SECOND ANNUAL MUSTANG STAMPEDE CROSS COUNTRY MEET HELD SATURDAY

The second annual Mustang Stampede Cross Country meet was held Saturday, October 9, at the Wheeler School campus. A cold north wind was the feature attraction for a morning of frigid races. Several scheduled teams chose to stay home instead of braving the elements. Although the numbers were a little less than expected, the enthusiasm of the contestants was high.

The J. V. girls race was the first event of the day. The Wheeler J.V. girls did an outstanding job and won first place. Cassie Wallace won the J.V. girls division in a time of 13:56. Cristy Glassey placed 4th in 14:22, Jeseka Wallace, 5th in 14:23; Julie Porter, 6th in 14:24; Mika Goad, 8th in 14:34; Lori Morrison, 9th in 14:44; Vanessa Baize, 14th in 15:05 and Stacy Maddux 18th in 15:22. Forty nine girls participated in the J.V. race.

The varsity girls race was won by a strong Booker team that was last year's Class 1-A state champions. Wheeler finished a close 2nd place with 41 points to Booker's 26. West Texas high placed 3rd with 67 points. White Deer 4th with 102 points; Wellington 5th with 135 points, Clarendon 6th with 165 points and Valley 7th with 174 points. Wheeler did an outstanding job and ran their best team effort of the season.

Marcy Leal of Pampa was the individual winner, running the two mile course in 11:56. Individual medalists for Wheeler included: Dena Compton 5th in 13:02; Angie Thomas, 8th in 13:22; Marcie Rose, 9th in 13:23; Nissa Boedeker, 11th in 13:30; Melissa Chapman, 13th in 13:38 and Amanda Rives 14th in 13:39. Vanessa Shepard was able to return to Competition after a three-week layoff due to illness. Vanessa finished 24th in a good time of 14:10. All of these girls ran an excellent race and should be in good shape for the district meet.

White Deer placed first in the J.V. boys race with 26 points and West

Texas High second with 29 points. Andrew Medlock of West Texas High was the individual winner with a time of 17:14.

A strong Pampa team won the varsity boys division with 27 points, followed by White Deer with 41 points; Ft. Elliott placed third with 61 points and Kelton, 4th with 110 points. Josh Jones of Pampa was the individual winner with a time of 15:03 and Duane Coffey of White Deer placed 2nd in 15:19. Wheeler's Phillip Strocz was an individual medalist, placing 20th in a time of 17:33; Greg Bryant placed 29th in 20:37 and John Porter, 30th in 21:36. These three young men are also preparing for the district meet and continue to improve each week.

Although the weather was less than cooperative, there were many compliments made by the visiting teams and coaches about how well the meet was conducted. We would like to thank all of the people who gave their time to stand in a cold wind on Saturday morning to make this meet a success.

The Wheeler Cross Country teams will travel to Canyon next week for their final invitational meet of the year before returning home for the district meet.

PANTHERS POUNCE MUSTANGS, 33-7

The Panhandle Panthers were rude guests Friday night at Nicholson Field. Every time the Wheeler Mustangs offered them a gift, they took it. The result of this generosity was a 33-7 Panhandle victory.

With a strong north wind blowing Wheeler won the coin toss and, as they normally do when the wind is a factor, elected to kick off and defend the north goal, hoping to pin Panhandle deep in their own end of the field. The Panthers threw a big monkey wrench into the Mustangs plans as Mark Land took the kickoff and started up the middle cut to his left as the only Mustang in sight then missed him, allowing him an easy stroll to the end zone. Wheeler got a break as the extra point was missed, however it seemed more significant at the time than it turned out to be. Following the kickoff, the lights went out for thirty-five minutes. Unfortunately for the Stangs, the lights were repaired and the game resumed.

Wheeler was unable to score in the first quarter and when Panhandle got the wind in the second quarter, quarterback Brady Shadid went to work. Taking advantage of a short punt into the wind, the Panthers moved the ball from the Wheeler 44 to the 10, where the Mustangs held and forced a field goal by Kelley Lesley. Wheeler then threw an interception on their second play after the kickoff. The Mustang defense once again held the Panthers and forced a 32 yard field goal by Lesley. At this point the Stangs de-

fense had played very well to hold off the Panthers, however the Stangs could play Russian Roulette only so long before disaster struck. Wheeler fumbled the ball to Panhandle on the Wheeler 25 the first play after the kickoff and this time they couldn't dodge the bullet. Shadid immediately hit Kurt Cockrell behind the Mustang secondary for the TD, making the score 19-0 after the extra point.

Wheeler appeared to be going to escape further second quarter dam-

age when Panhandle had the ball on their own 43 with only a minute left in the half, but once again Shadid hit Cockrell for another TD. Shadid presented the Mustangs with a problem they never could solve as his quickness made it difficult to rush him. He continually hit open receivers, finishing the game 10-20-1 with two TD passes, and scored on a 34 yard run to cap the scoring in fourth quarter.

