## Nutrient Content Claim

A nutrient content claim is a label word or phrase used on a food package to describe the level of a nutrient in a serving of food.

These claims can only be used if a food meets the strict definition set by the government. "Light", "cholesterol free" and "low sodium" are examples of nutrient content claims, also called descriptors. Standard serving sizes are used to determine if a food meets the requirement for a nutrient content claim.

Nutrient content claims may be absolute, relative or comparative. Foods that qualify may make more than nutrient content claim. Absolute claims directly state the level or range of a nutrient in the food. Products making absolute claims must meet the nutrient criteria set for a specific claim. Relative or comparative claims compare the amount of a nutrient in a food with the amount of the same nutrient in a comparison food. These claims must state and identify the reference food, percent of nutrient change and a numerical comparison of nutrient levels with the product and reference food near the claim.

# AN OPEN LETTER

To: Jeff & Dana Pierce

A group of concerned tax payers from Wheeler ISD would like to express our gratitude and appreciation for eleven years of service by you to the Wheeler school systems, a service record longer than all the other administrators combined.

Our group is having a hard time understanding the current process for selecting the new head football coach and athletic director. One major concern is that Jeff was the athletes' and the majority of the student body's choice for this coaching position. This was evidenced by signing written petitions and verbally expressing their support to the administration. The athletes are the ones that will have the real investment but their wishes were totally ignored. Coach Pierce has been the motivating force behind these athletes and personally guided them through this year's spring training. We feel Coach Pierce's coaching ability was ignored during the selection process and was passed over because of personal vendettas against Jeff by some board members.

We feel that Coach Pierce's loyalty was questioned by an administration that showed no loyalty to the Pierces for eleven years of unselfish service. It is hard for us to understand if Jeff's record as a coach and involvement in a state football championship, was considered when one of the top three picks has been a head coach for fourteen years, never had a winning record, and whose contract was paid off in January. Another one considered has never been a head coach. We believe that administrative loyalty should be given to a family, like the Pierces that have both served our community for eleven years. We feel Jeff and Dana are receiving the brunt of administrative frustrations that were allowed to

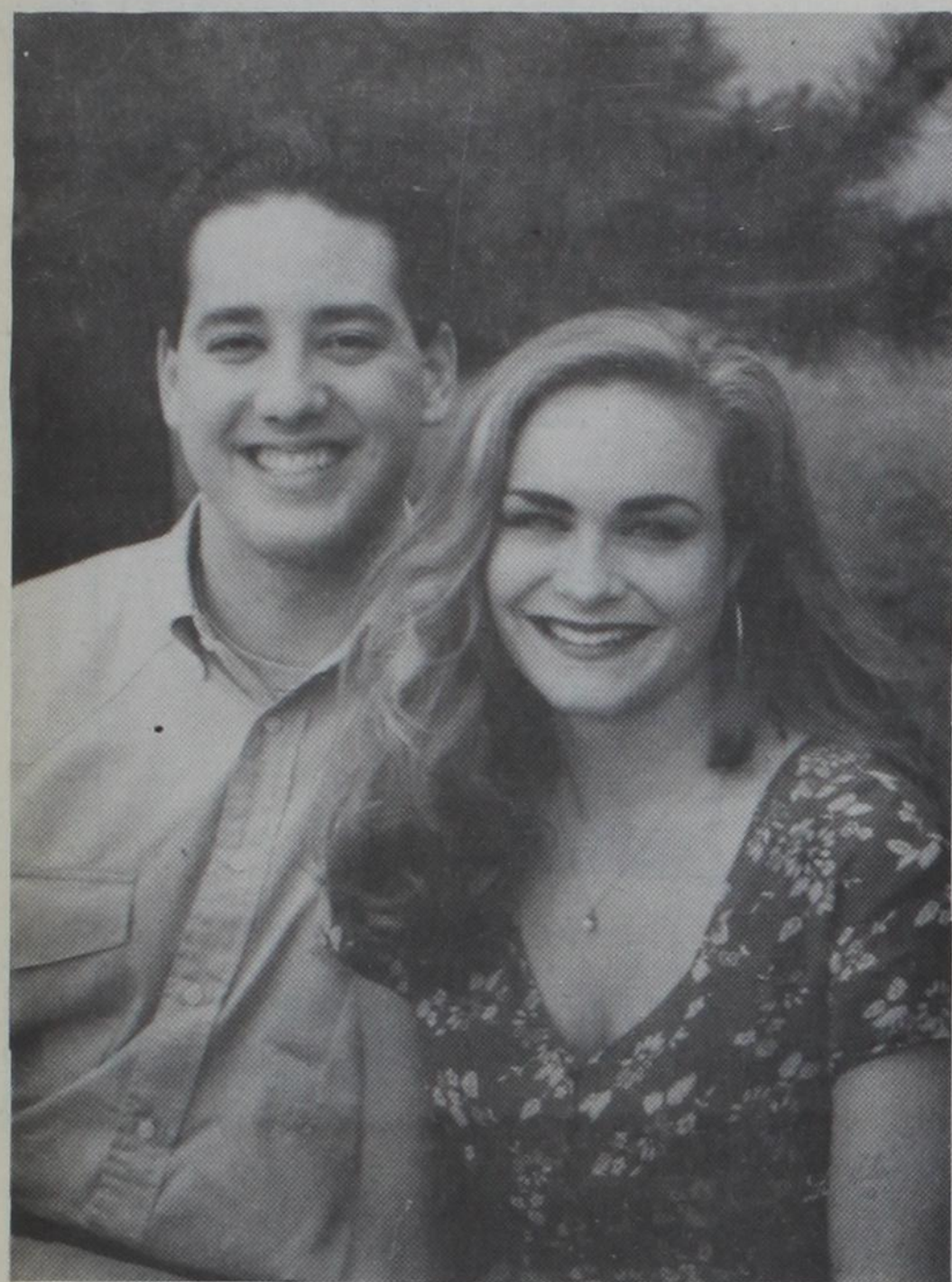

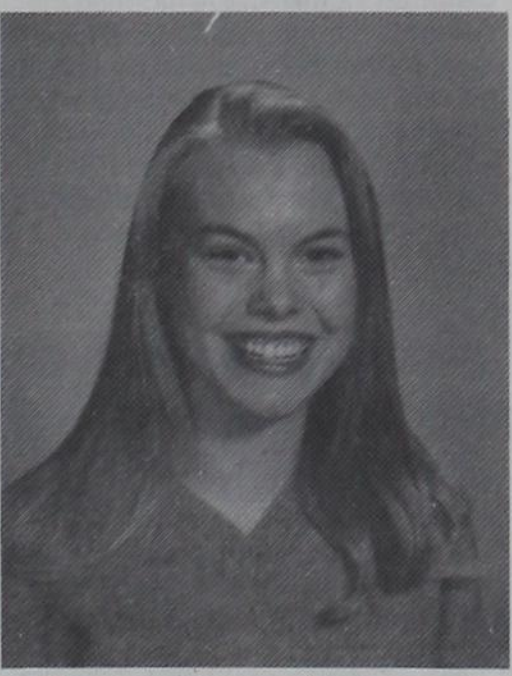
