Forage Production Tour And Seminar, April 12

A Forage Production Tour and Seminar is scheduled for Tuesday, April 12 in Wheeler. The program, sponsored by the Wheeler County Agriculture Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will explore ways producers can increase the quantity and quality of forage production.

A tour will leave from the Wheeler

School at 4:30 p.m. to look at a perennial cool season grass that may be used as a substitute for wheat pasture.

Upon returning to the school, the participants will be served a barbeque dinner courtesy of Production Credit Association. Those planning to attend are asked to contact the Wheeler County Extension office at 826-5243 by Thursday, April 7 so arrangements can be made for the meal.

Following dinner, speakers will address various topics concerning forage production. Dr. Donald Dorsett, Extension Forage Specialist in College Station, will discuss grass varieties and how they can fit into grazing and haying operations.

J.F. Cadenhead, Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist in Vernon, will show how to determine the amount of forage available and how to compute the carrying capacity of a pasture or range.

Dr. Brent Bean, Extension Agronomist in Amarillo, will cover the forage production of wheat compared to other cool season annuals.

Dr. Jerry Matches of Texas Tech University is tentatively scheduled to discuss the management of lovegrass and bluestem pastures and CRP land. Please remember to call 826-5243 by April 7 if you plan to attend.

KPDR-FM Expands Christian Radio Broadcast To KJRT-FM In Amarillo

On March 21 at 6:00 a.m., Wheeler Educational Broadcasting Foundation began broadcasting on a second full power radio station in Amarillo. The station in Amarillo is a 20,000 watt station that is heard at 88.3 on the FM dial. The first station of Wheeler Educational Broadcasting Foundation is KPDR, which broadcasts from right here in Wheeler at 10,000 watts of power. Without firsthand involvement, it would be difficult to imagine how much work and time and "red tape" go into this type of project. It doesn't just happen and the answer is always the same to churches or pastors who call to ask how to do it. The standard answer that is given is that one had better be absolutely convinced beyond a shadow of a doubt that God wants it. Otherwise the commitment required won't be there.

The dream of Christian radio that

would effectively cover Amarillo has been there for a very long time. Ever since KPDR has been broadcasting, the desire has been to extend the coverage to Amarillo. Had KPDR gone on the air at 100,000 watts, it would not have adequately covered Amarillo. That would be the greatest amount of power that could have been granted by the FCC. But, a station that big from Wheeler would have presented major problems. The expenses for an operation that big would have been astronomical. In addition to larger cables and antennas and a bigger, much more expensive transmitter, KPDR would have had to construct its own tower outside the immediate area to have transmitted that much power without oversaturating other radio and television reception here. The expense of a tower alone

Any child five years old on or before Sept. 1, 1994, will be eligible to attend kindergarten this fall. If your child will be attending kindergarten this fall, you and your child are invited to attend the visitation in the Wheeler ISD south kindergarten room. The south kindergarten is the one which is across the hall from the cafeteria. The following schedule has been set:

Last names beginning: A B C D E, Mon., April 18, 2:00 to 3:00 PM
Last names beginning: F G H I J, Tues., April 19, 2:00 to 3:00 PM
Last Names beginning: K L M N O, Wed., April 20, 2:00 to 3:00 PM
Last Names beginning: P Q R S T, Thurs., April 21, 2:00 to 3:00 PM
Last names beginning: U V W X Y Z, Fri., April 22, 2:00 to 3:00 P

Feel free to come on another day of the week of visitation if you cannot come on your child's day.

The State of Texas requires the following before your child can be enrolled this fall.

1. Birth Certificate — certified copy, not hospital copy.
2. Immunization records verified by a valid clinic or physician.

The Wheeler School requires your child's social security number for accounting and record keeping purposes.

You must have these documents in order to enroll your child in the fall. Some of them take time to be processed, so it is a good idea to apply for them immediately.

On the day of visitation, please bring a copy of your child's immunization records to leave at the school. If you don't have a copy, stop in the superintendent's office on your way in, and they will make a copy for you. The nurse needs these records to review before school starts. Leave your child's other records at home. Bring all records when you come to enroll your child in the fall.

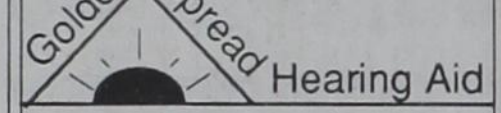

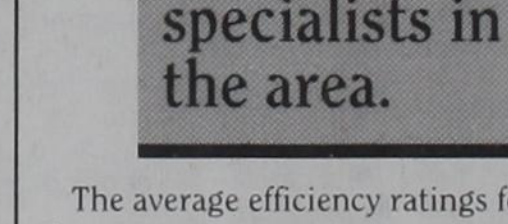

Green Cotton Gives Consumers A Choice

Consumers who want garments that have not been treated with formaldehyde fixatives, resin, or chemical dyes and finishes have choices now.