Wheeler did make an attempt to get back into the game in the third quarter as Phillip Wiggins picked off a Shadid pass to set the Stangs up at the Panther 15. Four plays later, Andy Francis scored from the 2, Ashley Brownfield kicked the extra point and Wheeler trailed 26-7. After a Panhandle punt, Wheeler appeared on the move once more and just missed a TD on the hitch pass and lateral as Marcus

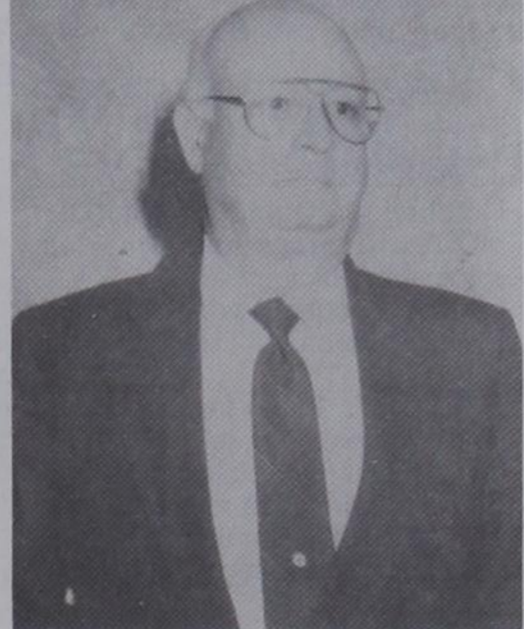

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WHAT IS FAITH?

Hebrews 11:6 says that it is impossible to please God without faith. No matter how moral you are, how much you attend church, or how well you train your children, if you don't have faith, you can't please God. So many people do so many things trying to live pleasing to God. Yet, they don't even know what faith is. Nowadays, about all some people hear about faith is how wrong it is to teach people to have it. However, Jesus said, "Have faith in God." He told people numerous times that they could receive from God what they could believe for, and He rebuked His followers several times for unbelief, doubt, and lack of faith. Jesus said that if you had faith as a mustard seed, you could move a mountain.

What is faith? Surprisingly, veteran Christians often cannot tell you the answer to that question. Yet, nobody can please God without it. The Bible says that faith is the substance of things hoped for and the evidence of things not seen. But, what does that mean? Simply stated, it means that faith is being confident of the things that you hope for and being convinced of things that you can't see yet. How can you believe something you can't see? Well, it is not difficult to believe what you can't see. You cannot see electricity in your house, but you can see what it does. You cannot see air, but you breathe it to live. So, you already believe in some things that you cannot see.

Could you believe God is present in the room even though you cannot see Him? Certainly. Could you believe that everything was okay with your body after having a surgery and hearing the surgeon say, "Everything went great. There are no problems. You are fine?" Surely, you can believe that, even though you may be hurting worse at that precise moment than you were before the surgery. How could you believe that if you are actually hurting worse? You would believe that because the doctor said so, and you have confidence in him. See, you believe based on what is said by a reputable source rather than according to what you see and feel at the moment.

That is the way faith works. You can take what God's Word says about something and believe according to that even if the circumstances of life indicate just the opposite. For example, you could believe you were healed even when you were hurting simply because the Word of God says you are. People think that is fanatical, extreme, weird, and far out to believe something like that. They have no problem believing what the doctor says as illustrated above, but find it hard to believe God who never has lied, never will lie, and says very plainly what He means.

The Word of God tells us to follow the faith of Abraham. It says that Abraham believed not according to what his circumstances dictated, but "according to that which was spoken" by God. You can read it in Romans 4:9-21. Find out what God says about the kinds of problems you are facing and believe it. You'll be amazed at how He will work in your behalf.

So the movie theatres all over the U.S.A. were helping. Customarily the theatre owner would contribute the intake from a nights run to Polio Research. We set our, date and advertised. The house was filled—A lot of the people came from the Allison area. The Levitts, with Tommy, were present. At intermission after the first run, the lights were turned on and my husband, Lee, walked down the aisle, lifted little Tommy from his wheelchair and said: "Ladies and gentlemen, our Polio child, Tommy Levitt". The assembly rose and cheered. Their hearts were full of hope, grateful that they could contribute a bit to the relief of thousands of children like Tommy.

It's been a long time since I've shed tears for the "good ole days", but today's musing has just about done me in.

(I hope Mrs. Levitt turns in a report of Tommy's wedding.)

Now back to the Levi Blanket. What do you do with worn out jeans? What a waste to put them in the "trash", Recycle is the way to do it, cut the

good part into squares (If there's a hole or spot of paint, put a bright colored hobo patch over it.) Sew squares into the size cover you need. Line it with bandana print or colorful cotton flannel. (outing) tack front and lining together with bright yarn. There! you have a practical, washable blan-

ket for camping, scouting, winter time pickup equipment, and if it is as neat and attractive as one Anita Reeves made, it could be a guest room accessory or a conversation piece.

