I attended the Trauma Symposium Friday and Saturday of last week in Amarillo and Barbara went the other direction. Mother Stas stayed home.

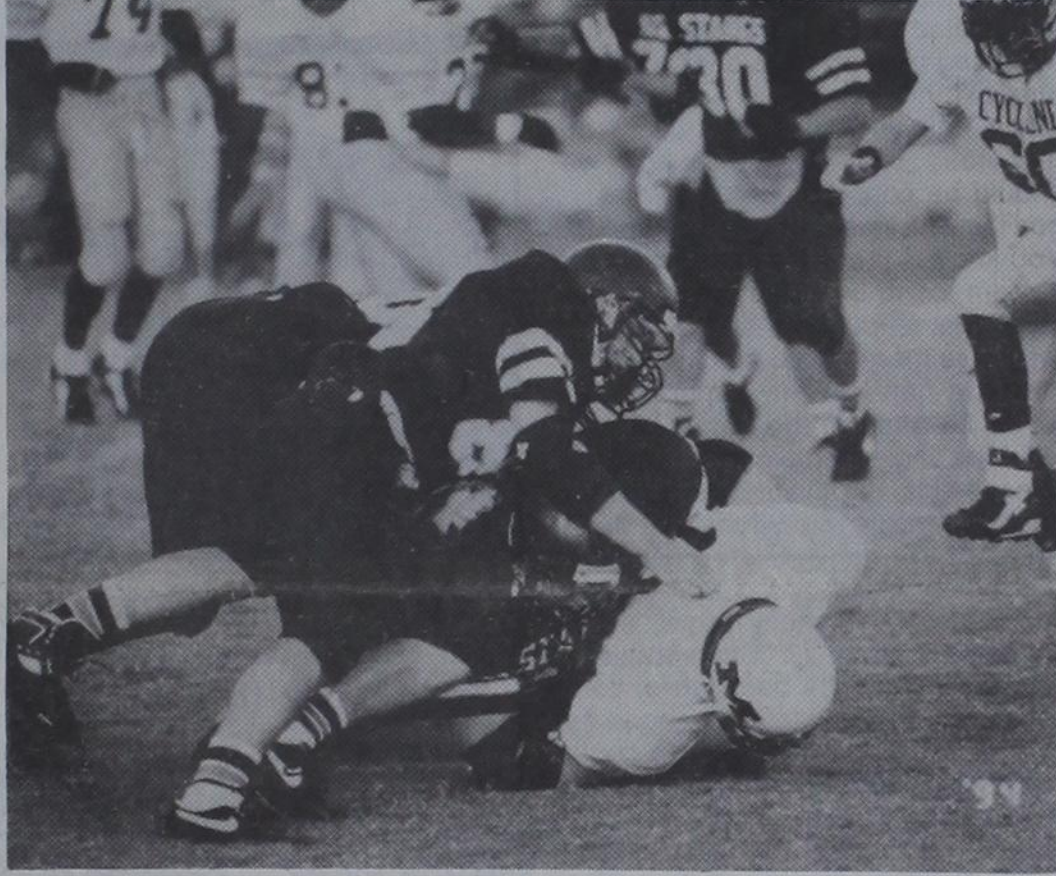

In an effort to continue with our goal of Continuous Quality Improvement at Wheeler Care Center we have entered into an agreement with Hospice of the Panhandle in Pampa to work with them in providing Hospice care to the terminally ill.

We have set aside a room for Hospice patients and have equipped it to accommodate the needs of terminal patients. Under the arrangement we will provide nursing care in regard to the activities of daily living and general nursing care while Hospice will provide the specialized care needed by the terminal patient. The room will also provide a place for family members to spend quality time with the patient in a setting of privacy.

This service can be rendered to one of the residents of Wheeler Care Center when they approach the end of their life span or it can be a patient that Hospice is caring for in some other setting who reaches the place where they need nursing care on an ongoing basis and the nursing care provided by the care center can be utilized to assist Hospice.

Under the working arrangement when one of the residents of the care center needs Hospice care we work together with Hospice to meet the needs of the patient. If the patient is brought in by Hospice and has not been a resident of the center they simply pay for the services rendered and the patient remains a client of Hospice.