A growing number of companies in the United States are marketing apparel made of "green" cotton. Cotton is considered "green" or earth-friendly when it is used unbleached, and without chemical fertilizers and pesticides.

Coloring cotton with natural dyes made from plants, minerals, and insects is considered kinder to the environment than using traditional dyeing and finishing processes because the process uses less energy and water than synthetic colorants. Some cotton is naturally colored through plant breeding techniques.

Many of the garments made from untreated cottons are knits, which reduce the need for ironing. Unbleached, undyed cotton and naturally colored cotton deepens with laundering.

In addition to those who are concerned about the effects of the textile industry on the environment, these garments will appeal to people who have sensitivities to the chemicals used in other dyeing and finishing processes.

The Universal Product Code first appeared on supermarket products in 1973.

From the Minister's Desk:
On Sunday morning, March 27th, a deadly tornado struck the small community of Goshen, Alabama. Among the many buildings that were destroyed by this tornado was the Goshen United Methodist Church.
When this church building was hit by a tornado, its roof collapsed upon the one hundred and forty people who had assembled for the Sunday morning worship service. Of these one hundred and forty people, ninety were seriously injured and twenty were killed, including six children. One of these children was the four year old daughter of the pastor of the church, Mrs. Kelly Clem.

Following the death of her daughter and several members of her congregation, Mrs. Clem was asked to explain such a terrible tragedy. Her candid explanation was: "We don't know why. I don't think that why is the question right now. We just have to help each other through it."

When I read Mrs. Clem's explanation, I immediately thought about an observation that Dr. James Dodson, a prominent religious writer, included in his book, **When God Doesn't Make Any Sense**. He wrote: "I'm reminded of a church in Dallas, Texas, which was destroyed by a tornado some years ago. The twister suddenly dropped from the boiling sky and 'selected' this one structure for demolition. Then it lifted again, damaging almost none of the surrounding territory. How would you interpret this 'act of God' if you were a member of that congregation? Perhaps the Lord was displeased by something going on in the church, but I doubt if this is His way of showing it. If that is how God deals with disobedience, then sooner or later every sanctuary will be in jeopardy. So how do we explain the selective destruction of the twister? I wouldn't try. There are simple times when things go awry that may never be understood."

In another chapter in the book, he described God's attitude about suffering. He said: "So what am I suggesting—that our heavenly Father is uncaring or unconcerned about His vulnerable sons and daughters, that He taunts mere mortals as some sort of cruel, cosmic joke? It is almost blasphemous to write such nonsense. Every description given to us in Scripture depicts God as infinitely loving and kind, tenderly watching over his earthly children and guiding the steps of the faithful. He speaks of us as 'the people of his pasture, the flock under his care'. (Psalm 95:7) This great love led Him to send His only begotten Son as a sacrifice for our sin, that we might escape the punishment we deserve."

Then later in the book, Dr. Dobson described the attitude that disciples of Jesus should have about

suffering. He wrote: "So tell me, where did we get the notion that the Christian life is a piece of cake. Where is the evidence for the 'name it, claim it' theology that promises God will skip along in front of us with His great Cosmic Broom, sweeping aside each trial and every troubling uncertainty? To the contrary, Jesus told His disciples that they should anticipate suffering. He said, 'I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world.' (John 16:33) Paul wrote:

"In all our troubles my joy knows no bounds. For when we came into Macedonia, this body of ours had no rest, but we were harassed at every turn—conflicts on the outside, fears within." (II Corinthians 7:4-5) Peter left no doubt about difficulties in this Christian life when he wrote: 'Dear friends, do not be surprised at the painful trial you are suffering, as though something strange were happening to you. But rejoice that you participate in the sufferings of Christ, so that you may be overjoyed when his glory is revealed.'

(I Peter 4:12-13) Note in each of these references the coexistence of both joy and pain."

"This is the consistent, unequivocal 'expectation' that we have been given by the biblical writers, and yet we seem determined to rewrite the text. That makes us sitting ducks for satanic mischief."

