

#### Wheeler Jr. High Begins "Accelerated Reader"

Wheeler Junior High language arts teachers, Becky Hardcastle and Betty Rives, have started a new reading program for junior high students. This program is called the "Accelerated Reader." It is a computerized reading management program that tests students over books read. Students may choose any of 200 books that are available on the computer disks.

After completing a book from the list, the students takes a 10-20 question test on the computer. The test takes about 15 minutes to complete. The computer keeps track of each student's score and the difficulty of the books. Points are awarded depending on the reading level and difficulty

of the books. This program encourages reading more classics and award-winning books, yet the students choose the books that interest them. The program also allows the teacher to actually determine if students are reading books and how they are comprehending the material. Even the smartest kid can't fool the computer. Students learn that they must read carefully and well.

If you're a student away from home, cooking may be a new experience or something that you would like to know more about.

To avoid getting foodborne illness from your own cooking, follow a few

\*When grocery shopping, put perishable foods in your cart last and always take them home immediately and refrigerate at once.

\*If you're using a microwave in the dorm, follow product directions and check the temperature of the food to see if it needs extra cooking time.

\*Refrigerate leftovers such as pizza, fried chicken, hamburgers and Chinese food as soon as possible. Remember, perishable foods should never be unrefrigerated more than

two hours. \*Never store foods on the window ledge even if the weather is cold (not even that pizza box!). Buildings radiate heat, making the sill warmer than the outside temperature. Plus, a metal box used to protect food from birds and animals can act as an "oven" in direct sunlight.

\*Check contents of "care packages" of food from home to see if any cans or packages must be stored in the refrigerator before or after opening it.

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




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



a singing group from Borger.

recorded one of the most popular statements that Jesus ever spoke about salvation. This statement is: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life."

While this statement is extremely popular, it is often misunderstood. To correct this misunderstanding, it is helpful to divide this statement into three phrases. These three phrases are:-

1. "—God so loved—." The salvation of man began with God and His infinite love. Because of His love, God made man in His image and "-breathed into his nostrils the breath of life-" (Genesis 2:7) When man sinned and separated himself from God, the love of God did not cease. Rather God continued to love man, activating a plan for the salvation of man.

2. "-He gave-." This plan was consistent with the God' nature. Since God is just, His plan was just. But since God is merciful, His plan was also merciful.

The fulfillment of this plan clearly occurred when God gave Jesus for the sins of man. When Jesus died for the sins of man, it satisfied the demands of God's justice. But His death also allowed God to mercifully forgive and forget the sins of

In the fifth chapter of Romans, the Apostle Paul described the gift of salvation as a "-free gift-". He wrote:"-The wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Homans 6:23) Since a free gift cannot be meritoriously earned, it should be obvious that salvation is by the grace of God.

Salvation by the grace of God is a basic New Testament truth. The Apostle Paul wrote: "-God, being rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, even