Wheeler Care Center is a member of Texas Health Care Association and American Health Care Association and convention time is approaching for both of these professional associations. The American Convention will convene in Las Vegas October 3-6, 1994, and the Texas convention is scheduled for Dallas, October 31-November 4. The Administrator is scheduled to attend the National meeting and six of the department heads are going to the convention in Dallas. Meetings of this kind are vital to keep abreast with the ever changing health care scene. Our desire is to be among the leaders in the industry, not just lost in the pack. Wheeler may be small and rural but we are setting a standard for excellency in long term care with Christian Love.

The resident Christmas party has been planned for December 16th, at 7:00 p.m. We will send more information as we can.

Wheeler Life Chain '94 Planned for Sun., Oct. 2

Sunday afternoon, October 2, in cities and towns all across the U.S. and Canada, Life Chains will again form on local sidewalks. Led by their pastors, parishioners by the hundreds of thousands will oppose abortion by holding a mass produced sign that reads either "Abortion Kills Children", "Jesus Forgives and Heals", "Adoption: The Loving Option", or "Lord Forgive Us and Our Nation".

The first Life Chain was organized in 1987 with 2,500 Christian soldiers holding signs in California. Last year, Wheeler Life Chain '93, had a little more than 130 Christian Life defenders participating from 14 different area Churches from Wheeler, Shamrock, Miami, Allison, Gageby and Mobeetie.

The WHEELER LIFE CHAIN '94 is from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m., on October 2, but this year we are asking our participants to meet at 1:30 p.m. in the back parking lot of the First Baptist Church, which is along Alan Bean St. at 1:30 we will have a short time of prayer and instructions, also at this time the Church coordinators will pick up their map and the signs which may then be handed out.

Again this year, the Life Chain volunteers are asked not to engage in small talk but to spend that one hour in a united prayer calling for an end to abortion in America. Abortion doesn't hurt just the baby but also the mother, father and our nation.

Did you know that in the time it has taken you to read the article this far, five babies have lost their lives to the terrifying death of abortion?

David graduated from Sweetwater High School in 1967. After graduation he lived at the Home of Hope in Vinita, OK for 10 years where he was a boy scout, earning many honors. He returned to Sweetwater in 1977 to live with his parents. David was active with Erick Kitchen Band for many years, helping the members set up for the concerts. David loved nature and enjoyed gardening and feeding wildlife. He also was concerned for his neighbors, checking on and helping several ladies in the community. For the past two years, David was involved in researching the genealogy of his family and produced two books, one each for Joe and Lois' family tree.

He was a member of Blanchard Primitive Baptist Church and attended the Erick Primitive Baptist Church.

He was preceded in death by his maternal and paternal grandparents and a nephew, Robert Flowers.

Services were at 2:00, Friday, September 23, 1994 at the Sweetwater First Baptist Church officiated by T.J. Pittman, and assisted by Ed Wrather. Interment was in the Buffalo Cemetery under the direction of Fatheree-Albert Funeral Home.

Davis Completes Tour

September 6, 1994 (FHTNC)—Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Jeffrey P. Davis, son of Alta J. Davis of 300 S. Jackson, Wheeler, Texas, recently completed a six-month deployment to the Persian Gulf, Western Pacific and Indian Oceans aboard the aircraft carrier USS Carl Vinson, homeported in Alameda, Calif.

While deployed, Davis traveled nearly 44,000 miles aboard the ship, visiting Australia, Hawaii, Hong Kong, Japan, Singapore, Tasmania and United Arab Emirates.

The crew of USS Carl Vinson completed more than 7,100 aircraft launches and recoveries from the flight deck of the 1,000-foot-long nuclear powered aircraft carrier during the six-month voyage. Additionally, the crew hosted nearly 4,000 U.S. and foreign civilian dignitaries, government officials, senior military officers and other guests. While ashore, the crew took part in a variety of community relations projects ranging from painting schools and orphanages to visiting hospitals and conducting ship tours.

Davis was one of 7,000 sailors and Marines with the USS Carl Vinson Battle Group, which supported the United Nations sanctions of Iraq and several multi-national naval exercises during the deployment.

