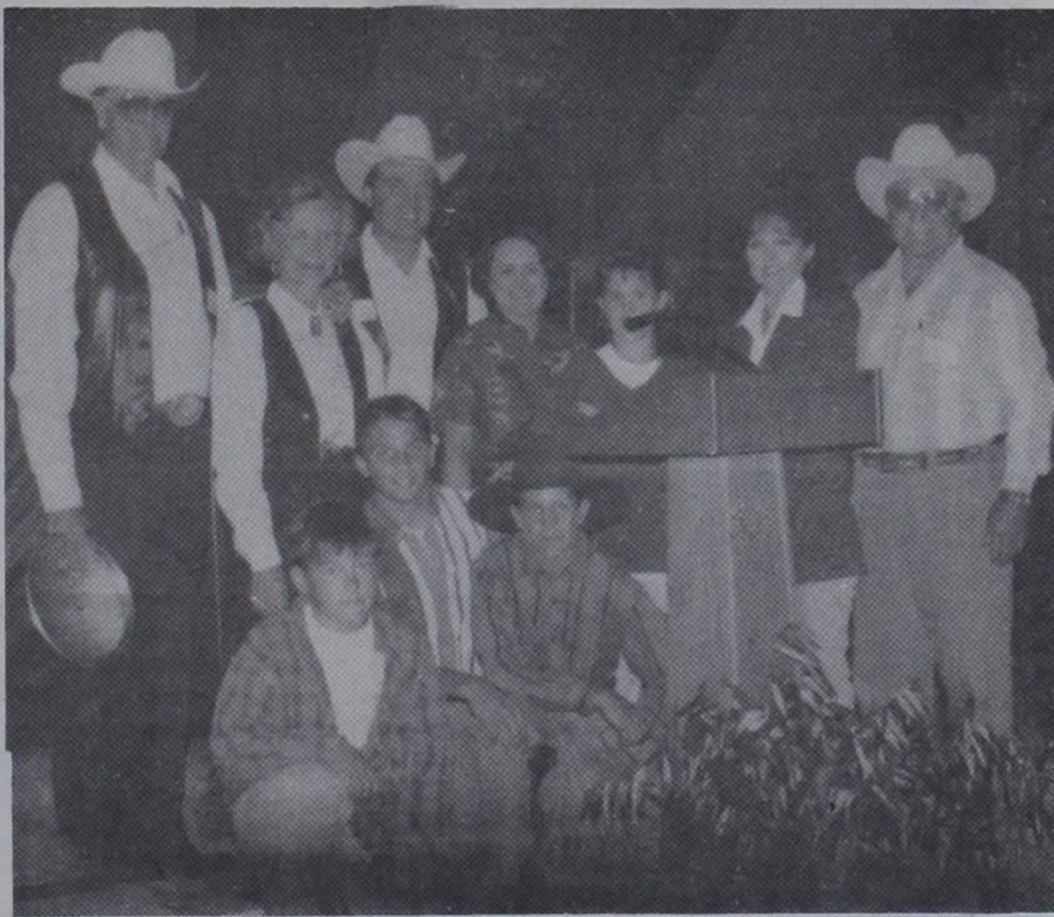

Wheeler moved 49 yards in seven plays. Andy Francis, making his first offensive start, scored the touchdown on a 21 yard run. Wheeler had several more scoring opportunities in the first half as Phillip Wiggins had two interceptions and Chad Dunnam one to keep the ball on Quannah's end of the field. Penalties kept the Mustangs off the score board until Ashley Brownfield kicked a 23 yard field goal with 6:49 left to put Wheeler up 10-6. That completed the first half scoring as the highlight of the rest of the half was watching the officials call 'delay of game' penalties on both teams.

The Mustangs clung to the 10-6 lead throughout the third quarter as they forced a fumble by Jackson, which they recovered at their own 28. When the Indians once again drove into Wheeler territory, Wiggins made his third interception of the night and returned the ball approximately 50 yards to the Quannah 27. Wheeler then scored the clinching score four plays later as Chad Dunnam powered in from the six with 3:11 left in the game.

