BOOKER KIOWAS BLANK MUSTANGS, 14-0

Long time Wheeler Mustang fans could hardly keep from having a sense of deja vu Friday night at Booker. In 1986 a favored Mustang team came off an emotional game with Sunray and walked confidently into Booker stadium expecting an easy win over a weaker Booker team. That night a fired-up Booker team all but ran the Mustangs out of the stadium in pinning a 29-0 loss on the Stangs. Friday night history repeated itself as Wheeler came off of an emotional

well-played game with Spearman to travel to Booker to take on the underdog Kiowas. This year, the game was not quite as one-sided as the 1986, but a sky-high Booker team still hung a 14-0 loss on a flat Mustang team. Turnovers were the Mustang Achilles Heel Friday night as Wheeler had four fumbles and two interceptions.

Both Booker scores came after Wheeler fumbles gave the Kiowas the ball in Mustang territory. Toby Wynn batted down a first quarter pitch, while Booker recovered on the Mustang 39. Booker scored in three plays as quarterback Riley Pinchard hit consecutive passes of 27 and 11 yards the latter to William Lehman for the

touchdown. The kick put Booker up 7-0, which was the way the score stayed the rest of the first half.

In the third quarter, Booker once again pounced on a Mustang fumble, this time at the Wheeler 47. Just as they did after recovering the fumble that led to their first score, the Kiowas looked like the Dallas Cowboys as they moved the 47 yards in five plays for their second touchdown. Booker only made five first downs for the night, but two of them came on their first TD drive and the other three came on their second drive. Kelly Garton scored the touchdown from nine yards out and Booker led 14-0.

Mustang fans still had hopes for a Wheeler comeback at this point as there was still over a quarter to play and Wheeler had moved the ball consistently on the Kiowas when they

held on to it. However it was not to be as the Mustangs continued to make mistakes and never managed to dent the Booker goal line. While Wheeler seemed to be shooting themselves in the foot all night, credit must also be given to a swarming Booker defense, which continually made big plays to stop the Mustangs. In particular, linebacker Creed Hoover must have wanted to play for the Mustangs as he spent most of the night in the Wheeler backfield. The 182 yards the Mustangs gained was their lowest yardage total of the season. Booker only gained 119 yards themselves, as except for the two scoring drives, the Mustangs completely shut down the Kiowa offense, but seldom has a team gotten so much scoring from so little offense.

Chad Dunnam led the Mustang run-

ners as he gained a hard-earned 92 yards on 30 carries. Heath Sabbe completed five of eleven passes with two interceptions but threw the ball better than the statistics indicate. Some passes were chopped and both interceptions came in "must pass" situations where Booker was playing pass.

In 1986, after the Booker fiasco, the Mustangs did not lose another game until till the State semifinals. Most Mustang fans would be quite happy if history repeats itself once again.

Hundreds of veteran State employees are expected to accept a special legislative invitation, better known as SB 81, which raises the annuity for employees eligible to retire between September 30, 1993 and August 31, 1995. Effective September 30 the Texas Department of Transportation's Childress District, which includes thirteen counties, will lose an estimated 742 years of experience in 24 employees. Wheeler's own Elbert G. Gaines will take advantage of the retirement provision after 29 years of service and dedication.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK DESIGNATED

County Judge Wendell Morgan has proclaimed the week of October 3-9, 1993 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Wheeler County.

The Wheeler County Farm Bureau, in conjunction with all fire departments in the county are working together to emphasize fire prevention and protection throughout the county.

Fire Prevention Week is always the Sunday-through-Saturday period in which falls October 9, date of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. The Chicago disaster killed 250 people and destroyed more than 17,400 buildings.

In this proclamation, Judge Wendell Morgan has called upon the citizens of Wheeler County to participate in Fire Prevention Week activities such as locating and eliminating fire hazards; developing a home escape plan; and as the 1993 theme suggests - - - "Get Out, Stay Out! Your Fire Safe Response". Paul Macina, President of Wheeler County Farm Bureau said, "Fire is both friend and foe. We can't live without it, but its destructive power is a threat we must control." Protect yourself by keeping fire a friend:

* Regularly inspect your house and out-buildings for fire hazards. Check the electrical system, electrical appliances and equipment, fuel storage,

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heaters and heating system. Make needed repairs or replacements without delay. Don't overload circuits or bypass fuses/breakers.

* Remove trash, stacks of paper and other unneeded combustibles that could feed a fire.

* Read and follow instructions with portable heaters. Place them where they won't ignite combustibles or be tipped over. Never use gasoline in a kerosene heater, and make certain gasoline and kerosene containers are clearly marked to avoid a mix-up. Never use a kerosene or gas-fired heater in a closed area - have ample ventilation. Be certain you use the correct grade of fuel for your portable heating equipment.