Today, U.S. aircraft carriers are on station around the world. USS George Washington is in the Mediterranean Sea, USS Kitty Hawk is in the Philippine Sea.

The 1978 graduate of Wheeler High School joined the Navy in March 1984.

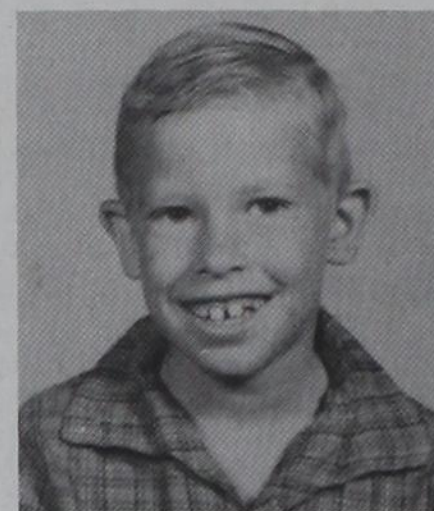

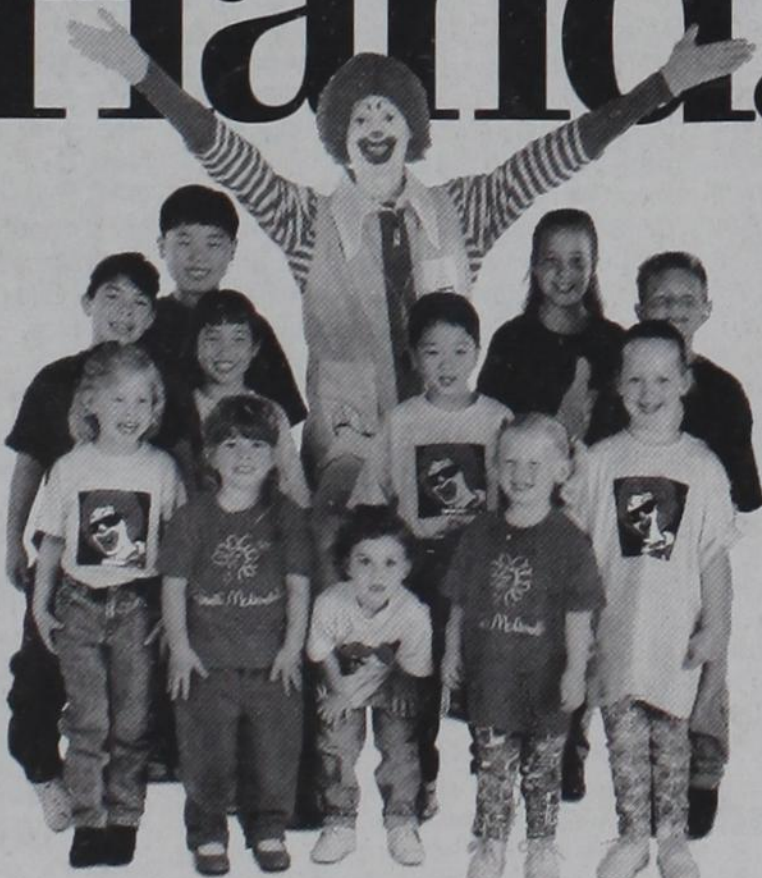

Children and Household Chores — More Responsibility

Parents have traditionally used household chores as a tool to teach children responsibility. However, with increased demands on families and time, children helping around the house is becoming more of a necessity.

Many parents today are both working out of economic need. Children are taking on more responsibility in response to parents needs and expectations. A 1992 study found that families with children between the ages of 5 and 18 had children being relied upon to do tasks at home. The tasks children were assuming were those traditionally defined as homemaker's responsibilities.

While girls tended to do more of the commonly perceived "women's jobs" such as laundry, dishwashing, cleaning and cooking, boys were no longer exempt. Children of both sexes spent approximately 78 percent of the time doing jobs previously designated as "women's work". Outdoor activities such as yard work accounted for only

15.1 percent of the time and a mere 2.4 percent was spent on car maintenance. Time spent doing chores averaged around seven hours per week. "Initially, children may resist helping around the house, yet one finds that working as a team strengthens family relationships," states Dr. Sarah L.

