### Services Are Pending For Beedie M. Lavery, 92

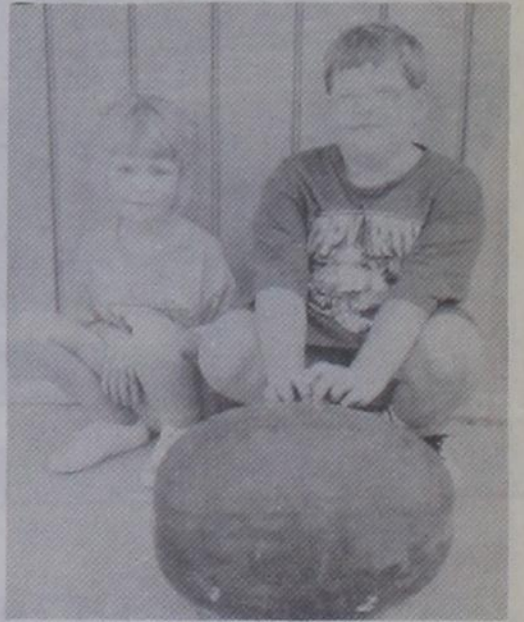
Beedie May Lavery, 92, died Sunday, Aug. 21, 1994. Services are pending with Carmichael-Whitley Funeral Directors.

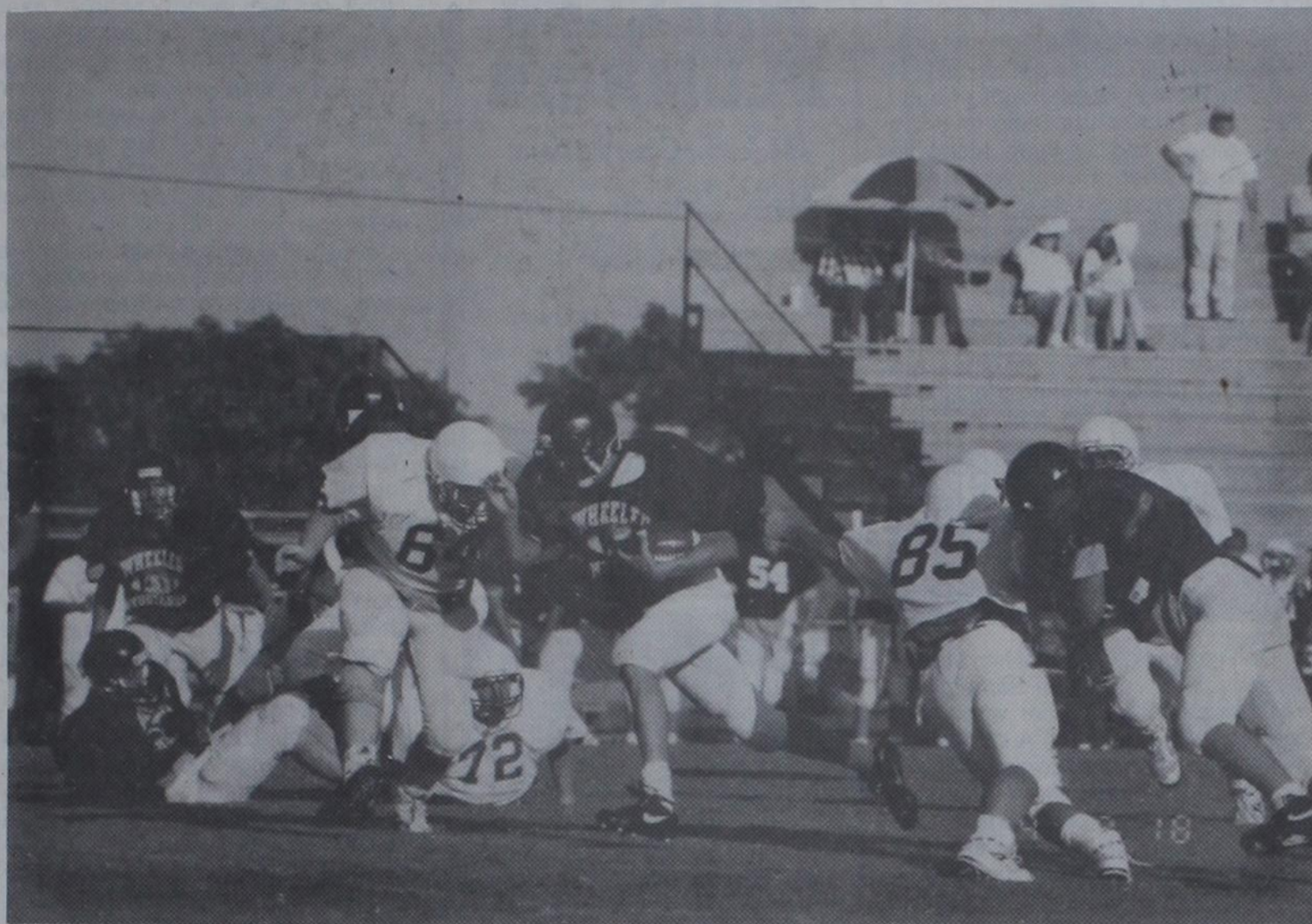

The Wheeler County 4-H Better Bake Show is scheduled for Monday, September 12 at 10:00 a.m.

The purpose of the Bake Show is to promote the Panhandle's major agriculture product—WHEAT. Participants will learn the value of wheat products in the diet as well as skills of planning, preparing, serving and scoring these products.