* Check your heating system prior to the heating season. Install and use wood-burning stoves as directed in the manuals or other literature. Screen fireplaces. Keep chimneys and flues free of obstructions and creosote buildup. (Continued Page 8)

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PROSPER AND BE IN HEALTH (Part 3)
If you accept the Bible and let it speak for itself, there will be no question that God desires for all obedient Christians "prosperity" and "health". Ill John 2 says it concisely, but that is certainly not the only place in the Bible that says it. Psalm 103:3 says that God heals all your diseases. Psalm 112:1-3 says that the man who fears God and delights in His commandments will be blessed with wealth and riches. Psalm 35:27 says that the Lord takes pleasure in the prosperity of His servant. Malachi 3:10-11 says that the Lord will bless people who tithe by opening the windows of Heaven upon them and pouring out a blessing. It also says that He will rebuke the devourer for their sakes. James 5:14-15 says that if any Christian is sick that he should call for the elders of the church and that they should anoint him with oil and pray over him in the name of Jesus. Then, the Bible says that the prayer prayed in faith over that person will bring healing.
Those are a few Scriptures. There are many which make it absolutely clear, IF YOU BELIEVE THE BIBLE, that God wants to prosper and heal His people. He revealed Himself as "The Lord That Healeth" in Exodus 15:26. All He ever was, He still is today. Jesus is the same yesterday, today, and forever. The Lord said in Exodus 23:25 that those who serve the Lord would have sickness taken away from the midst of them. In Deuteronomy 7:15, He said the Lord will take away from you all sickness. Some are always ready to disbelieve any good promise like this that is in the Old Testament by saying that was just for the Jews and that we are in the New Testament now. Let me point out that James referred to above is in the New Testament, and Hebrews 8:6 says that the New Testament is a better covenant established upon better promises than the Old Testament. If people could have prosperity and health in the Old Testament and we have a better covenant with better promises, we can obviously have health and an abundant supply now.
If Corinthians 9:6-8 says that if we sow bountifully into God's work that we will reap bountifully. He says that we will be supplied sufficiently enough to require no outside aid or support by being liberal in our giving. He also says in Galations 3:13 that Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law. In Deuteronomy 28, the curse of the law is spelled out. It says there that every sickness and every disease is part of that curse. The New Testament says that we are redeemed from it though.
One big reason that Christians don't have these blessings even though they are clearly taught in the Word of God is that they don't believe them. If you can't be persuaded to believe the plain statements of the Word of God, you will live without the benefits that He promised and provided. Hebrews 3:19 speaks of a group of people who could not enter into God's provisions because of their unbelief. Why not decide today that you are going to be a believer and not a doubter. God's highest will for you is that you prosper and be in health even as your soul prospers.





From The Minister's Desk:
 Benjamin Franklin, one of the founding fathers of this nation, once said: "if men are so wicked with religion, what would they be without it?" In my opinion, this was a very perspective observation. Throughout history, an ardor for righteousness has often been the cloak that some religious people have used to commit very unrighteous acts. Bloody crusades, merciless inquisitions, and unspeakable atrocities have often been committed by religious people in the name of righteousness. Such unrighteous acts were not taught or encouraged by Jesus Christ during His earthly ministry. While He sincerely wanted people to be righteous, Jesus Christ knew that this righteousness could not be achieved through acts of unrighteousness. For example, when some Samaritans would not allow Him to spend the night in their village, two of His disciples, James and John, had a simple cure for this lack of hospitality. They ask: "Lord, do You want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?" But Jesus Christ rebuked these disciples, saying: "You do not know what kind of spirit you are of: for the son of Man did not

come to destroy men's lives, but to save them." (Luke :51-56) In their quest for righteousness, religious people must have the same purpose. Their purpose must be to save people not to destroy them. For this reason, religious people must be concerned about two factors. These two factors are:

1. Motive. Religious people will recognize that the bible teaches that righteous deeds can be nullified by an unrighteous motive. (Matthew 6:1-18) without a righteous motive, genuine, righteousness cannot be achieved.
 2. Conduct. Religious people will recognize that the end does not justify the means. These people will realize that they cannot achieve genuine righteousness with conduct that is unfair, self-serving, dishonest, deceitful, untruthful, and unethical.
 Religious people should be righteous people. They should also encourage and admonish other people to be righteous. But they should never use the tactics of James and John.

* Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach.
* Never smoke in bed and avoid the easy chair when drowsy. Avoid smoking when using flammable materials or in places that have readily combustible materials such as hay, straw, dry weeds, grain dust, etc. Store flammable liquids in well-marked, closed containers. Make sure your cigarette or match is "out" before discarding.
* Install approved lightning protection systems on main buildings. Inspect them annually to make sure they are properly grounded.
* Be prepared for fire should it strike. Have operating smoke detectors and fire extinguishers. Develop and practice a home fire escape plan. Teach children how to call for help. Have a water supply available to fight fire.
* Choose and regularly inspect fire extinguishers that are the right size and type for the fires that might occur.
* Consider installing a sprinkler system in all new construction.
* Latest information indicates that every 15 seconds a fire department responds to a fire somewhere in the U.S...
A residential fire occurs every 66 seconds...
There is a civilian (non-fire service person) fire death every 118 minutes...
There is a civilian fire injury every 18 minutes...
Estimated \$9,467,000.00 in property damage occurred as a result of fire in 1991, including 49,000 vehicle fires.
