Any doubts about the capabilities of the 1993 Wheeler Mustangs to match up with any team on their schedule were dispelled Friday night at Nicholson Field in the homecoming contest against the Spearman Lynx. Although the Mustangs came up nine points short in the 22-13 loss, they gave as good as they took against the

highly regarded Lynx. In a game de-

cided by big plays, Spearman simply

made one more than the Mustangs. Wheeler struck first as Heath Sabbe hit Jarrod Ledbetter behind the Lynx secondary for a 59 yard touchdown with 8:50 left in the first period. Ashley Brownfield kicked the extra point and Wheeler led 7-0. Three plays later, Spearman evened the score as Radar Garcia broke a twisting 71 yard run in which he outmaneuvered Mustang defenders by cutting back and forth across the field until he reached the

Later in first period, Spearman drove to the Mustang 20 where the Mustangs held on downs. Disaster struck Wheeler the first play following the change of possession as Wheeler fumbled the ball back to Spearman at the Wheeler 16. Five plays later, Brandon Vandenburg scored from the one on the first play of the second quarter.

On the extra point, Spearman caught the Mustangs sleeping as the holder pitched up the ball and ran into the end zone for what easily could have been a very important two points. Neither team was able to score again in first half as Spearman went to the locker room leading 15-7.

Just as they had in the first two games, the Stangs came out fired up in the second half and dominated the third quarter. The Mustangs spent most of the third and fourth quarters in Lynx territory threatening to score.

Twice when the Stangs were inside the Spearman 20, ten yard penalties ended promising drives. Wheeler still seemed to be a play away from a potentially tying touchdown when Spearman took possession at their own 21 following a Mustang punt with 5:45 left in the game. When Spearman QB Jason Varner ran the option to the left, the Mustangs overcommitted to stopping the pitchman and no one tackled Varner. Seventy-nine yards later, he was in the end zone and pretty much took Wheeler's chances of winning with him. The Mustangs refused to quit and marched right back downfield following the kickoff. 



## PROSPER & BE IN HEALTH (Part 2)

People often try to explain away the good promises of God that are in the Bible. They will say things such as "that's not for today", "that passed away", or"you're taking that out of context". I don't know how many times I have heard that last one. Whenever you quote a wonderful promise from the Word of God, people can often see that it indeed says what you are telling them, but they decided that if must be out of context. Here is something very interesting. In my 24 years of ministry, no one has ever said I was taking the verse out of context when I quoted John 3:16. It says that God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life, Nobody has ever told me that this verse has passed away. Nobody has ever told me that it isn't for today. Nobody has ever told me that I was taking it out of context and therefore it couldn't mean what it says, even though in most cases they had no idea what John 3:15 said or what John 3:17 said. They didn't even know the context, yet they believed that God meant what He said.

Don't misunderstand me. Taking Scriptures out of context will get you into error. But the fact is, it is not out of context to tell you that God's plan for your life includes an abundant supply for you and health. The Apostle John writing under the inspiritation of the Holy Spirit said in III John, verse 2, "Beloved, I wish above all things that thou mayest prosper and be in health, even as thy soul prospereth." If those words are from the Holy Spirit and not just John, there it is the desire of the Lord for the person being written to to prosper and be in health, even as the soul prospers. Not only that, it is a wish from the Lord that He said is "above all things". He gives it high priority. He really wants people to prosper and be in health. Now, if you take the position that it is the Lord's wish all right, but it is for Gaius and not us because the book was written to him, then will you be consistent and conclude that the entire book is not for us? Statements in the book about walking in truth and following good instead of evil certainly would be God's will for us today. If so, then the statement about God wanting prosperity and health is for us today too.

Keep in mind that John was not a novice. This man was elderly. He had walked with God a long time when He wrote this. He had been with Jesus in his earlier years. He sat next to Jesus at supper. He was an original apostle as well as an elder of the church. The man had a great deal of spiritual maturity and knowledge about God and God's will. For him to say that the Lord wanted prosperity and health carries a lot of weight. Someone else that just started preaching last week might be considered ignorant about the real will of God in making such a statement.

I have stressed this so strongly because so many people allow themselves to be cheated in life out of things that God really desires for them. Now, after going into such detail about that, I will point out to you that a teaching should not be emphasized strongly if there is only one verse of Scripture in the entire Bible about it. However, there is much in the Word about God's plan for prosperity and health for His children. I'll show you more of these promises next time. For now, go ahead and believe III John 2 because it expresses in a concise nutshell form what God wants in your life.



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

## EMERGENCY FARM LOAN APPLICATIONS BEING ACCEPTED

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rain, flash flooding, hail, and high winds, which occured on July 6, 1993 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at 1224 N. Hobart, Suite 102, FmHA County Supervisor, Johnny W. Earp IV, said today.

Wheeler and Gray Counties are two of the five contiguous counties to Collingsworth County in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from excessive rain, flash flooding, hail, and high winds, which occured on July 6, 1993. Mr. Earp said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to

80 percent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$5000,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Earp said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until 5/2/94, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. Earp said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office is located at 1224 N. Hobart, Suite 102, Pampa, Texas. Our hours are 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 P.M. to 4:00 P.M. Monday through Friday. Their goal was to pick a muffin that was not only delicious, but also low enough in fat, calories and sodium to be considered a part of a low-fat eating plan.

For those who enjoy including muffins as part of their healthful diet, here are some tips on improving the nutrition profile of muffins and other baked goods without sacrificing taste:

\* Use nonfat yogurt to replace sour

\* Replace one whole egg with 1/4 cup egg substitute or two egg whites. Include spices such as ginger, cinnamon, allspice and grated orange

peel to make up for any flavor losses that might occur when fat is reduced. \* Substitute brown sugar for granulated sugar for a richer taste.

Cut down on nuts; don't eliminate them. Although they are high in fat, a few can add taste and texture without damaging a healthful eating plan.

\* Use a rubber spatula to stir dry and wet ingredients together just until dry ingredients are moistened. Over working a muffin batter will develop the gluten in the flour and yield a tougher product.







**Facts About Dried Fruits** Dried fruits have concentrated nutrients because drying reduces water. As a result, dry fruit is generally high in minerals and sometimes in beta-carotene. Dried fruit is also high in fiber and is fat-free. However, dried fruit loses most of its vitamin C in the drying process and the sugar, like the minerals, is concentrated. Dried fruit may contain as much as 70 percent sugar by weight, which approaches the level in some candies. Dried fruits often contain sulfites, a preservative, to which some people are allergic. Dried fruits tend to stick to your teeth and can promote tooth decay. Brushing and flossing soon after eating dried fruits is important.


