



The family requests memorials be to Ridgecrest Baptist Church.





Ola Paton Barry, 97, died Wednesday, Nov. 3, 1993.







If you can, visualize this picture in your mind. You live out in the country on top of a hill, below your home you can see up and down Sweetwater creek for 3 or 4 miles in either direction. Directly below your home you have three fields of haygrazer, that has grown about 7 feet tall since you well behaved and loved by all. bailed it the last time and 50 or so acres of Plains Bluestem that is strip high on a 18 hand horse. Along with this you also have 450 or so acres of native grass that is all tall as the improved grass. This is about one/half of your winter pasture, the other half is 750 Large Round bales of hay that is stacked in three different places around your creek bottom. This is also the home of countless deer and quail and all the other wildlife that is found along Sweetwater Creek, not to mention the future winter home of your

You and your family are returning home from a friends house after a wonderful meal and several hours of great conversation, you top the hill and turn into your drive and your heart rate triples. You look down at the creek bottom and it looks like the whole world is on fire. All kinds of thoughts go through your head, all bad. You run into the house and call the Sheriff's office and tell the lady on the other end on the line that you have a grass fire and you know that this fall is the driest on record and they can't get here in time.

You get into the pickup and drive to your turn so you can direct the fire trucks along the creek and through the haygrazer field past the haystack to the fire. As you drive down the hill you see car lights coming down the road from the other side, it is Jimmy Adams, he says the fire trucks are about 4 minutes behind him.

From the time you place the call to the Sheriff's office until the fire trucks arrive is about 12 minutes, in another 20 minutes the fire is under control and your thoughts change, you think about how blessed you are to have such good friends. Forest and when them forest service boys came by to get us they loaded our rigs on flat trailers and we had to ride our rigs as there wuz no room in the cabs of the trucks for us. We got to the fire area and unloaded and we headed for the big blaze and it wuz big. No chain saws back then and we had to doze our way through. I wuz workin in an area and seen this old sort of a dugout near by and kept workin and when one

I got paid a buck fifty for my efforts and we wuz supposed to get grub and rest. We found the boys at the rest camp had et our grub but when I finally got home I didnt realize it but the smoke and grime in my duds gave Mama posion oak. She kept it for many weeks.
