Louis Wayne Grayson, 68, died Tuesday, Feb. 15, 1994, in Wheeler. Services were at 2 p.m. Friday in the Allison School, Elder Jack Hays of Wheeler and Clyde Dukes of Allison officiated. Burial was in the Wheeler Cemetery by Wright Funeral Home of Wheeler.

Mr. Grayson was born in Paris, Texas. He was a veteran, servicing with the Navy during World War II. He married Reta Aderholt in 1950 at Allison. He moved to Allison in 1937 from Reydon, Okla. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge in Wheeler. He was the Wheeler County Democratic chairman for several years and served on the Parkview Hospital Board of Directors for 26 years. A farmer and rancher, he was employed by Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service for 30 years, retiring in 1980.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Terry Grayson and Johnny Grayson, both of Allison; a daughter, Deborah Jones of Allison; four brothers, Cecil Grayson of Lexington, Okla., Erskin Grayson of Allison, David Grayson of Sayre, Okla., and Bobby Joe Grayson of Spearman; two sisters, Gladys Hastie of Sayre and Margilou Reynolds of Reydon; eight grandchildren; and two step-grandchildren.

Bessie Robertson, 95, died Thursday, Feb. 17, 1994.

Mrs. Robertson was born in Indian Territory and moved to Wheeler in 1913 from Estelline. She was a graduate of Wheeler High School. She married Lester Robertson Sr. in 1919 at Wheeler. He died in 1935. She was a nurse at Wheeler Hospital for 25 years. She was a member of the First Baptist Church. Mrs. Robertson also was preceded in death by a son, Lester Robertson Jr., in 1978.

Two Wheeler Ambulance Attendants Injured in Amarillo Accident Feb. 16

Two of Wheeler's Volunteer Ambulance personnel were taken to St. Anthony's hospital following an accident in Amarillo Wednesday afternoon, February 16. Mark Frankenbery was treated and admitted for observation and Mary K. Christner was treated and released. A White Deer paramedic was also treated and released following the collision.

The Wheeler Ambulance was requested Wednesday afternoon to transfer Leonard Harris, 66, who had been treated at Parkview and was being moved to St. Anthony's in Amarillo. Harris' condition changed and Wheeler's attendance decided to stop in White Deer and obtain the assistance of a paramedic. The patient was transferred to White Deer's ambulance and Mark and Mary Kay remained with the patient to assist.

The ambulance was "Code III" due to the seriousness of the patient. (Code III is lights and siren activated.) As the ambulance was crossing Buchanan

St., just a few blocks from the hospital, it was struck in the side by a Camaro traveling north in the outside lane. The ambulance tipped onto its side and spun. The ambulance attendance, working with the patient, were tossed about inside the unit.

The patient remained strapped to the cot and was not seriously injured in the accident. He was admitted to intensive care for his cardiac problems.

Mark Frankenbery had a cut on the forehead and remained in the hospital until Sunday for observation.

Mary K. Christner required 40 stitches for an injury to the right ear. She returned home with her husband in the Wheeler Ambulance later that evening. Mac Christner was following the White Deer a few cars back when the accident occurred.

Both drivers in the accident were treated and released from the hospital. Traffic on Amarillo Boulevard was for almost 2 hours while the wreckage was being cleaned up.

Rural Waste Management Seminar Scheduled Today

Disposal of waste on farms and ranches, as well as rural households, in an ever increasing problem. State and federal regulations on waste disposal are constantly changing. There also are many changes taking place that affect those living in town.

In an effort to give the people of Wheeler County an understanding of the regulations concerning rural waste disposal, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has scheduled a Rural Waste Management Seminar. The meeting will be Thursday, February 24, 1994 at 7:00 p.m. in the Coin and Copper Room of the First National Bank in Wheeler.

Mr. John Keihl of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in Amarillo and a representative of the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission will present the program. They will explain the rules that govern waste disposal including what materials are allowed in landfills and precautions to take around landfills. There are penalties if these rules are violated. Keihl will also discuss plans for waste disposal facilities in the area.

Problems concerning city waste will be addressed and there will be a question and answer session. The program is being sponsored by the Wheeler County Extension Program. (Continued Page 7)

PAIR ENTERS GUILTY PLEAS TUESDAY

Two Oklahoma men pleaded guilty Tuesday to one count apiece of aggravated assault on a peace officer. The men were accused of shooting at Wheeler County Sheriff Jimmy Adams. Sammy Wesley Jarvis and Willie Russell were sentenced to 40 years apiece in state prison in connection with the July 23 incident, in which the men were alleged to have fired a shotgun at Sheriff Jimmy Adams.

Jarvis 37, and Russell, 34, originally were charged with attempted capital murder and unauthorized use

of a motor vehicle. The men were re-indicted on the lesser charge because it decreased the state's burden of proof while offering the same range of punishment, according to District Attorney John Mann.

Jarvis and Russell also admitted Tuesday to stealing a van in Mobeetie, which was taken into account during their sentencing.

Adams said he chased the pair for 25 miles through Wheeler County. When the sheriff caught up to the two (Continued Page 7)

Wheeler County Named As Contiguous County

Congressman Bill Sarpalius announced today that the Secretary of Agriculture has declared Collingsworth County a primary disaster area due to hail and high winds which have occurred on July 6, 1993. Five surrounding counties have been named contiguous counties. They are Childress, Donley, Gray, Hall, and Wheeler Counties.

