MUSTANGS FALL TO PANHANDLE, 16-0

The Wheeler Mustangs invaded the Panhandle Panther Den last Friday night, and again found themselves short on the scoreboard 16-0. This was the second week in a row that the Mustangs failed to provide any offensive threat to the opponent. Throughout the first half, the "Stangs" moved the ball at times and threatened to score late in the first and second quarters. The "Stangs" especially looked strong after not catching a punt and letting it roll to our one yard line. At this time, the offense decided enough was enough and moved the ball straight down the field with some nifty running by Jarrod Ledbetter and a great offensive line push. However, (that dreaded word, however) the Mustangs were unable to capitalize on this fine offensive drive. There were some good points in the first half, as the Mustang defense continued to bend with the strong Panther offensive threat, but never broke and played good defense, especially on some key passing downs. But, they did look better than the week before, and a team has to continue to improve.

Extension Update

As America's population ages, eye health is a special concern because millions are affected by this problem. In 1990, about 1.4 million people underwent cataract surgery, resulting in a health care bill of \$3.2 billion. Now, growing evidence shows that maintaining good nutritional status can reduce the incidence of cataract formation.

Many people already know that vitamin A is critical to healthy night vision. If we don't get enough vitamin A, we are susceptible to night blindness. The major symptom of night blindness is the inability of the eyes to adjust to dim light. All of us have experienced this to some extent since it takes a little time for our eyes to adjust when we go from bright light to a dimly lit area. This may have happened to us when we were driving on a bright sunny day, and then entered a dark tunnel. Or, we may have gone into a movie theater that was dimly lit, and had trouble finding seats.

When a person isn't getting enough vitamin A, it takes a much longer time for their eyes to adjust to this change in light intensity. If a person has been getting enough vitamin A, eyes will adjust within a minute or so.

Recent research indicates that other nutrients are also important in main-

taining healthy eyesight. High levels of vitamin C are found in eye tissue. A number of researchers are investigating the function of this nutrient. The major theory is that vitamin C protects the eye against light-induced oxidative damage.

Another nutrient which may protect

the eye from oxidative damage is vitamin E. The minerals, zinc and selenium, also appear to be involved in eye health, although the role they play is not well understood.

What can people do as they age to reduce their risk of getting cataracts? At this point in time, the best advice is to eat a variety of nourishing foods including bread, rice and cereals, fruits and vegetables, low-fat milk products, and servings of meat, poultry, fish eggs, and beans.

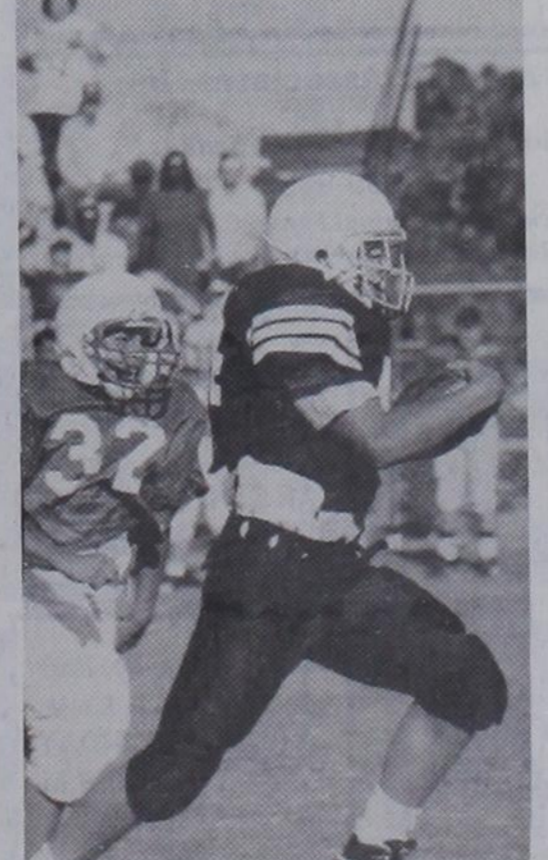

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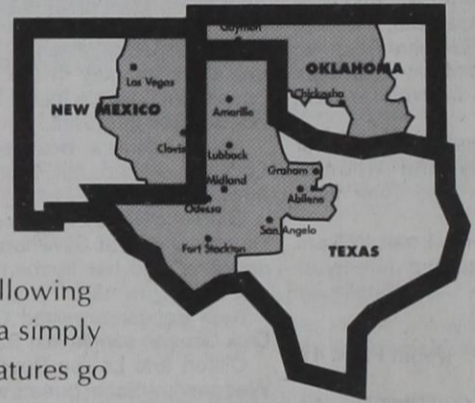
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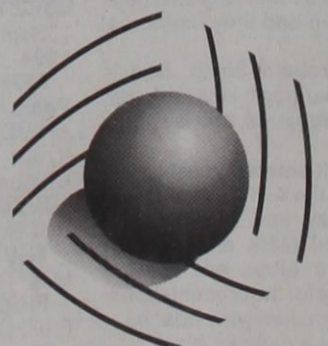
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
