


# **Mobeetie Post Office Offers Special Stamp Cancellation**

The Mobeetie Post Office will be offering a special cancellation at the Wheeler County Heritage Day Celebration on June 18 at the Jail Museum in Mobeetie. The cancellation will honor Fort Elliott established in 1875 near Mobeetie.

The special cancellation can be obtained by presenting a stamped envelope to the Mobile Post Office on the museum grounds. Envelopes and stamps will be available at the Mobile Post Office. The Buffalo Soldiers stamp can be purchased also. The Buffalo Soldiers were located at Fort Elliott.



After applying the special cancellation, the Postal Service returns the envelope through the mail. There is no charge.



## **Funeral Services Held For Malouf "Offie"** Abraham, 78, In Canadian Wednesday

Malouf "Offie" Abraham, 78, a longtime Canadian resident, philanthropist and pioneer in the oil business, died Monday, May 30, 1994. Burial will be at 3 p.m. Wednesday at the First Presbyterian Church with the Rev. Jerry H. Boles, interim pastor, officiating. Burial will be in the Edith Ford Cemetery by Stickley-Hill Funeral Directors.

Mr. Abraham was born on July 26, 1915, in Canadian. He graduated from Canadian High School at the age of 14. He attended Texas Tech University. He married Iris Lewis on March 13, 1938 at Canadian. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II. He was an elder and member of the First Presbyterian Church.

Survivors include his wife, Iris, of the home; two sons, Dr. Malouf Abraham Jr. of Canadian and Bill Ed Abraham of Dallas; a daughter, Betty Abraham Cooper of Canadian; two brothers, Tom Abraham of Canadian and Naceeb Abraham of Amarillo; eight grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren.







#### From The Minister's Desk:

A recent issue of the Amarillo Dailv News printed an editorial that was entitled, "Teen-agers Aren't Fated To Live Sexually Active Lives." This editorial was written by Joanne Jacobs, a writer for the San Jose Mercury News in San Jose, California.

In this editorial, Ms. Jacobs quoted the results of some polls that had been taken to determine the sexual activity of teen-agers. While the results of these polls were probably not completely accurate, Ms. Jacob did make some important observations about the results. Her observations were:

"I think the first lesson to draw from the research is that it's too soon to give up the ship and declare that virginity above the age of 12 is aberrant behavior. Many kids make it through junior high and high school on cold showers and long walks. More could do so, if they weren't persuaded that sexual activity is the norm."

"The average starting age for sexually active teen-agers in the Roper poll was 15. The ideal age to start, they said, was 17. That happens to be the median age of sexual initiation, researchers estimate, which means that half of the 17-year olds aren't having sex."

"The second lesson is that sex education courses, which focus on showing students how to resist peer pressure, may be missing the point. In the Roper poll, ninety percent of the sexually active teen-agers denied that pressure from friends or dates had anything to do with why they started having sex; TV and movies were also irrelevant, they claimed.'

"Why did they do it? 78 percent said they started having sex because they wanted to. It's pretty hard to argue with that one, especially if kids grow up without much notion that they shouldn't naturally get what they want when they want "However, young lust does not adequately explain teen-age sex. While 81 percent of sexually active boys said sex was a pleasurable experience, only 59 percent of girls

agreed. The majority of boys said they were not in love with their last sexual partner; 71 percent of girls said they were in love. It looks like a fair number of girls are trading sex for love, and not getting much of a bargain.'

"Lesson three is that some parents have given up on controlling their children's sexual behavior. Of those engaging in sex, 60 percent say their parents know, in part because they're having sex in their own home or their partner's home. At the very least, that implies a lack of parental pressure to avoid premature sexual activity."

The experts tell us teen-agers get their values from their friends, but I think that's true to the extend that there's a values vacuum to be filled. Parents get there first. They can raise children to respect themselves and others, to think about the consequences of their actions, to delay gratifications to meet fu-ture goals. Fathers can raise girls who aren't so desperate for male attention and affection that they'd do anything to keep a boy.'

"In a very good speech on the anniversary of the Brown v. the Board of Education decision, President Clinton told students at a Washington middle school that they had to make personal decisions to stay in school, work hard, avoid alcohol, drugs and guns.'

"Continuing the personal responsibility theme, he said: 'You have to decide that you will not become a mother or father before you're old enough to understand and take responsibility and do the job right, instead of wrecking your life with it.' Fair enough. But I wish he'd made the criteria less subjective. Lots of teen-agers think they're "old enough" to do whatever they teel like doing. "Clinton might have added: "As far as I'm concerned that means you should wait till you're an adult married to another responsible adult. The life you wreck might be





#### PICKING A FROZEN DINNER

Today's healthful eating guidelines have set numerical goals of less than 30 percent of a day's calories from fat as well as specific guidelines for sodium. Picking frozen dinners that meet these guidelines can be a challenge.

Here are suggestions for what to search for in selecting a healthful frozen dinner or entree:

Single-serving dinners should be 300 calories or less. Complete your dinner by adding a salad or fresh fruit.

\*Less than 800 milligrams of sodium which is about one-third of the recommended daily maximum for most people. If you are on a sodium restricted diet, even that will be too much.

\*Less than 10 grams of fat per 300 calorie serving. That means that fat will contribute less than 30 percent of the calories. Fish, poultry, and lean beef are low in fat but not if they are deep-fried. Pasta is also low-fat, unless it's topped with butter or a cream sauce. Vegetarian dishes don't always meet the criteria for low-fat because they can be loaded with oil and highfat ingredients.

\*Few additives. Some brands don's use any. The word natural doesn't tell you anything. Check the ingredients.

\*Little or no added sugar. Sugar in it variety of forms (sucrose, dextrose, corn syrup, honey, molasses, etc) shouldn't rank high on the ingredients list. It adds unnecessary calories.

Finding a healthful frozen dinner entree is easier today than it used to be. Many food companies are now making frozen dinners that meet dietary guidelines that are good for you and taste good, too.
