CHRISTIAN ACADEMY WINS FIRST OVERALL

Students from across West Texas gathered at the Big Country Baptist Assembly near Lueders, Texas, the week of April 18-22 to compete with other Christian schools in the A.C.E. West Texas Student Convention. The students were entered in eight major categories of competition each with numerous events.

Twenty-two students from Wheeler Christian Academy attended the Convention. The results of their achievements led to four first places trophies in Academics, Music Vocal, Needle/Thread, and Photography. W.C.A. also walked away with the second place trophy in Music Instrumental, Athletics, and the third place trophy in Art. Because of the combined standing in the eight categories, W.C.A. received the highest form of recognition for a school at Convention and won the First Place Overall Trophy. Students from W.C.A. won thirty-two first place medals along with 22 second medals and 18 third place medals. The Choir of W.C.A. which included every W.C.A. student attending won first place. The W.C.A. basketball team won first place; the girls volleyball team won third place.