This disaster designation make family-sized farm operators in both primary and contiguous counties eligible to be considered for low-interest emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

"The storm that hit this area in July of last year caused extensive damage to crops, especially in Collingsworth County where almost 55,000 acres of cotton were destroyed," Sarpalius said. "Farming is hard enough without having to deal with this sort of unforeseen disaster."

"The FmHA will consider each application on its own merits, and officials will be taking into account the extent of losses, amount of security available, ability for repayment, and other eligibility requirements," Sarpalius said.

Local FmHA county offices can provide affected farmers with further information and assist them in completing applications for assistance.

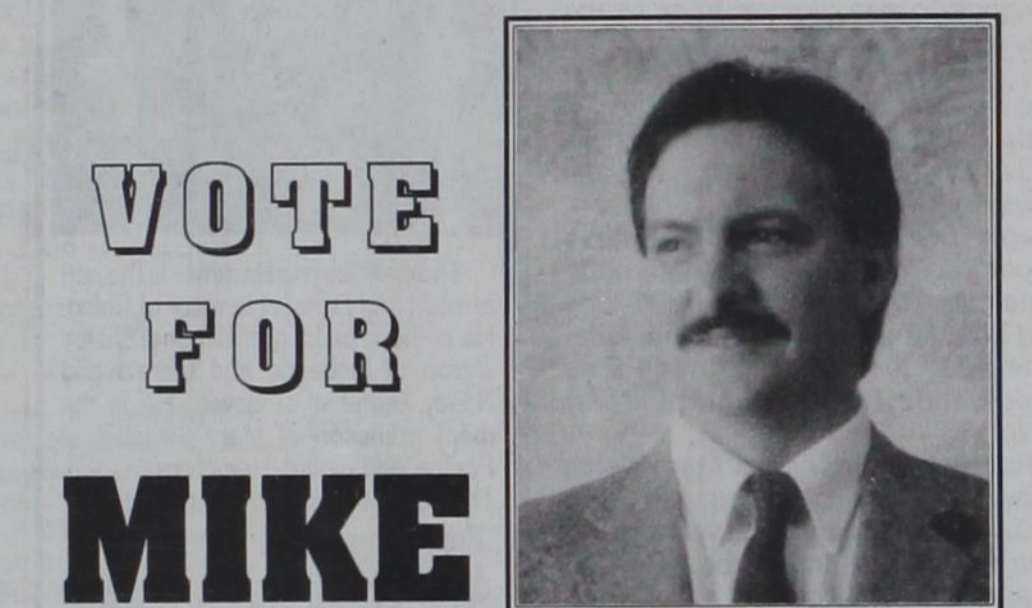

Waste Reduction—Enviroshopping

What does the term "waste reduction" mean to you? A recent survey (1990) revealed two common responses to this question. Sixty percent of those surveyed made the obvious response of "decreasing waste". In their second response, 54 percent said it meant "recycling". Based on these answers, the report concluded that this term has no specific meaning to the public.

"Reduction", as it applies to waste management and in its broadest sense, is having less stuff to throw away. Reduction strategies tend to focus on the consumer. Choosing purchases wisely will reduce the amount a person has to throw away.

Waste reduction is an important part of the solution to our solid waste problems. Waste reduction means reducing the amount or toxicity of waste produced. If we never make the waste in the first place, whenever have to worry about disposing of it.

People want specific ways to reduce waste before it enters their homes. This means that you will be teaching them new ways to choose products.

Reducing waste at the source is the most effective way to reduce household garbage. It's easier to manage garbage by preventing it from the home in the first place than to deal with it once it's there. Reducing waste this way is called waste reduction, or recycling. This is the first step in managing waste, therefore, the word "pre-cycling". Besides reducing household waste, pre-cycling can have an influence on energy and natural resources consumption. Pre-cycling involves a three-step decision-making process about products and packaging. Decide first what you truly need and what is affordable. Then identify and compare the alternatives to buying new products. Finally, select the best product for the need and at the best price.

Packaging is a major contributor to municipal waste. It is the fourth largest industry in the United States and accounts for one-third of all solid waste. In 1960, there were 24 million tons of packaging in the waste stream. By 1980, this had risen to 42.1 million tons. If we cut down on the amount of packaging we buy we can reduce the amount of garbage we create. For example, we can buy products with the largest packaging or buy fewer products. We also save the energy and resources needed to make products.

Free Blood Pressure Clinic

There will be a Free Blood Pressure Clinic for all Wheeler County residents regardless of age, Thursday, March 3, 1994. It will take place in the south end of the Senior Citizens' Center on Canadian Street from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

This clinic is conducted by Shepard's Nursing Service, Pampa, Texas and it is sponsored by the Wheeler Senior Citizens and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve veterans and people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, handicap, religion, or national origin.

Disaster Assistance Request Deadline Approaches

Washington, February 4—"Corn
and sorghum producers with 1993
disaster losses are reminded they must
request disaster assistance by March
4 to be eligible for possible forgive-
ness of advance deficiency overpay-
ment," Grant Buntrock, Administrator
of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's
Agricultural Stabilization and Conser-
vation Service, said today.

"Even if the disaster loss was not
large enough to qualify for disaster
payment, it may mean eligibility for

some advance deficiency overpay-
ment forgiveness," Buntrock said.

"Final deficiency payments will not
be calculated until early March, but it
is almost certain, given current prices,
that the final will be less than the
advance. To be eligible for forgive-
