Western Okla. Crusade To Be Held in Sweetwater

The Western Oklahoma Crusade with Dr. Stan Coffey will begin Sunday, July 24, and continue through Wednesday, July 27 at Sweetwater, Oklahoma. Services will be at 7:00 P.M. each evening and everyone is welcome. The crusade is sponsored by the Sweetwater Ministerial Alliance: Sweetwater Assembly of God, J.M. Ashley, pastor; Buffalo Baptist, Jim Clock, pastor; and, First Baptist, Ed Wrather, pastor.

Dr. Stan Coffey is the evangelist for the crusade. Dr. Coffey grew up on a Fiddler's Green, and many other farm in the Sweetwater area and married the former Glenda Fincher of Elk addition, the group has toured more City, a Baptist minister's daughter. Dr. Coffey began preaching at the age of 19, pastoring at age 20 and has been continuously pastoring since that time. He is a man of purpose and direction who cares about people. His upbeat, positive messages offer encouragement to a hurting world that sometimes can't seem to cope with the pressures of life. His churches have baptized an average of more than 500 each year. San Jacinto Baptist Church broadcasts its services live each Sunday morning from their new 3,000 seat worship facility to people in five states on the NBC affiliate. Dr. Coffey has been used of God to preach crusades each year across America and in foreign countries. In 1992 an area-wide crusade was held in the city of Minsk in the former Soviet Union that yielded 10,000 professions of faith. During the Western Oklahoma Crusade Dr. Coffey will be preaching a series of prophetic messages: Sunday night-"Five Minutes 'Till Midnight - Is Christ Coming By The Year 2000?"? Monday night-"The Next Ten Events On God's Prophetic Calendar." Tuesday night-"After Christ Comes Will Anyone Have Another Chance To Be Saved?"



Wheeler Co. Bass Club Holds 5th Tournament



Technical Assistance Program Available To Confined Animal Feeding Operators For Site Specific Plans

in Wheeler County who are not reguired to have a state or federal water quality permit are advised of the opportunity to receive technical assistance through the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District to develop a site specific water quality management plan to prevent or minimize the potential of their operation contributing to a nonpoint source pollution problem.

"The advantage of participating in this program is that if an operator voluntarily develops and maintains a site specific water quality management plan (WQMP) through our district and has that plan certified by the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB), the operator will be complaint with state water quality law and exempt from other state regulatory processes regarding nonpoint sources discharge of pollutants," said Jim Batton, chairman of the Wheeler County SWCD.

"Of course the producer will have to maintain his or her plan to retain their certification," added Jim Batton.

In explaining a water quality management plan Jim said that a WQMP includes appropriate land treatment practices, production practices, management measures, technologies or any combination to achieve a level of pollution prevention or abatement.

S.B. 503, which was passed in the last regular session of the Texas Legislature names the TSSWCB as the lead agency in Texas for activities relating to abating agricultural and sil-

vicultural nonpoint source pollution. The TSSWCB is responsible for assuring that individual water quality management plans comply with state water quality standards established by the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission.


"As a result each WQMP developed, maintained and implemented by a landowner or operator through a SWCD must meet rules and criteria adopted by the TSSWCB," said Jim.

"With a little fine tuning and certification of an existing soil and water

Dougherty owns a small does design work for businesses. He grew up in New Jersey and moved to Dallas about 20 years ago.

We always had chickens for meat, rabbits for meat," he said. "My grandmother had a milk cow. I grew up on the rural fringe.

I think we come from a very budget, a young team of self-reliant stock."

Dougherty said he always thought he would like to own a farm someday. That feeling began to crystallize when he read an article about oxen in Smithsonian magazine.

"It was about how the founding of this country was based on hard-working teams of oxen," he said.

When he heard about Tillers International, he knew he had to go. The first class lasted four days; the second was a full week.

"This is not a 'City Slickers' type of thing," he said. "A lot of the students are learning these skills to take to developing countries. This is very serious stuff; it's not a dude ranch."

Tillers International was founded in 1981 by Dick Roosenberg, whose work in the Peace Corps had led him to help farmers in developing countries learn to work with oxen.

The nonprofit school is funded by student fees and donations, Roosenberg said. Most of the students eventually will take their skills to other countries.

Others, like Dougherty, are doing it for the sheer love of farming and of the animals.

Roosenberg said American farmers who use oxen and there aren't many have to grow high-profit vegetable crops to be competitive. A team of oxen in a wheat field simply cannot compete with a farmer on a combine, he said.

"They would have to be dealing more in vegetable farms for direct marketing to urban people and things of that nature," he said.

Dougherty said there are many advantages to working with oxen. The animals are able to work longer and harder than horses, they're more predictable than horses, and they're more resistant to disease.

And for farmers on a

oxen can cost about \$40,000 less than a new certainly able to handle a tractor.

"Oxen live a very good life," Dougherty said. "They get all the food they could possibly want, and the more love they get, the harder they work."

A well-trained team responds instantly to voice commands:

"Gee" means go right; "haw" means go left; "come up" means forward. "Back up" and "whoa" are self-explanatory.

And while it sounds easy on paper, Dougherty said it takes a lot of training to make a 3,600-pound animal do what you want it to do. Roosenberg gave his

Make a Buck Off Bill was sold at the Texas Republican Convention in Fort Worth last month, while M&J's product was featured on television last week

"I don't want to accuse anyone of anything, but it really looks suspicious to me because of the time element," said Mary Cochran, co-owner of Make a Buck Off Bill. On both products, labels warn that Whitewater may be hard
