The District 2-2A Cross Country meet was held Monday, October 25th, at the Wheeler School Campus. The varsity girls race was highly competitive between the top three teams. Panhandle placed first with a total of

38 points, followed by Wheeler with 44 points, Wellington with 45 points and Clarendon with 108 points. The top two teams advance to the Region I meet in Lubbock.

The top five individual runners also qualify for the regional meet. Katie Johnson of Wellington was the individual winner, competing in the two mile course in 12:48. Amber DeVass of Wellington placed second in 13:03, Dena Compton of Wheeler placed third in 13:04, Katy Neusch of Panhandle placed 4th in 13:07 and Kary Beddingfield of Panhandle placed fifth in 13:09. Other Wheeler team members include Angie Thomas, Marcie Rose, Cassi Wallace, Melissa Chapman, Nissa Boedeker and

Amanda Rives.

Clarendon was the only full boys' team to compete in the district meet and took home the first place trophy. Phillipp Stroyly of Wheeler was the first place individual winner. Phillipp crossed the line in 18:01 to defeat the second place finisher by over two minutes. Greg Bryant also qualified for the regional meet by placing fifth in 22:14.

The Regional qualifiers will compete in the Region I meet that will be held at Mae Simmons Park in Lubbock on November 6th.

The main goal for the Wheeler team is to get healthy. Several of the runners have been sick for the past week. Hopefully everyone can recover and return to top form for regional.

The Wheeler Mustangs made Friday night's journey to Wellington a memorable one as they played their best game of the year to overwhelm the Skyrockets 42-13. With their dominating win, the Mustangs have positioned themselves as a factor in the district race.

The first half bore an eerie similarity to last week's game with Memphis. In that game, Memphis dominated the first half, but was unable to score and the Mustangs took over in the second half. In this game, Wheeler totally dominated the first half but only scored one touchdown. The Stangs got that TD on the second possession as Wheeler recovered a Wellington fumble on the Skyrocket 27. Ashley Brownfield scored from the 5 six plays later. The Mustangs appeared to be about to add to their score on numerous occasions in the first half, but holding penalties, a busted play, and a missed field goal kept them off the board. Even though the Stangs finished the first half with 144 total yards to the Skyrockets' 66, Mustang fans were nervous knowing a seven point lead could disappear in a hurry.

These fears appeared justified as Wellington took the second half kickoff and moved rapidly downfield to the Wheeler ten yard line. Wellington QB Clifton Barns attempted to pass under heavy pressure for the Mustang rush and threw the ball up for grabs. Chad Dunnam intercepted the ball and was downed on the 1 inch line. The Mustangs then set a record that will never be broken unless the field dimensions are changed by driving 99 yards 35 inches to score. Brownfield broke loose for a 52 yard TD as the Stangs covered the length of the field in only six plays.

If the Stangs breathed a sigh of relief, it was short lived as Jason Mathis then went 80 yards on the Rockets first play after the kickoff. Mathis is a sophomore speedster the Rockets have expected great things from, but until Friday night he had been some-

what of a disappointment. Unfortunately for the Stangs, he had his coming out party Friday night, rushing for 222 yards and scoring 2 TDs. Had the Mustang offense not been so proficient, he could have made a difference in the outcome of the game.

On this night, however, the Stangs were not to be stopped. Following Mathis' run to make the score 14-7 Wheeler, the Mustangs promptly answered as Ciraco Meraz returned the kickoff to the Wheeler 41, then the Mustangs covered the 59 yards in 10 plays with Brownfield scoring his third TD on a 3 yard run. The track meet continued on the next series as Mathis and Burns led the Rockets downfield once again with Mathis scoring on a 5 yard run, capping an 8 play 73 yard drive. On the extra point, the snap was fumbled, leaving the score 21-13.

The Stangs wasted no time in retaliating as Andy Francis went 66 yards on the first play following to kickoff to put Wheeler 28-13. Even though it was now Wellington's turn to score, the Stangs decided enough of this and jumped on a Wellington fumble at the Rocket 19. Chad Dunnam scored on the second play from the 14, putting the Stangs up 35-13 with 7:36 left to play. Mathis then went 56 yards against the tired Mustang defense before being caught at the Wheeler 11. The Stangs then held and took over on their own 15. Against an even tired Skyrocket defense, the Mustangs then moved 85 yards in 10 plays with Chad Dunnam scoring from the 1 with 22 seconds left in the game, making the final score 42-13.

