FAMILY FUN AND LOTS OF ACTIVITIES THOUGHOUT THE DAY

The Ninth Annual 4th of July Celebration will be held this year under the sponsorship of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. The activities start early with breakfast and end with the street dance downtown until 1:00 A.M. Park activities begin at 10:00 a.m. and continue to dusk with the free fireworks display. A day of fun in Wheeler, Texas, on Monday, July 4, 1994.

Monday morning will open with breakfast at the Masonic Lodge beginning at 6:30 A.M. You do not have to get up that early, serving will continue for some time. If you have not included this in your 4th of July activities, it is a must.

At 7:45 A.M. the first performance by the Outlaws is scheduled in front of the Masonic Lodge. A 'stage' will be erected across from the park for the afternoon performances.

The Fun Run will be under the supervision of Robert and Marla Ford. Starting time will be 8:00 A.M. Individuals are being asked to sign up for the run in advance and the cost will be \$5.00. Each

participant will receive a t-shirt commemorating the event. Forms are available at the Swimming Pool, Thriftway, Appearances and Speedi-Mart. It is not necessary to run, many just walk and enjoy the fellowship of fellow participants.

Punt, Pass and Kick will be at 8:30 A.M. at the Park. Fred Goad, James Masters and Johnny Chapman have been asked to chair this activity. The event will be at the track, North Highway 83. This event is open to any youngster wishing to participate; the group will be divided by ages.

At 10:00 A.M. the activities at the park will begin. This year the chamber is offering a \$50 prize to the group with the most patriotic booth; judging of the decorations will be conducted by an appointed committee.

REMEMBER: Money is not used at the booths. You buy tickets from the Chamber of Commerce and they are used for the purchase of all food, drinks and activities at the park. Tickets are .25 each and signs show the tickets need for each purchase or activity.

The park activities will kick-off with the raising of the flag and the National Anthem. Scheduled for the day will be the Turtle Races, Balloon Toss, Swim Meet and Tug of War.

The Thursday Review will sponsor the turtle race again this year. Youngsters get excited about this event and the parents sometime have a hard time finding the racers.

The swim meet will be held at the swimming pool starting at 11:00. Kim Goad will again head this event. Sign up, be cool and compete at the same time.

Another way some individuals will stay cool will be sitting on the dunking board hoping someone will hit the target and dunk them.

A little messier but just as much fun will be the pie toss.

A list of the dunkees and the names of the targets had not been made available to the *Times* at press time.

The tug-o-war stirs a lot of enthusiasm each year with rival teams ready for the pull. The losers are usually 'all wet' in the end, because they end up in the creek.

Food and activity booths will be operated by non-profit groups throughout the day. The Methodist men will have charcoaled hamburgers, hot dogs and sausage on a stick. Added this year will be Christian Center's turkey drumsticks. Also in the line of treats will be homemade ice cream, nachos, snow cones and lots of cold drinks.