To enter, each 4-H member will enter yeast bread from a "scratch" recipe as either a standard size loaf (4"x8") or as dinner rolls (6). Flour content must be a minimum of 1/3 whole wheat flour. Products should not require refrigeration. Products must be displayed on foil covered heavy cardboard, wrapped with clear plastic wrap and labeled on bottom with the product name and with their name and club. The recipe should be typed or clearly hand written on a 8 1/2" x 11" paper. If the recipe is altered, the original and the altered recipe should be included. Note the adjusted ingredients. No spreads or jams will be accepted with product. Products made with a breadmaking machine will not be accepted.

First place will receive a prize donated by the Wheeler County Family and Community Education Clubs and qualify to compete at the Tri-State Fair on September 17.

Joan Gray, County Extension Agent, will hold a breads workshop on Tuesday, August 30 at the county agent's office beginning at 5:30 p.m. for those interested. For more information, call Joan Gray at 826-5243 or your local 4-H leader.

### From the Minister's Desk:

In the mid 1600's the nation of England was in a state of turmoil because of a conflict between the King Charles I, and Parliament. The king believed that he should have absolute power over the nation. But Parliament believed that it should have some control over his authority.

Eventually this conflict led to a revolution against the King and in 1649, Charles I was overthrown and beheaded. Following the revolution, a commonwealth was established and Oliver Cromwell was made Lord Protector of the Commonwealth which virtually made him a military dictator.

During Cromwell's five year reign as Lord Protector of the Commonwealth, a silver shortage developed which caused a coin shortage. To correct this shortage, Cromwell sent soldiers to see if they could find any silver in the local cathedrals. When the soldiers returned, they reported: "The only silver we could find is in the statues of the saints standing in the corners." "To which the Lord Protector said: "Good! We'll melt down the saints and put them in circulation."

With this statement, Cromwell, unknowingly pinpointed the practical goal of Christianity. Christians are to be real people—not highly polished statues—who are circulating through the main streams of humanity.

Think about the Christians of the

first century. Following their conversion, these Christians did not look askance at their wicked world and then retreat into the safety of a church building. Rather they circulated into the world, teaching and demonstrating the life-changing power of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

It is true that the Bible clearly teaches that Christians are to be separate from the world. (II Corinthians 6:14-18) But this separation is not synonymous with isolation from the world.

In the hours before His crucifixion, Jesus prayed for his disciples, saying: "I do not ask Thee to take them out of the world, but to keep them from the evil one. They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. Sanctify them in the truth: Thy word is truth. As Thou didst send me into the world, I also have sent them into the world." (John 17:15-18) Like Jesus, Christians have been sent into the world. They are separated from the sinfulness of the world, but they are not isolated from the sinful people of the world.

This is a crucial distinction. Christians who are separated from the world are like Jesus. But Christians who are isolated from the world are like silver statues—polished to a high gloss sheen and safely out of circulation.

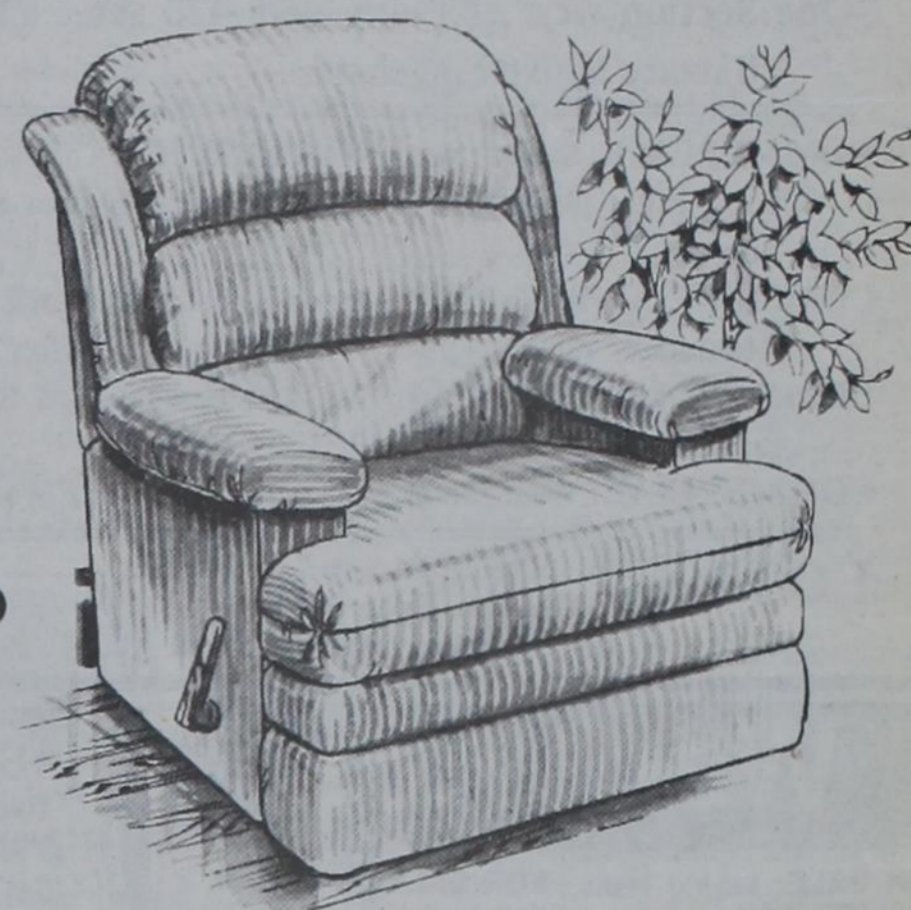