Ashley Brownfield had a tremendous night, continually bowling over Skyrocket tacklers, carrying the ball 30 times for 203 yards and 3 TDs. Andy Francis once again provided big plays from the fullback position, gain-

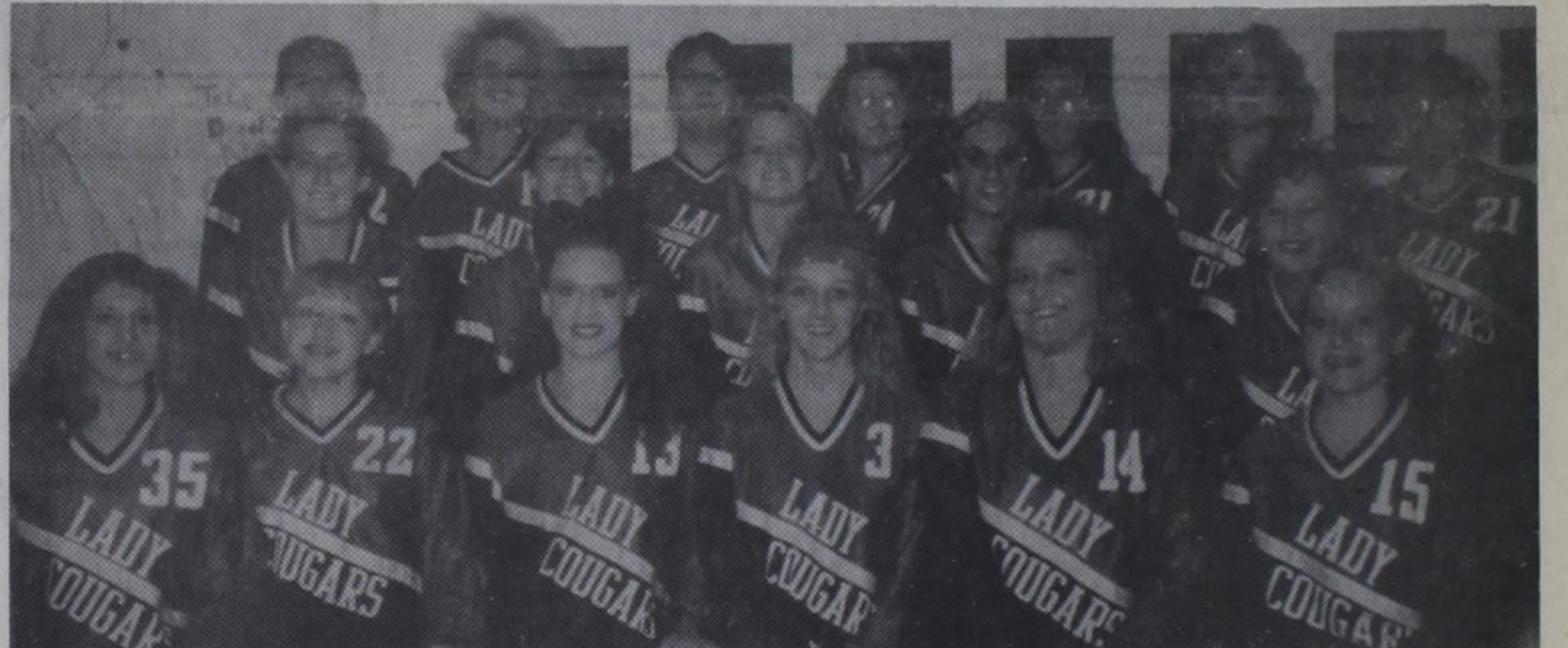
Clarendon will be a major test for the Mustang defense. The Broncos have an explosive big play offense, which has more good running backs than should be legal. Luckily for the Mustangs, this is a football game and not a relay race so the Stangs just have to tackle the one carrying the ball

each time. The problem for Wheeler is big plays have been the Achilles heel of the Stangs as very few teams have mounted long sustained scoring drives against them, but nearly everyone they have played has been able to score from anywhere on the field. While it is probably unlikely they can completely shut down the speedy Broncos, the Stangs must stay alert every time Clarendon has the ball and try and limit the damage. The best way to do that is for Wheeler to continue to hog the ball as they did last week.

The game should be an interesting

contrast of styles as it matches the physical ball control style of the Stangs against the finesse of the speedy, explosive Broncos.