Area Students Attend Annual Electric Workshop

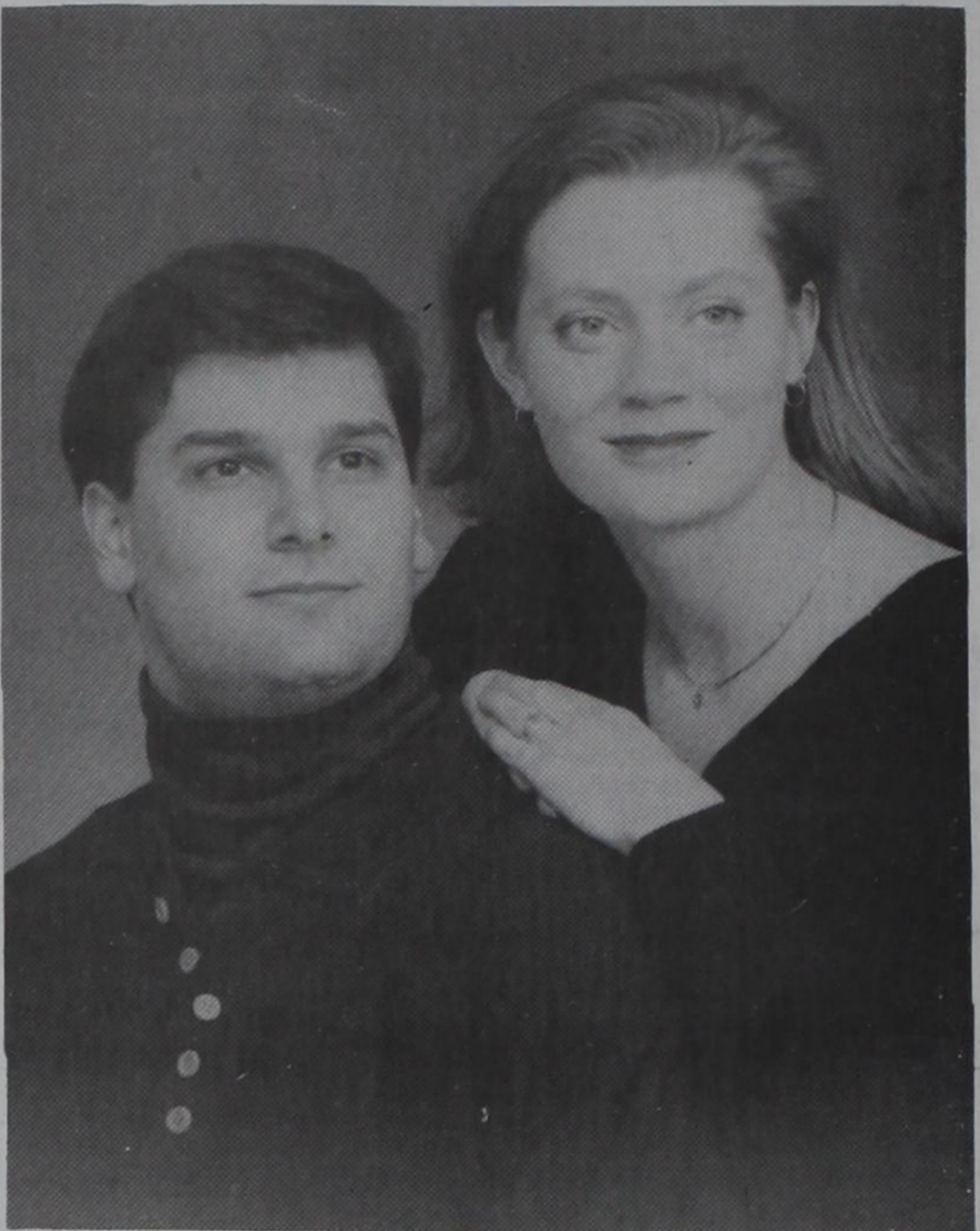

OATRIM—A NEW FAT SUBSTITUTE
One new food is being tested in research on 24 volunteers at Beltsville (Maryland) Human Nutrition Research Center. The food is a new fat replacement called "Oatrim" with an extra cholesterol-lowering punch in the form of beta gulcan (the principal fiber in oats and barley). However, "Oatrim" did little to reduce triglycerides (form fat stored in body) levels. Volunteers had a significant decrease in LDL (Low Density Lipoprotein) Cholesterol (known as the bad cholesterol) without decreasing the good or HDL (High Density Lipoprotein) cholesterol. Their ability to process sugar at a meal (glucose tolerance) improved significantly also. In fact, the blood glucose levels were lower — 7 to 12 percent after eating "Oatrim".

The best surprise of the study may be "Oatrim's" main payoff—most volunteers lost weight during the study despite increases in calories. The average weight loss as a group was 4.5 pounds. Although "oatrim" is still in the research stage, this fat replacement contains only one calorie per gram. Fat provides nine calories per gram. Because the "Oatrim" is in the form of gel it gives a creamy, fat like texture to foods than do other starch-based substitutes on the market. It behaves like shortening being solid at room and body temperatures but turns liquid when heated. Products containing "Oatrim" are already on the market. Some 40 products are being developed. Look for it in some of the TrimChoice line of hot dogs, bologna, cheese, etc. Similar companies are using "Oatrim" in baked goods, muffins, cookies and chocolate candies. Non-fat pancake mix, a very low fat, high fiber nutrition bar and a meatless frankfurter contain "Oatrim".

