

GREAT "CROW" BOMBING

I've mentioned before, every fall the crows would migrate here and spend the winter. They didn't have a clue that they weren't welcome and plans were being made to give them... a big send off!

Naturally, farmers really wanted to get rid of these crop marauders and the sooner, the better! Crows, were destroying maize fields on a big scale by breaking down the stalks and eating the maize heads. The cotton fields were ravaged by pulling cotton out of opened boll's to get at the seeds to eat, and they were ruining watermelon and cantaloupe crops earlier on. Not good for a farmer's income!

Some folks got together and came up with a solution. Because, crows roost in huge numbers in shinnery patches, it would be easy to bomb them, once they were all settled down for the night in one of these spots.

Most of the kids at school were excited about the idea of a "crow bombing." Football season had come and gone, so I was really craving some excitement. Jerry Henderson, asked me if I could spend Friday night with him and then we could all go to the crow bombing together. My folks agreed to let me go; so that evening, Jerry, his brother Larry, and I got off the bus at their house.

The garage doors happened to be open, so we just started through the garage toward the kitchen door. As we passed by his step-dad's pickup that was parked there inside, Jerry stopped. Then he said, "Let me show you Bus' new .22 pump rifle." He reached in behind the seat and pulled it out, then took it out of the felt gun- Henderson, I told you not to be

sack that it was in and handed it to me. Wow! That was sure a nice rifle. Jerry and I both had a .22 pump, but not nearly as nice as this one.

Doing what most any gun lover would do, I looked it over, side to side and then I pulled the hand grip that works the slide and it threw out a live shell. Jerry picked it up off of the floor and told me, "I'd better put this shell back in the magazine; we're not supposed to be messin' with Bus' gun." He took back the gun and started raising up the magazine. I'd forgotten to un-cock the hammer and so did Jerry. Just as he was lifting up the magazine, the gun went off. The bullet went through three of his fingers and into the sheetrock ceiling sideways.

Jerry grabbed his fingers with his other hand and was kind-of 'hopping' around the garage. He started to go into the house, but Larry told him "Wait, I've got to put the gun back in the pickup!" He seemed to be taking a lot of time to do this, but the problem Larry had, was that the felt gun sack had holes worn in the sides, and the barrel kept going through the holes. (Stuff like this always happens when you're in a hurry)...He finally got the gun put back in the pickup and we went in the house, quietly ...

Their mom was fixing supper and it sure was smelling good in there: if only we didn't have this problem. Since she was busy, she hadn't turned around when we came in. Larry said, "Mom, Jerry just shot his fingers." She turned around facing us, and all she said was, "Well, AJerry David

messin' with that gun!" (She thought it was his gun that he had shot his fingers with). We sure weren't going to tell her any different. She poured some alcohol on his fingers and gave him a rag to wrap them up with. Then she went back to fixing supper again and remarked, "Bus will be here in a few minutes and he'll take you to see Doc Walker.

Sure enough, in about ten minutes, Bus got home and with 'little' information given by any of us, we loaded up into his pickup and went to town.

Doc Walker, told Jerry that the bullet went through the joint of one finger, so it would be stiff from then on. The others would be alright. Back to their house we headed...supper time.

After supper, we went to the crow bombing, but it turned out to be a dud. The dynamite didn't explode for some reason that I never knew. Whatever the problem, it got fixed, because the following week the planned bombing went off without a hitch. The dynamite set off the barrels of drip gas that had been placed in the shinnery patches where the crows roosted.

That ball of fire must have been 200 feet tall, killing thousands of crows outright and burned the feathers off of hundreds more. People that came to witness this, did what was needed to the ones that were injured, but many got away. The next day, you could see naked crows five miles from there. I guess they had hopped all night long. Coyotes had easy picking's for a while and it was the start of 'fighting back" for many farmers. After two or three times of having these events, the Humane Society got it stopped and that was the end of the crow bombings. Thankfully, the crows were never again the big problem they had been before. I'm convinced, they got the message ...

chiatric Association "one-third of Americans are living with extreme stress, and nearly half of Americans (48 percent) believe that their stress has increased over the past five years. Stress is taking a toll on people"- contributing to health problems, poor relation-

ships, and lost productivity at work." Some short-term stress can be positive - causing us to deal constructively with daily problems or meet challenges or deadlines. But, when stress remains long-term - chronically or continuously- it can be damaging both emotionally and physically.

When we become stressed, it's like an alarm goes off in the brain. and our body prepares to deal with the stress by going into a biological "fight or flight" response. The nervous system is aroused, and hormones are released to sharpen the senses, guicken the pulse, deepen respiration, and tense the muscles. This response is positive when it helps us defend

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against threatening situations. When stressful situations go unresolved, however, the body is kept in a constant state of activation, which increases the rate of wear and tear to biological systems. Ultimately, fatigue or damage results, and the ability of the body to repair and defend itself can become seriously compromised. As a result, the risk of injury or disease escalates.

So what can be done about stress in our lives? First, we need to identify what is causing the stress. Take time to really think about what causes your stress. If it is shopping with your spouse or going to an office party, you may be able to just choose not to participate (of course, with your spouse, this requires communication, but you may be able to say "no thank you" to the occasional office gathering). Think about whether your stressors are:

 major or minor (e.g., lost keys) or lost job),

 temporary or permanent (e.g., giving a speech or a poor marriage relationship),

 relational (e.g., uncomfortable living situation or stressful work relationship), or

· internal (e.g., unrealistic expectations, perfectionistic or pessimistic attitude, or low self-esteem or self criticism).

Once you identify the cause(s), it may be easier to choose strategies to help alleviate the stress. Below are four approaches that may help.

Emergency Stress Stoppers When you need to deal with stress on the spot, try these strategies: count to 10 before you speak; take 3-5 slow, deep breaths; go for a walk; walk away from the situation and say you'll handle it later; say "I'm sorry" if you make a mistake; drive in the slower lane or avoid busy roads (if possible) to stay calm while driving; and begin the day by breaking bigger problems down into smaller ones.

Wellness Approach

The healthier you are, the better able you are to manage stress. Try to get 30 minutes of exercise most days of the week. Ex-
