The Panhandle Panthers were rude guests Friday night at Nicholson Field. Every time the Wheeler Mustangs offered them a gift, they took it. The result of this generosity was a 33-7 Panhandle victory.

With a strong north wind blowing Wheeler won the coin toss and, as they normally do when the wind is a factor, elected to kick off and defend the north goal, hoping to pin Panhandle deep in their own end of the field. The Panthers threw a big mon- e key wrench into the Mustangs plans as Mark Land took the kickoff and started up the middle cut to his left as the only Mustang in sight then missed him, allowing him an easy stroll to the end zone. Wheeler got a break as the extra point was missed, however it seemed more significant at the time than it turned out to be. Following the kickoff, the lights went out for thirtyfive minutes. 



WHAT IS FAITH?

Hebrews 11:6 says that it is impossible to please God without faith. No matter how moral you are, how much you attend church, or how well you train your children, if you don't have faith, you can't please God. So many people do so many things trying to live pleasing to God. Yet, they don't even know what faith is. Nowadays, about all some people hear about faith is how wrong it is to teach people to have it. However, Jesus said, "Have faith in God." He told people numerous times that they could receive from God what they could believe for, and He rebuked His followers several times for unbelief, doubt, and lack of faith. Jesus said that if you had faith as a mustard seed, you could move a mountain.

What is faith? Surprisingly, veteran Christians often cannot tell you the answer to that question. Yet, nobody can please God without it. The Bible says that faith is the substance of things hoped for and the evidence of things not seen. But, what does that mean? Simply stated, it means that faith is being confident of the things that you hope for and being convinced of things that you can't see yet. How can you believe something you can't see? Well, it is not difficult to believe what you can't see. You cannot see electricity in your house, but you can see what it does. You cannot see air, but you breathe it to live. So, you already believe in some things that you

Could you believe God is present in the room even though you cannot see Him? Certainly. Could you believe that everything was okay with your body after having a surgery and hearing the surgeon say, 'Everything went great. There are no problems. You are fine?" Surely, you can believe that, even though you may be hurting worse at that precise moment than you were before the surgery. How could you believe that if you are actually hurting worse? You would believe that because the doctor said so, and you have confidence in him. See, you believe based on what is said by a reputable source rather than according to what you see and feel at the moment.

That is the way faith works. You can take what God's Word says about something and believe according to that even if the circumstances of life indicate just the opposite. For example, you could believe you were healed even when you were hurting simply because the Word of God says you are. People think that is fanatical, extreme, weird, and far out to believe something like that. They have no problem believing what the doctor says as illustrated above, but find it hard to believe God who never has lied, never will lie, and says very plainly what He means.

The Word of God tells us to follow the faith of Abraham. It says that Abraham believed not according to what his circumstances dictated, but "according to that which was spoken" by God. You can read it in Romans 4:9-21. Find out what God says about the kinds of problems you are facing and believe it. You'll be amazed at how He will work in your behalf.

I was especially impressed by a recent article that he wrote which was entitled, "Environmentalism. This article read: —

At creation, God gave mankind "dominion over the fish of the sea, over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth." (Genesis 1: 26) Adam and Eve were commanded to "fill the earth and subdue it." (Genesis 1:28) What, then, are our rights and responsibilities concerning the environment? As usual, the truth lies between two extremes.

Some radical zealots want to give animals the same rights that people have. Garments containing leather or fur are abominations to them; they equate medical experiments on animals with similar experiences on humans; even eating meats is a no-no, and pets have been replaced by politically correct "companion animals". A significant segment of these militant activists identify with the "New Age" movement in which nature is virtually worshipped.

On the other extreme are reckless profiteers who do not hesitate to ruin God's handiwork for the sake of a fast buck. As my friend, Lee Fisher, would say,

these are not caretakers of the earth, but undertakers. They leave death, devastation, and destruction in their wake as they pillage, plunder, and pollute.

God's will is that we would use, but not abuse, His creation. He himself clothed Adam and Eve with animals skin, and authorized the eating of meat. (Genesis 3: 21,9:3) But scripture also commends the humane treatment of animals. Deuteronomy 25:4 prohibited muzzling the ox that treaded out the corn; work animals were to rest one day per week just as the Jews did. (Exodus 23: 12) Wise king Solomon wrote, "A righteous man regards the life of his animal, but the tender mercies of the wicked are cruel. (Proverbs 12:10)

Other environmental concerns also have a Biblical background. By decree of God, the Jews conserved their land by leaving it fallow every seventh year. (Leviticus 25:1-7) The Biblical principle of faithful stewardship embraces such practices as recycling and the avoidance of pollution.

Yes, God's people ought to be environmentally responsible. Let us never, however, confuse the Creator with His creation. To reverence a rock, worship a willow, or bow to darkened, and that one has exchanged God's truth for a lie. (Romans 1:18-25) In our dominion over the earth, let us neither desolate nor deify it.

Falcons End Season As Tiger League Champs