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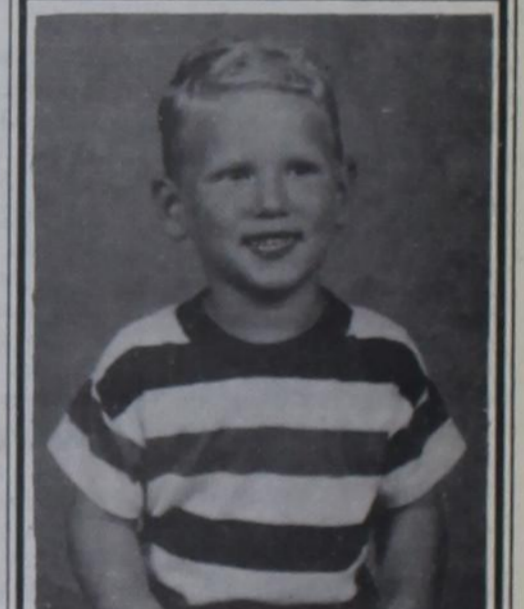

Farm Credit Loans Show Continued Improvement

The Tenth Farm Credit District reported today a \$16.3 million decline in high-risk loans during the first three months of 1994, reflecting on-going improvement in district loan quality.

"Topping the good news this quarter is the fact that high-risk assets continue to decline," said Farm Credit Bank of Texas Chief Executive Officer Arnold R. Henson. "The 19 percent reduction in nonaccrual loan volume this quarter marks the beginning of our fourth consecutive year of improvement in credit quality and, likewise, in many of the agricultural economies we serve."

The Tenth District comprises the Austin-based Farm Credit Bank; 48 Federal Land Bank Associations in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas which make long-term land and housing loans; and 18 Production Credit Association in Louisiana, New Mexico and Texas which make short- and intermediate-term operating loans. The bank and associations are cooperatives, owned by the borrowers with whom they do business.

As is typical for the first quarter, loan volume dropped slightly — by 2 percent — due to seasonal crops and repayment patterns inherent in agricultural lending. Some of the decline in volume also was a result of the reduction in nonaccrual loan volume. Loan volume was \$3.55 billion at March 31.

District net income totaled \$23 million for the three-month period, compared to \$37 million for the same period a year ago. Increases in short-term rates by the Federal Reserve resulted in narrowing spreads between the district's cost of funds and its return on loans, thereby affecting new income, Henson said.

"We are keeping a close eye on the changing interest rate environment, as well as some potentially serious weather conditions in the district, in particular the drought hampering the Texas High Plains cotton crop," Henson said. "We want to do everything we can to remain sensitive to our borrowers' needs, yet maintain the momentum we've achieved in improving credit quality."

Nationally, the Farm Credit System reported combined net income of \$280 million for the quarter ended March 31, 1994, as compared with combined net income of \$397 million for the same period last year. The System's accruing loan volume was \$52.956 billion at March 31, 1994, as compared with \$52.449 billion at December 31, 1993.