Ashley Brownfield received the Amarillo Globe News Player of the Week for his performance against Wellington. If Brownfield, Andy Francis and Chad Dunnam can put up similar numbers again this week, the Stangs should have a good chance to get by Clarendon and set up a showdown next week with Canadian for a portion of the District Championship.

Extension Update

Underactivity, Not Overeating, May Cause Excess Body Fat
Recently reported in the *Journal of the American Dietetic Association* was the results of a study on the effect of exercise on fat reduction. During a 10-day study, nine men over age 65 engaged in normal life activities and consumed substantially more energy than currently recommended for their age group. Researchers at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Human Nutrition Research Center on Aging at Tufts University, Boston, Mass., concluded that overweight is more likely due to too little physical activity throughout the day than to overeating. Previously, the researchers had reported similar findings for men in their twenties. All the men studied were of average weight.

No correlation existed between the men's level of body fat and their energy intake in either age group, but there was a significant inverse relationship with physical activity. In other words, the more activity, the less body fat.

The results were reported in the December 1992 issue of *International Journal of Obesity*, suggest that the current Recommended Dietary Allowances (RDAs) for energy may significantly underestimate actual energy requirements.

Training will include identification and control of insects on wheat, cotton and grain sorghum by Dr. Carl Patrick, identification and control of diseases on wheat, cotton and grain by Dr. Brent Bean, insect control of insects on beef cattle by Dr. Carl Patrick, record keeping requirements and worker protection standards by Martha Edwards, herbicide recommendations and label information by J.F. Cadenhead, preventing ground water contamination at the well head by C.E. Williams and equipment calibration techniques and application methods by J.F. Cadenhead.

Anyone who holds a Texas Department of Agriculture pesticide applicator license is welcome to attend.

BASS POPULATION SURVEYED IN GREENBELT RESERVOIR

Texas Parks and Wildlife Inland Fisheries crews recently finished surveying the bass population in Greenbelt Reservoir. Samples were collected by nighttime electrofishing at six 15-minute stations. All the bass collected were in good condition and there is ample food available as sunfish were collected at a rate of over 900 fish/hour and gizzard shad were collected at 37 fish/hour.

Even though condition of bass in Greenbelt is good, our annual surveys indicate that anglers are impacting the populations. While our total catch rate for Largemouth bass has increased from 37 fish/hour in 1990 to 160 fish/hour in 1993, the catch rate of fish 14 inches long or longer has only increased from 1 fish/hour to 3.3 fish per hour. If we removed young-of-the-year fish from the sample and look at only 8 inch and longer fish, the proportion that are 14 inches long or longer has essentially remained unchanged at about 12%. This proportion should increase with increased protection of an expanding population.

The same thing can be seen with smallmouth bass. Only one smallmouth over 14 inches has been collected in our surveys since 1990 and total catch rates have only slightly improved. The population structure shows that most smallmouth bass disappear from the population as soon as they reach 14 inches in length.

The conclusion that can be drawn from this information is that, while the 14 inch length limit is protecting brood fish and allowing the population to increase, anglers are removing the larger fish as soon as they become legal. There are more fish in the population which should improve catch rates and harvest rates, but the quality of fishing will not improve without anglers practicing catch and release.

Anglers control the quality of the fishing at each reservoir by controlling their own harvest. If anglers would release even half of the legal fish they catch, there is no telling how much fishing could improve at Greenbelt. Greenbelt maintains good water, good habitat, and a good base population of

bass, with some long term help from anglers it could become a place for anglers to regularly catch trophy bass.

Dept. of Agriculture Reorganization Act

The following has been proposed by the Secretary of Agriculture and is before Congress as House Bill #3171.

A Farm Service Agency (FSA) will be established through the collocation of ASCS, FCIC and programs administered by FmHA except for the rural development program. The FSA will carry out programs relating to:

- *Price and income support and other related programs
- *Supervision of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation
- *Agricultural credit programs, formerly assigned to FmHa, and other lending programs for persons engaged in the production of agriculture.

Not included in the function of the Farm Service Agency are Conservation Programs (ACP, CRP, ECP, etc.) which are to be assigned to the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

*ACP approval authority will be taken away from a producer elected county committee.

In each county or area the Secretary may establish a county or area committee in which activities of the Farm Service Agency are carried out. The committee will consist of five members who are fairly representative of the farmers in the county or areas. Three of the members shall be elected by the farmers in the county or area under such procedures as the Secretary may prescribe. Two members shall be appointed by the Secretary. The members shall serve for terms not to exceed three years.