"My concern is that many believers apparently feel God owes them smooth sailing or at least a full explanation (and perhaps and apology) for the hardships they encounter. We must never forget that He, after all, is God. He is majestic and holy and sovereign. He is accountable to no one. He is not an errand boy who chases the assignments we dote out. He is not a genie who pops out of the bottle to satisfy our whims. He is not our servant—we are His. And our reason for existence is to glorify and honor Him. Even so, sometimes He performs mighty miracles on our behalf. Sometimes He chooses to explain His action in our lives. Sometimes His presence is as real as if we had encountered Him face to face. But at other times when nothing makes sense—when what we are going through is 'not fair', when we feel all alone in God's waiting room—He simply says: 'Trust Me!'"

Mrs. Clem and Dr. Dobson are right! We cannot always explain or understand suffering. But we can help each other and we can trust God when we do suffer.

SEXUAL ASSAULT:

A Community Response

Imagine:
...not feeling afraid to leave your child in the care of someone else...
...Not worrying about your teenager on a first date...
...walking across a parking lot at night and not checking over your shoulder...

These are just a few of the things, as citizens of our community, of which we need to be aware. We as members of society need to know who we are within our community, our family, friends, neighbors, people at our banks, members of civic organizations, waitresses and nurses on night shifts. Many of these people, have been, or could become a victim of sexual assault. Many fear becoming victims.

Studies show that 1 out of 3 girls and 1 out of 7 boys will be sexually assaulted before age 18. One out of four women will be assaulted as an adult.

Law Enforcement offices can do nothing if the offense is not reported, and 70-80% of sexual assault cases are never reported. In Wheeler County in the last month 2 cases of sexual assault have been reported. If a sexual assault is not reported, you as a victim have let the offender off the hook. Someone has to take the first step. Contact a law enforcement officer that you trust, and they will get you help and start to work on the offender. If you are afraid to contact the law enforcement of the community call 1-800-658-2796, the Tralee Crisis Center Hot line.

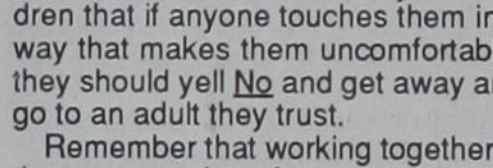
Be aware of ways to protect yourself and to teach your children...

cal version of Project Celebration will often involve changing many established norms, attitudes and behaviors related in alcohol and other drug use. A factor in drinking and driving behavior is the lack of accurate information concerning alcohol. Adult and youth drivers have a lack of knowledge in these areas: Effects of alcohol on teen's driving skills. Amount of alcohol needed to produce impairment and legal intoxication. Alcoholic content of various drinks. Time required to oxidize alcohol. Effectiveness of popular methods for "sobering up". Penalties for drinking and driving offenses.

Nature and effectiveness of chemical tests, and laws relating to their use. Some parents who sponsor drinking parties for young persons are unaware of their moral and legal responsibilities for the health and safety of their minor guests. Typical excuses parents have offered for serving alcoholic beverages to minors include: "I'd rather have the kids drink here—it's safer." "It's my kid's turn to have a party and all her friends have had a Keg at their parties—it's expected." "We won't serve hard liquor, just beer." "All the parents allow it. We don't want our kids to feel different." "If my kid doesn't drink at home, he'll go somewhere else and do it." "I'd rather know what's going on."

"High school kids are under a lot of pressure these days. Beer is part of their culture. I want our son to think of us as friends." These topics could be assigned to students for research, with the findings reported to the class prior to the celebration. Project Celebration involves establishing a new "tradition" in many com-

munities. Students and adults can learn that it is possible to have a good time at a party without drinking or using drugs. In many Texas communities, the chemical-free party idea has transcended graduation night, and now includes proms, end-of-sport season parties, and other special activities. John McKay, Director of Texans' War on Drugs, best summarized what



is happening in Texas when he said, "The trend is moving away from the tradition of drinking being acceptable.

Students who choose not to use (drugs or alcohol) receive support for that decision throughout the year."