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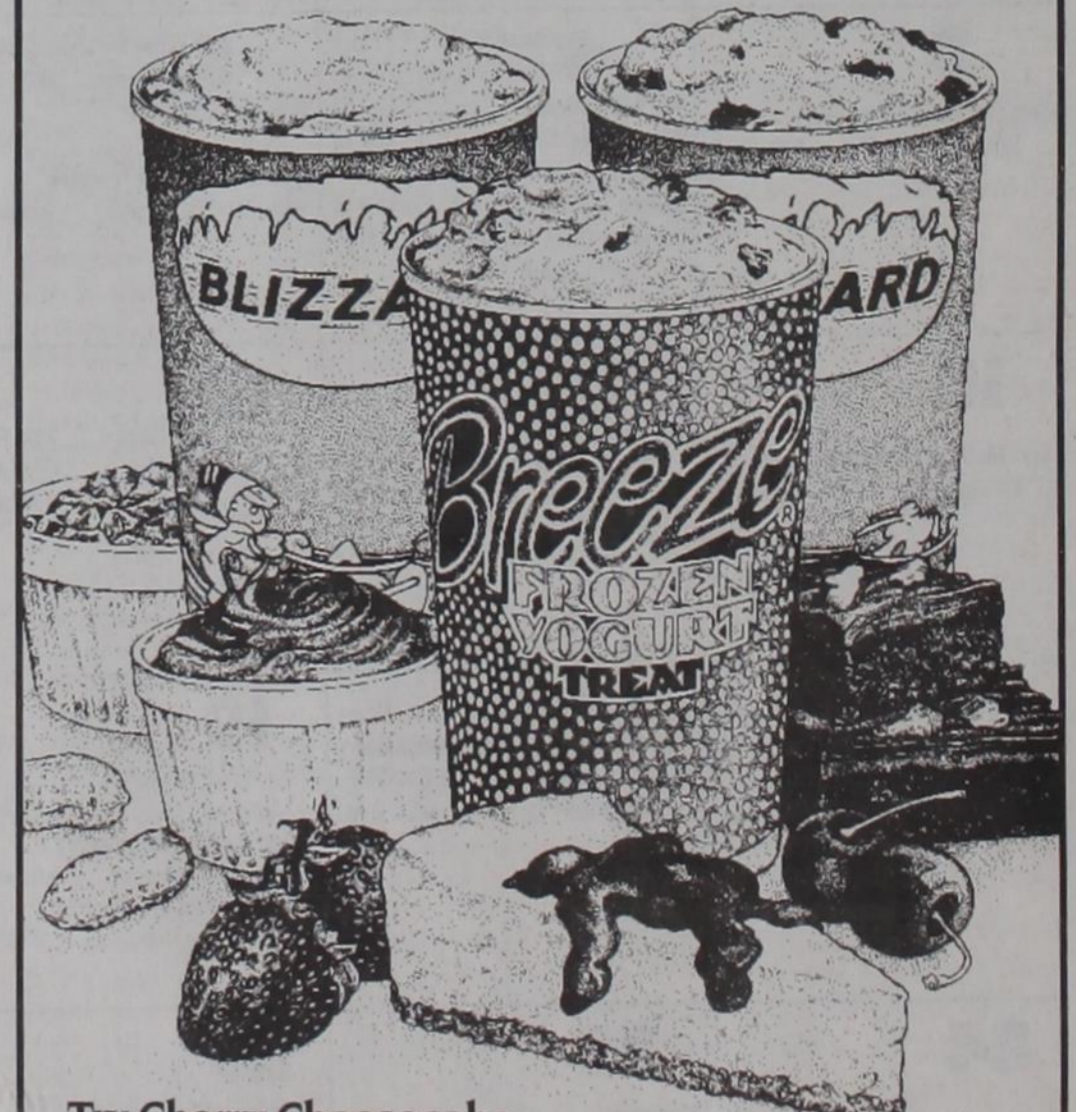

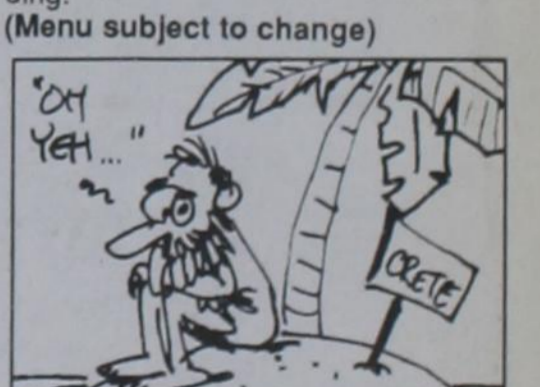

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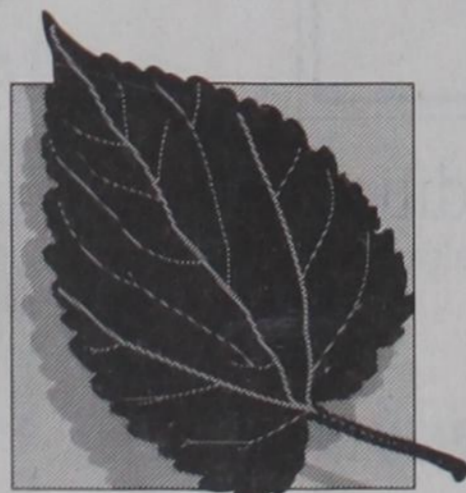
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
