## AREA SCHOOLS PREPARE FOR 1994-95 SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

### Wheeler Schools To Enroll Thurs. Aug. 11

Wheeler I.S.D. will begin classes for the 1994-95 school year on Monday, August 15. Elementary and high school registration will be held from 9:00-10:30 A.M. on Thursday, August 11. Teachers will have two workdays prior to the beginning of classes. These workdays will occur on August 11 and 12 from 9:00 A.M. until 3:00 P.M.

### Packets Available For Kindergarten Students

Registration packets for children who will be attending Wheeler ISD kindergarten during the 1994/1995 school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration form, 2. Student Health information (a two page questionnaire); 3. Home language survey. The parent/guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names and the child's social security number, as well as, copies of the child's official birth certificate (state copy - not hospital copy) and immunization records (authorized by doctor or official clinic), before his/her child can be enrolled in

school.

The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "Traffic Jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day are welcome to do so.

Kindergarten registration will be in the school cafeteria on Thursday, August 11, from 9:00 A.M. until 10:30 A.M.

The 1994-95 school year will begin with teacher workdays on August 11th and 12th. Students will report for class August 15th. Breakfast will be served at 7:45 A.M. with classes beginning at 8:05. Enrollment will take place the morning of the 15th. New students and Pre-kindergarten students must bring health records, birth certificates and social security cards. **NOTIFICATION TOTAL COLIFORM VIOLATION**

The City of Mobeetie Water System collected one (1) water sample during the month of July, 1994, that contained coliform bacteria. The City of Mobeetie Water System is required to submit a minimum of one (1) water sample each month for bacteriological analysis. The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) sets drinking water standards in Texas and has determined that the presence of total coliforms is a possible health concern. Total coliforms are common in the environment and are generally not harmful themselves. The presence of these bacteria in drinking water, however, generally is a result of a problem with water treatment or the pipes which distribute the water, and indicates that the water may be contaminated with organisms that can cause disease. Disease symptoms may include diarrhea, cramps, nausea, and possibly jaundice, and any associated headaches and fatigue. These symptoms, however, are not just associated with disease-causing organisms in drinking water. The TNRCC has set an enforceable drinking water standard for total coliforms to reduce the risk of these adverse health effects. Under this standard, no more than 5.0% of the samples collected during a month can contain these bacteria, except that systems collecting fewer than 40 samples/month that have one total coliform-positive sample per month are not in violation of the standard. Drinking water which meets this standard is usually not associated with a health risk from disease-causing bacteria and should be considered safe.

**From The Minister's Desk:**  
The state of Missouri is a state that is located in the mid-western plain of the United States. It's nickname is the "show me" state because its citizens have to be shown something before they believe it.

But Missourians are not the only people who have this attitude. There are some religious people who also have it. This "show me" attitude can clearly be seen by their belief that faith is not authentic if it is not created by some highly emotional experience. For this reason, these people claim to have had some experience that are only rivaled by the six days of creation.

I would kindly suggest to these religious people that they should carefully study certain New Testament texts. These texts are the ones that record the response that Jesus made when the Pharisees ask Him to show them a sign from heaven. (Matthew 12:38-40; 16:1-4; Mark 8:11-13; Luke 11:29-32) According to these texts, Jesus refused. But why? Jesus could have easily performed some great miracle or wonder for them to see. Jesus wanted their faith in Him to be the results of what He taught not the results of what they saw or experienced.

To be authentic, faith must come "—from hearing and hearing by the word of Christ." (Romans 10:17) It does not come from emotional experiences that people have. Please do not misunderstand! Authentic faith is not devoid of emotion, but this emotion is an outgrowth of this authentic faith.

Perhaps the best example of people who possessed such an authentic faith would be the two disciples who talked with Jesus on the road to Emmanus. These two disciples were greatly confused about the death and resurrection of Jesus. To correct this confusion, Jesus did not tell these disciples that they needed to have some emotional experience. Rather He said: "O foolish men and slow of heart to believe in all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary for the Christ to suffer these things and to enter into His glory?" (Luke 24:25-26) He then began "—with Moses and with all the prophets—", explaining "—the things concerning Himself in all the Scriptures." (Luke 24:27)

After this discussion, these disciples said: "Were not our hearts burning within us while He was speaking to us on the road, while He was explaining the Scriptures to us?" (Luke 24:32) These disciples had an emotional experience! Their hearts had burned within them. But this emotional experience had been an outgrowth of what they had learned from the Scriptures.

It is wrong for people to have a "show me" attitude and build their faith upon the emotional experiences that they have. Rather people should expositionally study the Bible, allowing their emotional experiences to be the results of an authentic, Biblical faith.