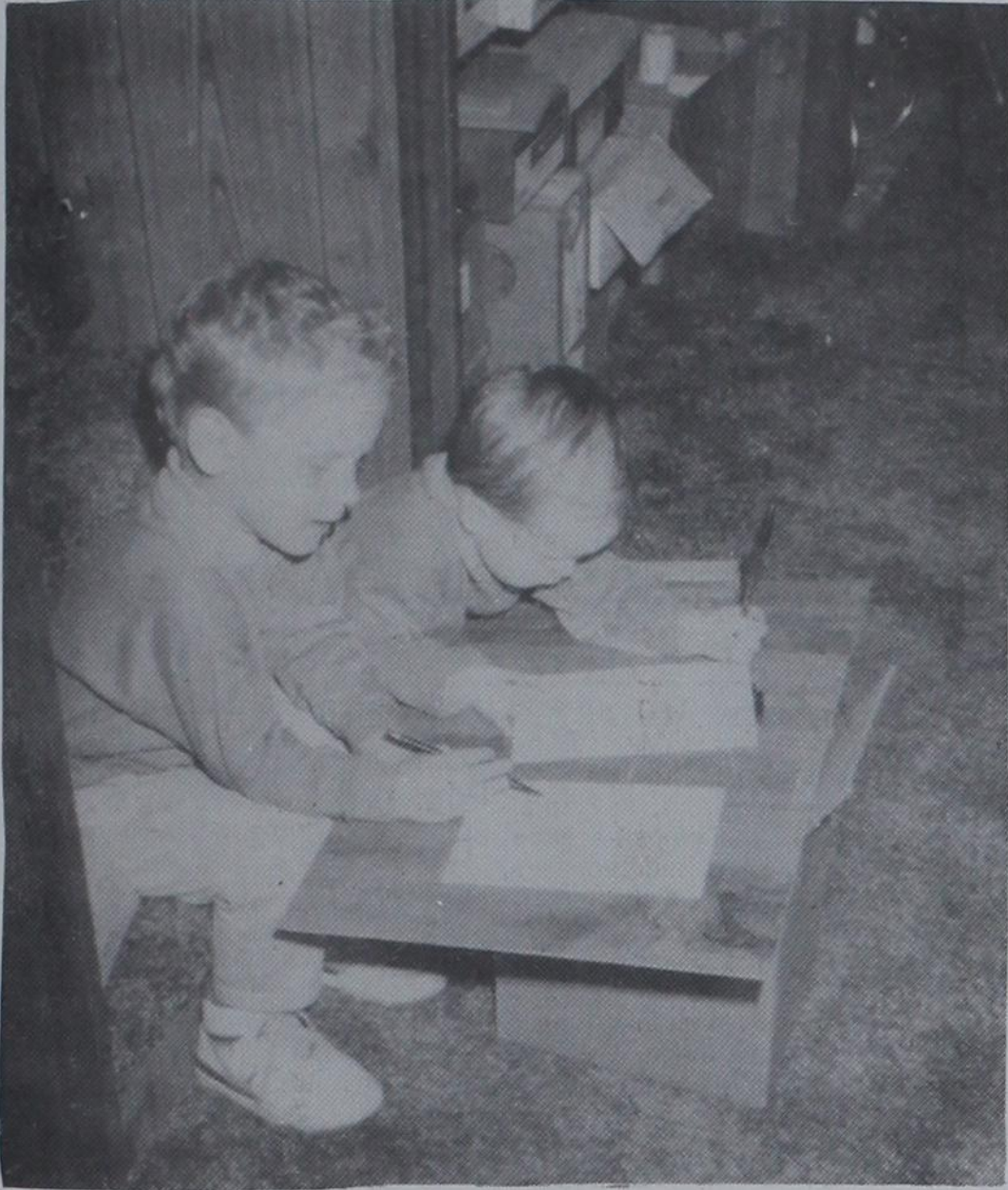

would have been outrageously expensive.

KPDR, therefore, went on the air intending to reach to Pampa. When even that wasn't happening, translators were applied for. That accomplished the goal of reaching Pampa. However, Amarillo was still left out. It was determined that a microwave signal could be transmitted from the translator site in Pampa to Amarillo and a translator could be used there. That was very exciting until it didn't work. Much effort was put into it, but it didn't work. Finally a man named Jim Turvaville, was able to accomplish receiving and transmitting a signal on a translator in Amarillo. The problem then was that the power allowed for a simple translator station was so small that most people in Amarillo could not get an acceptable signal. Though many listened, they had to work with it and tolerate a considerable amount of static and interference. Sometimes, they couldn't get it at all.

About two and a half years ago, an application was made for a full power station for Amarillo. That involved quite a bit of money and work to get it, but it is going strong now as you read this. Calls have been coming in from Amarillo and surrounding cities such as Canyon, Groom, Dumas and even one caller from Plainview who was able to receive the signal a time or two. One truck driver called to say he had listened to the New Mexico line and also stated that there are many truck drivers frequently travelling Interstate 40 who listen. Though it was necessary to install an antenna, one man and his wife are regular listeners in Hereford.

Imagine the potential listeners there are to these two radio station and four translators, and it is all happening from this little town with a big heart—Wheeler, Texas. Perhaps you haven't thought of it this way, but many folks around here believe it is a modern day miracle, and it is certainly a childhood dream come true.
