From the Minister's Desk:

Like many other people, I have been deeply concerned about the rapidly increasing cost of health insurance. For this reason, I was very intrigued by a newsletter that I recently received that was entitled,

Center. Her condition remains extremely serious.

'Caring and Sharing" This newsletter outlined an alternative to health insurance for disciples of Jesus. Rather than pay costly premiums for health insurance, disciples of Jesus can subscribe to the "Caring and Sharing" newsletter which monthly lists the medical expenses of its subscribers. Then the subscribers who have not had any medical expenses for the month can mail an assigned amount of money

to the subscribers who have. While I was intrigued by this newsletter and its suggested alternative for health insurance, I was a little confused by the qualification that subscribers had to meet. The newsletter said that subscribers had to be "--faithful Christians who do not forsake the assembling of themselves with other saints, who abstain from the use of alcohol, tobacco, illegal drugs, and who do not engage

in immoral sexual practices." As I thought about this qualification, I concluded that its concept of faithfulness was too limited. The Bible teaches that there are some other characteristics that faithful disciples of Jesus must not have. For example, I John 2:15-16 says: "Do not love the world, not the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh and the lust of the eyes and the boastful pride of life, is not from the

Father, but is from the world." Notice carefully verse 16. This verse lists three general characteristics that faithful disciples of Jesus must not have. These three charac-

teristics are:---1. "--The lust of the flesh--." This characteristic consists of such sins

as adultery, drunkenness, fornication, and homosexuality. These highly visible sins are clear-cut violations of the will of God and disciples of Jesus who wish to faithfully serve God will not commit these sins. 2. "--The Lust of the eyes----," this

characteristic consists of such sins as greed, materialism, love of money, not as visible as the sins that compose "--the lust of the flesh--", but they are clear-cut violations of the will of God. Therefore, disciples of Jesus who wish to faithfully serve

God will also not commit these sins. But while the Bible does not make a distinction between the sins that compose "--the lust of the flesh -- " and the sins that compose "--the lust of the eyes -- ", some disciples of Jesus apparently do. For example, these disciples of Jesus will loudly warn about the danger of alcohol, but they will be strangely silent about the danger of materialism. Perhaps their silence is caused by their own materialistic life-style.

To faithfully serve God, disciples of Jesus must not be characterized

From my perspective, this "religious furor" has produced in some people an attitude that says: "I am better than you because I do not commit the sins that you commit"; "I am more spiritual than you because I have had some religious experiences that you have not had."

When I see these people, I am always reminded of the parable that Jesus told to people who "--trusted in themselves that they were righteous and viewed others with contempt --. " (Luke 18:9) In this parable, Jesus said: "Two men went up into the temple to pray, one a Pharisee, and the other a tax-gatherer. The Pharisee stood and was praying thus to himself, 'God, I thank Thee that I am not like other people: swindlers, unjust, adulterers, or even like this taxgatherer. I fast twice a week; I pay tithes of all that I get'. But the taxgatherer, standing some distance away, was even unwilling to lift up his eyes to heaven, but was beating his breast, saying, 'God be merciful to me the sinner.' " (verses 11-14)

Did you notice that Jesus did not indicate that the Pharisee's claims of righteousness were an exaggeration? The Pharisee was apparently an extremely righteous man, but it was the tax-gatherer, the penitent sinner, who was justified. The righteousness of the Pharisee was nullified by "--the boastful pride of life--

Disciples of Jesus who wish to faithfully serve God will not have the attitude of the Pharisee. They will always quard against the "--boastful pride of life -- ", knowing that pride can nullify their righteous and godly

I John 2:15-17 lists the characteristics that disciples of Jesus must not have if they wish to faithfully serve God. When these characteristics are and covetousness. These sins are compared with the qualification that subscribers to the "Sharing and Caring" newsletter must have, an interesting observation can be made. This observation is that disciples of Jesus cannot faithfully serve God if they are characterized by the sins that compose "--the lust of the flesh--" and they cannot subscribe to the "Caring and Sharing" newsletter. However, they can subscribe to the "Caring and Sharing" newsletter if they are characterized by the sins that compose "--the lust of the eyes--" and "--the boastful pride of life--", but they cannot faithfully serve God.

### Farmers Should Consider Wildlife Habitat

The first Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contracts signed by Texas landowners will begin expiring in 1995. According to Soil Conservation Service officials, now is the time to start making plans for the use of those

Congress established CRP in the 1985 Farm Bill to take marginal cropland out of production and most often, plant it to grass. Texas landowners traded 4 million acres of cropland production for 10 years of annual rental payments. Eighty percent of those acres is in a 55-county area in the southern high plains and panhandle

Charles Coffman, Soil Conservation Service resource conservationist. Lubbock, said landowners shouldn't overlook the wildlife options available to them on CRP acres.




