Wheeler Schools To Enroll Thurs. Aug. 11

Wheeler I.S.D. will begin classes for the 1994-95 schol year on Monday, August 15. Elementary and high school registration will be held from 9:00-10:30 A.M. on thursday, Auguse 11. Teachers will have two workdays prior to the beginning of classes, these workdays will occur on August 11 and 12 from 9:00 A.M. until 3:00 P.M.

Packets Available For Kindergarten Students

Registration packets for children who will be attending Wheeler ISD kindergarten during the 1994/1995 school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration form, 2. Student Health information (a two page questionnaire); 3. Home language survey. The parent/guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names and the child's social security number, as well as, copies of the child's official birth certificate (state copy - not hospital copy) and immunization records (authorized by doctor or official clinic), before his/her child can be enrolled in

The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information in two nights in the 6-9, 10-13 and required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "Traffic Jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day are welcome to do so.