Andy Francis' play at fullback seemed to give the Mustangs an offensive spark as he made several outstanding runs in gaining 120 yards (Continued Page 9)

## Overseeding Of Highly Erodible Land Deadline

The end of summer brings many changes to the Texas panhandle—children return to school, local football teams suit up and begin workouts, leaves change color, the nights turn cooler. Agriculture is also changed. Small grains are planted in the anticipation of providing grazing during the winter and grain next spring.

The Food Security Act of 1985 has dramatically affected farming. Low residue crops that are produced on highly erodible soils must be either overseeded with small grains or stripcropped in order to reduce wind erosion. Wheat or rye is broadcast during the final cultivation or planted using a modified drill. Some ground disturbance is usually needed for adequate results. Overseeding should be completed by October 15 and acreages certified with the ASCS office.

A field that is scheduled for stripcropping should be planted to small grains strips if sorghum strips have not been planted. The width between strips depends on the type of soil and the direction of the cotton rows. A farmer should refer to his conservation plan or consult the Soil Conservation Service for proper widths.

Fields with terraces require periodic maintenance that must be performed before wheat is planted. The terrace

height must be maintained to prevent breaching, blocks must be kept up, or outlets must be kept stable. A basic rule of thumb for plowing up terraces is to make one pass plowing up the terrace for every pass that is made plowing down the terrace. For example, if a field is plowed with an offset disk twice, terraces should be plowed up with a breaking plow twice. This is only a rule of thumb. The type of implement will dictate the amount of height to be rebuilt.

Producers are reminded that all practices are to be completed as scheduled. Failure to do so could jeopardize government payments. Soil Conservation Service personnel have begun servicing plans to verify compliance. If any producer has questions concerning compliance, he should consult the SCS office for assistance. The Soil Conservation Service does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, sex, age, handicap, religion, or national origin.

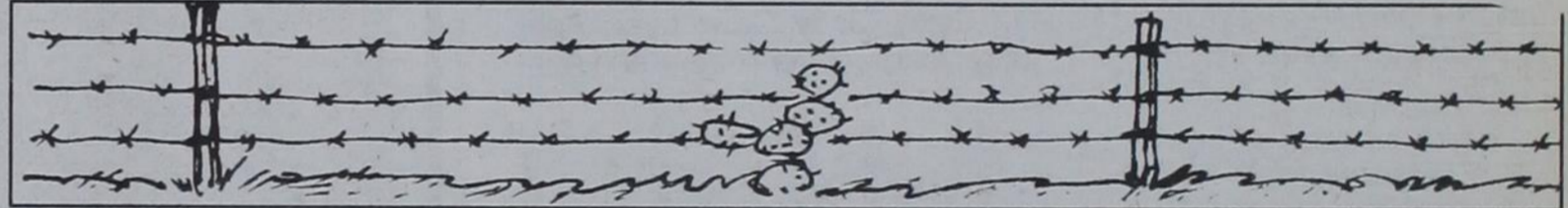

### From The Minister's Desk:

My good friend Charles Hodge, the minister of the Church of Christ in Duncanville, Texas, recently published a book that was entitled, *Onion Creek Philosophy*. This book contains many bulletin articles that he has written during his ministry.

One of these articles emphasized the delicate distinction that disciples of Jesus must make between the sin and the sinner. This article is entitled, "On Hating Sin and Loving Sinners" and it says:—

"It is one simple fact that Christians are to hate sin yet love sinners. So simple to preach yet so difficult to practice. It appears contradictory. Some preach against sin so heatedly they cannot accept or love a sinner—others accept and love sinners to the degree they cannot preach against sin. Both of these attitudes are wrong. We must hate sin while loving sinners. There is no contradiction, compromise, or softness involved."

"To illustrate—I hate cancer but love cancer patients. There is no contradiction in this. Even if their cancer was basically self-caused. Even if cigarette smoking caused the lung cancer the patient is still loved, aided, and served. Cancer patients must not be shot because we preach against cigarettes. Booze can cause cirrhosis of the liver but the patient must still be loved with compassion. The point is vividly this—illness is hated but sick people are loved."
