The first fire was called into the County Sheriff's Department at 4:21 p.m. The fire fighters began returning to their stations about 8:16 p.m.

The Wheeler Fire Department was called to a fire west of Wheeler on Monday at 9:54 p.m. 200 acres were burned by this fire which was caused by burning trash. The firemen returned to the station at 1:00 a.m.





TAX DEFERRAL AVAILABLE FOR ELDERLY TAXPAYERS

Texans age 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent or current property taxes on their homestead residence by signing a deferral affidavit.

This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent property taxes if the owner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can initiate or pursue a suit for delinquent taxes as long as that person lives in that homestead.

While tax deferral postpones paying delinquent taxes on a homestead, it does not cancel the taxes nor keep delinquent interest from building up. When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home the accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all tax and interest.

While a penalty may not be imposed during the deferral period, the filing of the deferral affidavit does not forgive penalties already due. Also, an additional penalty associated with referring the account to a delinquent tax attorney may be charged if taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends.

A religious movement occurred in the nation in the late 1950's that

was know as the Ecumencial Movement. It was the goal of this religious movement to foster unity among the believers of Jesus Christ. This goal was a Biblical goal because there are several Biblical texts which teach that unity should exist among the believers of Jesus Christ.

One of these texts if found in the seventeenth chapter of John which records the prayer that Jesus prayed shortly before His crucifixion. In this prayer Jesus prayed shortly before His crucifixion. In this prayer, Jesus prayed for unity among His believers, saying: "I do not ask in behalf of these alone, but for those also who believe in Me through their word; that they may be one; even as Thou, Father, art in Me, and I in Thee, that they also may be in Us; that the world may believe that Thou didst send Me. And the glory which Thou hast given Me I have to them; that they may be one just as We are one; I in them and Thou in Me, that they may be perfected in unity, that the world may know Thou didst send Me, and didst love them, even as Thou didst love Me." (John 17:20-

Another one of these texts is found in the first chapter of I Corinthians. In this text, the Apostle Paul wrote: "Now I exhort you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that you all agree, and there be no divisions among you, but you be made complete in the same mind and in the same judgment." (I Corinthians

eral others plainly teach that unity among the believers of Jesus does should exist among the believers of Jesus Christ. For this reason, the goal of the Ecumencial Movement was to foster this unity, but it apparently did not achieve this goal. According to the 1991 issue of The World Almanac there are eleven major religious bodies that have

different beliefs and practices. The existence of these religious bodies with their different beliefs and practices clearly proved that the Ecumencial did not achieve its goal.

But why? Why did this religious movement fail to achieve its Biblical goal? I think that at least two reasons can be suggested for its failure. These two reasons are: -

1. The Bible was not accepted as the sole authority for the unity among the believers of Jesus Christ. If the believers of Jesus Christ truly want to be united, they must recognize that the Bible is an inspired book which contains the inerrant will of God. For this reason, they will understand that they cannot vote on its teachings or evaluate its teachings by their feelings or intel-lect. Rather they will carefully study the Bible and honestly obey its teachings. Then the believers of Jesus Christ will be united and not

2. The doctrinal differences between the believers of Jesus Christ were not considered. To be united, believers of Jesus Christ must recognize that it is a cliche not a Biblical truth that says: "We are going to the same place; we are just traveling different roads." The Biblical truth is that there is "-one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God, and Father of all who is over all and through all and in all." (Ephesians 4:5-6) Before the believers of Jesus Christ can be united, they must resolve to believe and practice the doctrine that is taught in the Bible.

The goal of the Ecumencial These two Biblical texts and sev- Movement was not achieved. Unity not exist. But I sincerely believe that it could; if the believers of Jesus Christ would believe and practice His infallible works and not the words of fallible people.

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



The Muster activities consisting of a brisket dinner will begin at 7:00 p.m. at the Community Building in Quail, according to the chair. Muster is open to all former students and their families, parents of students, and friends of Texas A & M.

Texas A & M is in its "Second Century of Greatness." Since 1876, Texas A & M has grown from a small Land Grant College to one of the leading research and educational institutions in the world, now holding the distinction of sea and space grants as well.

The Muster tradition is more than 100 years old. More than 400 Musters will be held around the world this year, Carson said, "wherever Texas A & M former students live or work."

During wars, Aggies mustered in foxholes, on the battlefield, aboard ships, in airplanes and in medical hospitals. In World War II, a Muster was held on Corregidor Island shortly be-
