# MUSTANGS FALL TO PANHANDLE, 16-0

Panhandle Panther Den last Friday night, and again found themselves short on the scoreboard 16-0. This was the second week in a row that the Mustangs failed to provide any offensive threat to the opponent. Throughout the first half, the "Stangs" moved the ball at times and threatened to score late in the first and second quarters. The "Stangs" especially looked strong after not catching a punt and letting it roll to our one yard line. At this time, the offense decided enough was enough and moved the ball straight down the field with some nifty running by Jarrod Ledbetter and a great offensive line push: However, (that dreaded word, however) the Mustangs were unable to capitalize on this fine offensive drive. There were some good points in the first half, as the Mustang defense continued to bend with the strong Panther offensive threat, but never broke and played good defense, especially on some key passing downs. The linebacker core of Phillip Wiggins, Corey Case, Dustin Weatherly and Jarrod Ledbetter, continued to harass the Panhandle quarterback and fine defensive line played by Ty Ferguson, Cliff Fletcher, Brad Harrison, Charlie Flanagan, Darby Dorman, and Robert Stiles stopped the Panther running game. Actually, the Mustangs looked better in the first half of this contest than they have all year long.

Then with the beginning of the second half, the Panthers came out throwing strongly and things looked dreary for the Mustangs. The defense finally took hold, and allowed only a field goal in the third quarter by the Panthers. Throughout the third and fourth quarter the Mustang offense threatened but was unable to provide any real threat. The offensive line looked better against the 5-3 front put up by Panhandle and the backs were strong but all eight pistons were not firing at the same time. Also, the passing threat posed by Wheeler never developed.

### Extension Update Joan Gray, CEA-HE

As America's population ages, eye health is a special concern because millions are affected by this problem.

In 1990, about 1.4 million people underwent cataract surgery, resulting in a health care bill of \$3.2 billion. Now, growing evidence shows that maintaining good nutritional status can reduce the incidence of cataract forma-

Many people already know that vitamin A is critical to healthy night vision. If we don't get enough vitamin A, we are susceptible to night blindness. The major symptom of night blindness is the inability of the eyes to adjust to dim light. All of us have experienced this to some extent since it takes a little time for our eyes to adjust when we go from bright light to a dimly lit area. This may have happened to us when we were driving on a bright sunny day, and then entered a dark tunnel. Or, we may have gone into a movie theater that was dimly lit, and had trouble finding seats.

When a person isn't getting enough vitamin A, it takes a much longer time for their eyes to adjust to this change in light intensity. If a person has been getting enough vitamin A, eyes will adjust within a minute or so.

Recent research indicates that other nutrients are also important in main-

the eye from oxidative damage is vitamin E. The minerals, zinc and selenium, also appear to be involved in eye health, although the role they play is not well understood.

What can people do as they age to reduce their risk of getting cataracts? At this point in time, the best advice is to eat a variety of nourishing foods including bread, rice and cereals, fruits and vegetables, low-fat milk products. and servings of meat, poultry, fish eggs, and beans.



In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus described His disciples by saying: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do men light a lamp, and put it under the peck-measure, but on the lampstand; and it gives light to all who are in the house." (Matthew 5:14-15)

This description contains two sentences which emphasized two important truths about disciples of Jesus. These two sentences are:-

1. "You are the light of the world." Notice that Jesus did not say: "You should be ... "Rather He said: "You are --. "The verb "are" is the simple present which suggests the relevance of disciples of Jesus.

Notice also that Jesus included every one of His disciples when He said: "You are the light of the world." With this sentence. Jesus included of thousands of matches. those disciples whose hair is white with age and experience. He also included those disciples whose children are grown or almost grown. Jesus did not exclude any of His disciples when He said: "You are the light of the world."

2. "—It gives light to all who are in the house." With this sentence,




