gary Bryant Awarded Leadership Scholarship**

The West Texas A&M University Foundation has announced the first recipients of the 10 leadership scholarships established this year. The leadership scholarship program was begun as a result of a challenge set by the Amarillo Area Foundation (AAF) to build leadership scholarships for students in the northernmost 26 counties of Texas.

According to the agreement with the AAF, the WTAMU Foundation will receive matching funds to continue the program for four years ending in 1996. Donors may state preference for students to be graduates of one of the 61 Panhandle area high schools or for transfer students from Amarillo College, Clarendon College or Frank Phillips College.

Scholarship recipients, except for the WTAMU Staff Leadership Scholarship, were selected by a University committee and approve by the trustees of the WTAMU Foundation. The WTAMU Staff Council selected the Staff Leadership Scholarship recipient.

"These campus leaders will someday become our teachers, businessmen, school board members and civic leaders," Dr. Dudley Moore, Jr., chair-



man of the WTAMU Foundation, said. "We welcome the opportunity to help them pursue their college careers."

Last December, 90 people were killed on Texas roads in alcohol-related crashes. This year, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) wants that number to drop by at least 5 percent.

"Of course, we'd like to see that number be a zero," said Gary Trietsch, director of TxDOT's Traffic Operations Division. "But every year, people who don't normally drink are going to parties and drinking more alcohol than they're accustomed to. Unintentionally, they become impaired driversand that's when they endanger themselves and others.'

The safety message for TxDOT's December campaign is "Texans Don't Let Friends Drive Drunk." The message encourages others to be responsible for themselves and others.

"If you are going to drink, know how to get home safely, by designating a sober driver, catching a cab, or calling a relative or friend to drive you home,' said Trietsch. "Don't let your friends drive home if they've been drinking. They may not appreciate your intervening at the time, but they'll live to thank you the next day."

In the United States, traffic crashes are the greatest single cause of death for people ages 6-33. Impaired drivers are responsible for half of these accidents.

After a decade of the combined efforts of TxDOT, the news media and many other organizations and volunteers, Texas has had a 32 percent decrease in the number of people who die in alcohol-related crashes during December.

"The holiday season is a time of giving thanks for all the good things-Family, friends and health," said Trietsch. "A crash caused by someone under the influence of alcohol or drugs destroys that celebration. Our message to all of Texas is, 'Enjoy the season and don't wreck your life."

HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING? **KEEP FOOD SAFETY IN MIND** Delicious food is often a special part of Thanksgiving, Christmas and other holiday events. Entertaining for family or friends on a small or large scale is fun, but often demanding, and definitely needs to be done with food safety in mind.

When planning a large scale event, keep in mind that preparing and handling large amounts of food will take planning ahead of time for safe preparation, storage and serving. If large quantities of food will be prepared ahead of time, quickly cool and refrigerate them. Divide into portions and store in shallow containers. Deep con-

the pot of food stays warm, encouraging bacterial growth. Consider the amount of refrigerator space avail-

from a deli or purchased from a caterer, transport them quickly, and serve immediately; or if purchased ahead of time, transport them quickly to your refrigerator where they should remain kitchen, keep hot foods hot. Chafing until serving time. If you're purchasing a large quantity of food items such as meat trays or any perishable foods, ask that they be packed in small portions, or do this when you get home. By doing this, you can replace trays often at the party event and not leave one large tray out for too long.

If holiday meals are served buffet style, this may mean that the food remain on the table as guest come and go. This is not the safest situation as foods left at warm room tempera-

a few of those that came with the Fort was Abraham Finsterwald, John Corcoran and Mark Huselby. From 1875-1879 Mobeetie was a rough and Rowdy town that was patronized by soldiers, Buffalo Hunters freighters, gamblers, cowboys and roughneck of all type.