Anderson, family life specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Besides increased responsibility, oftentimes there is greater appreciation of what others do around the house. In the long run, children doing chores can be very beneficial."

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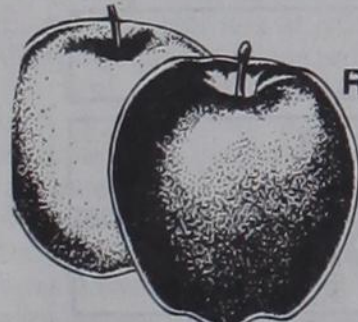

J.V. Now 4-0; Blast Skyrockets 26-8

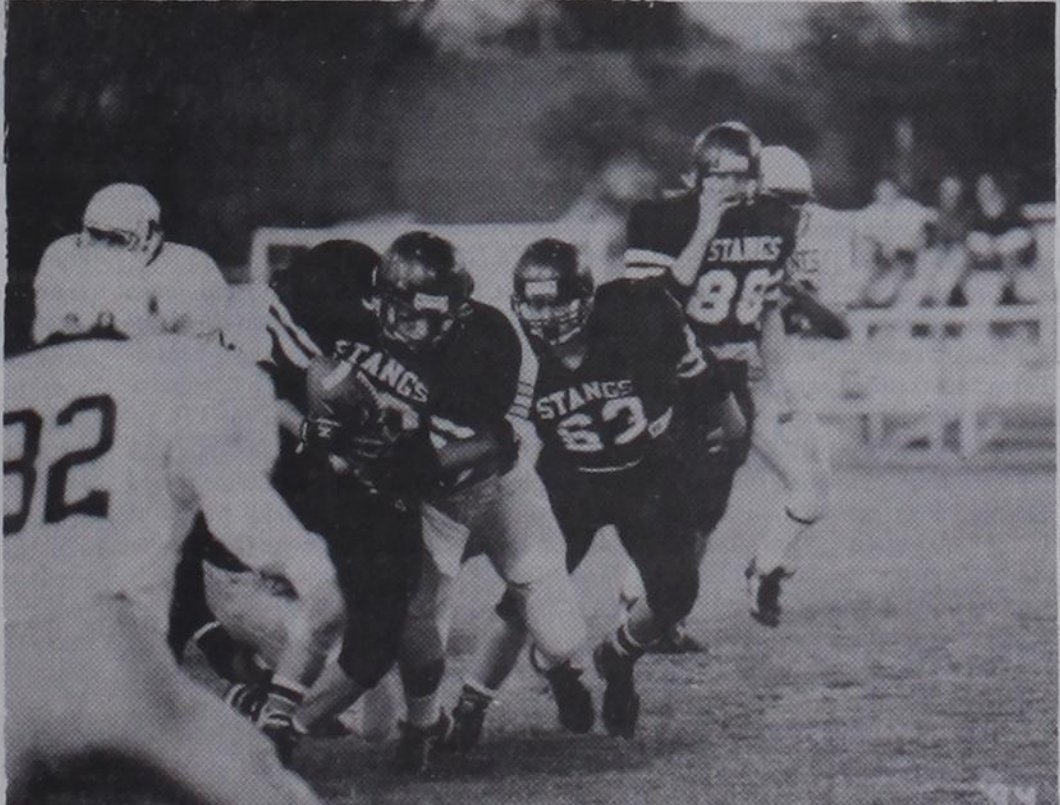

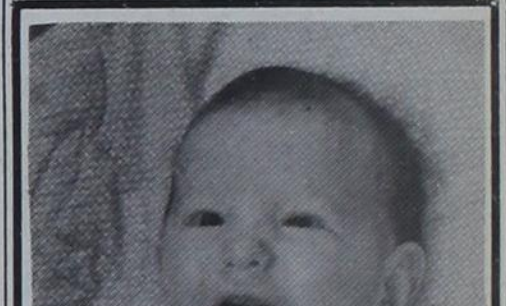