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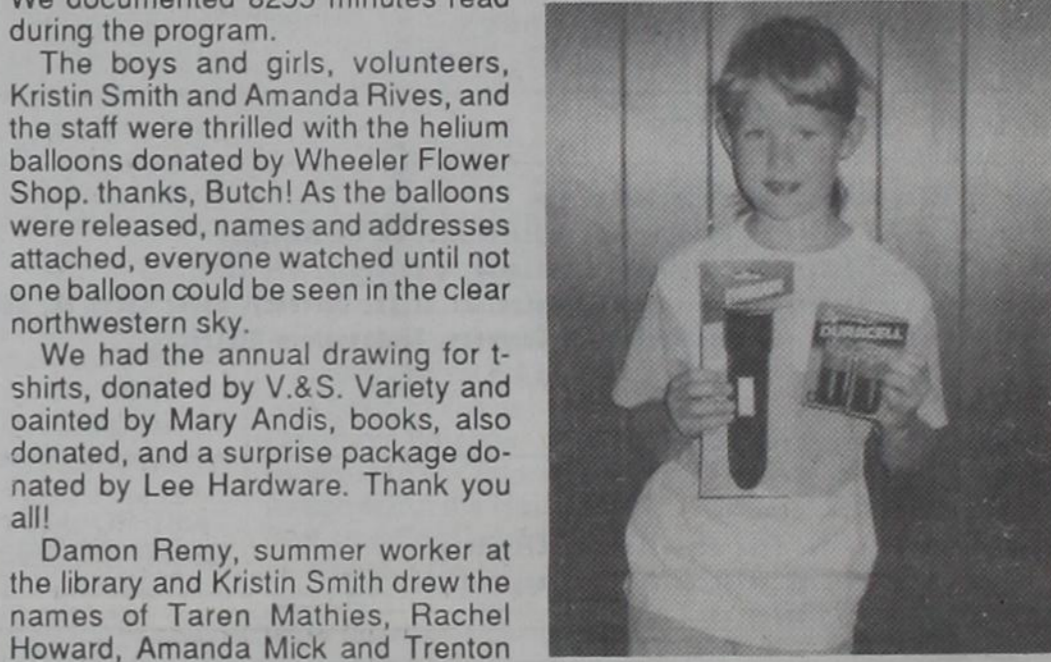
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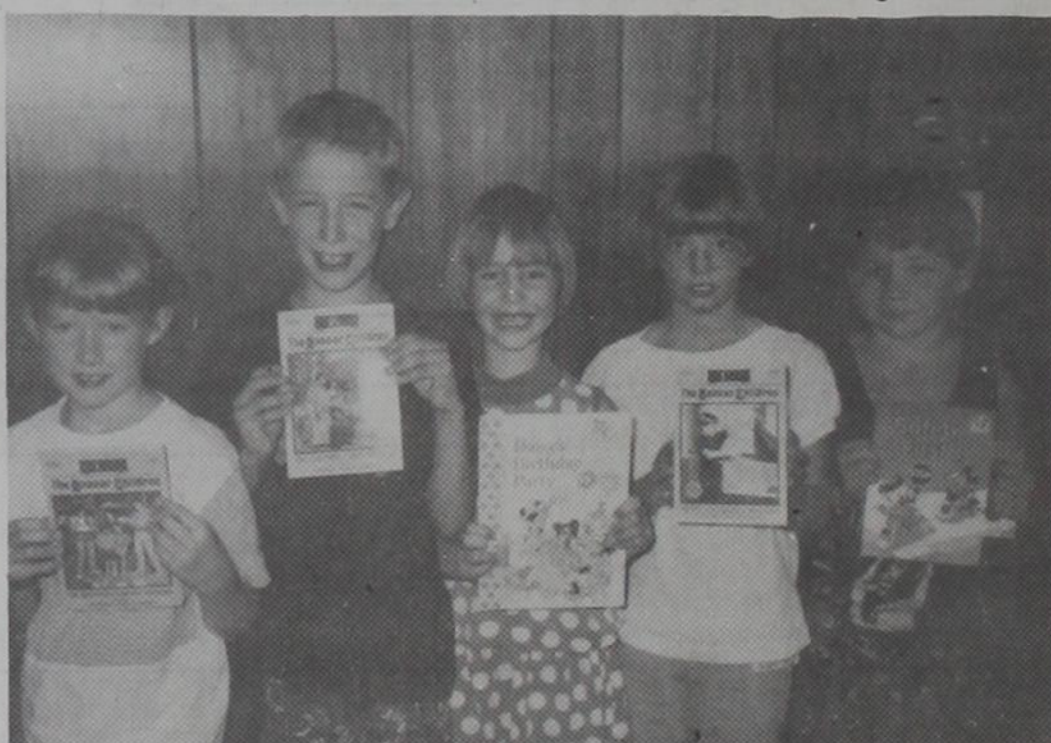
