Wheeler had several more scoring opportunities in the first half as Phillip Wiggins had two interceptions and Chad Dunnam one to keep the ball on Quanah's end of the field. Penalties kept the Mustangs off the score board until Ashley Brownfild kicked a 23 yard field goal with 6.49 left to put Wheeler up 10-6. That completed the first half scoring as the highlight of the rest of the half was watching the officials call 'delay of game' penalties on both teams.

The Mustangs clung to the 10-6 lead throughout the third quarter as they forced a fumble by Jackson, which they recovered at their own 28. When the Indians once again drove into Wheeler territory, Wiggins made his third interception of the night and returned the ball approximately 50 yards to the Quanah 27. Wheeler then scored the clinching scorefour plays later as Chad Dunnam powered in from the six with 3:11 left in the game.

SOCIAL SECURITY TAXATION RULES EFFECTIVE JAN. 1

You have read about it in the newspapers and heard it on the radio and television. Because of a new law, some people will now pay higher income tax on their Social Security benefits. Other beneficiaries will pay the same rate they did last year, but most people will still not have to pay taxes on their Social Security benefits. To explain the details so you will know whether the tax change applies to you.

Generally, it is people in the upper income brackets who must pay taxes on their Social Security benefits. That is, if you are married and you and your spouse have a combined income of between \$32,000 and \$44,000, or you are single and your income is between \$25,000 and \$34,000, up to 50 percent of your Social Security benefits is

FSA COMPLIANCE DEADLINE

If you believe you are eligible for this refund, contact the Comptroller's Office at 1-800-252-1382 for a refund claim form, or obtain one at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office.

The Comptroller's Office is authorized to make refunds only for claims received by November 1, 1993. Claim forms and refunds of the \$5 special license fee paid on or after August 30, 1993, will be available only from County Tax Assessor-Collectors.

Overseeding Of Highly **Erodible Land Deadline**

The end of summer brings many changes to the Texas panhandlechildren return to school, local football teams suit up and begin workouts. leaves change color, the nights turn cooler. Agriculture is also changed. Small grains are planted in the anticipation of providing grazing during the winter and grain next spring.

The Food Security Act of 1985 has dramatically affected farming. Low residue crops that are produced on highly erodible soils must be either overseeded with small grains or stripcropped in order to reduce wind erosion. Wheat or rye is broadcast during the final cultivation or planted using a modified drill. Some ground disturbance is usually needed for adequate results. Overseeding should be completed by October 15 and acreages certified with the ASCS office.

A field that is scheduled for stripcropping should be planted to small grains strips if sorghum strips have not been planted. The width between strips depends on the type of soil and the direction of the cotton rows. A farmer should refer to his conservation plan or consult the Soil Conservation Service for proper



The type of implement will dictate the amount of height to be rebuilt.




